Zahid brace sinks Macau

Bangladesh in Challenge Cup proper

Bangladesh produced the kind of performance one would expect from a

set of professionals against the amateurs of Macau in their final AFC Challenge Cup Group-A qualifying match at the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday.

And after the final whistle it was a satisfying result indeed. A 3-0 win for Bangladesh's Brazilian coach Dido and a passage into the final round of the championship next year as the best runners-up ahead of Maldives, who finished second from Group-B but lost the battle of goal difference against Bangladesh.

Bangladesh, who had a one goal advantage over Maldives (who scored four and conceded five against Bangladesh's 2-2 after their second game) before going into the final match, were left with an easy option of a draw against Macau to progress into the final round after Myanmar had won the first match of the day 1-0 against Cambodia.

The option for a draw certainly released the pressure on Bangladesh against a team that has conceded five goals in their first two games. It also brought the best of Bangladesh after a notso-impressive 1-0 win against Cambodia in their opening match followed by a heartbreaking 1-2 defeat at the hands of eventual winners Myanmar.

Midfielder Mamun opened the Bangladesh account in the 38th minute before Zahid's brace after the break saw the hosts sign off with flying colours in front of a five thousand home crowd.

It was a match where Bangladesh played proper football albeit against a weak opponent. With Mamun working tirelessly in the middle

and an overlapping right-back Rashed, who won his first national cap in place of suspended Nasir, moving menacingly down the flank there was little to do for the Bangladesh defence as the ball was mostly confined to the other half of the ground.

Still, Bangladesh had to wait a bit longer for their first goal when Zahid came out of the bench and made an immediate impact with a dipping cross from the right that striker Enamul, who scored both the goals in Bangladesh last two games, headed from close only to partially parried off by Macau goalkeeper Leong Chon Kit. But a lurking Mamun made no mistake to put the loose ball into the net with an intelligent back heel.

Zahid's two goals after the break was testimony of a quality striker. Understandably disappointed for sitting on the bench in the last two games, Zahid made a statement with a stunning 35-yarder in the 68th minute. His cannon-like right-footer was so unexpected that a pint-size Leong could hardly react in time.

Zahid, who also saw a grounder come off the post in the 62nd minute, struck his second goal in the 71st minute. This time he played a couple of one-twos with his striking partner Emily before firing in a low drive from the edge of the box. It could easily been a hattrick for him had he not missed the mark in the last ten minutes of the game.

Coach Shafiqul Islam Manik was satisfied with the win but conceded that a significant improvement was needed if they wanted to compete in the tournament proper.

"We are happy that we have qualified for the final round of the 2010 AFC Challenge Cup but with success comes added responsibility. All the teams in the final round are ranked higher

Deccan's first loss

Deccan Chargers surrendered the last perfect Indian Premier League record this season after a six-wicket loss to Delhi Daredevils Thursday.

Myanmar finished as champions of Group-A by winning their third and final match against Cambodia (1-0) in the AFC Challenge Cup Qualifiers

Group-Aat the Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday. The game went into injury time at 0-0 when Myanmar midfielder Myo Min Tun brilliantly lobbed the ball into the box where striker Yaza Win Thein poked the ball past the onrushing goalkeeper to seal the match.

The match however was fiercely competed in the middle and Cambodia made some dangerous advances towards the Myanmar post. In the 64th minute a free kick from Cambodian forward San Narith hit the Myanmar post and ricocheted off to teammate Khuon Laboravy who took another shot to no avail. Four minutes later another freekick from a Cambodia midfielder missed the far left corner of the post by couple of inches. The Indo-Chinese kingdom looked aggressive in their approach as a minute later number 14 Sovannarath earned himself a yellow card.

tomorrow when they play the opening match of the muchanticipated Port City Cricket League Twenty20 tournament at the MA Aziz Stadium.

Private television channel ATN Bangla will telecast the match live from 2:30pm.

The Group A encounter would launch a competition that took a month to organise by the organisers of Chittagong Divisional Krira Sangstha (CDKS), who took inspiration from popular Indian tournaments such as

the IPL and ICL. An auction of 48 selected cricketers, which was something new in Bangladesh, was held on April 25 at the Chittagong Club auditorium.

The city's cricket fanatics would find the auction hard to forget because of the bidding war that took place for local boy and Bangladesh opener Tamim Iqbal. The dashing left-hander was won away by Chittagong Abahani for an astonishing price of Tk7.7 lakh.

Eight teams split into two groups are contesting the nineday tournament with Chittagong Mohammedan, Chittagong Abahani, Chittagong Brothers Union and Top Sports in Group A. Ispahani, Dada Warriors, Dhaka Sports Tiger of Laxmipur and Pirates of Chittagong are the teams of Group B.

The Sunday matches will see Dada Warriors take on Dhaka Tigers in the morning while Abahani face Brothers Union in the afternoon.

The two semifinals will be held on May 9 between while the final will take place on May 10.

Organising committee sources said all preparations are almost completed

except for a few finishing touches. The galleries, special enclosures and pavilion of the newly-refurbished stadium have already worn a colourful look. Posters and banners were also fixed in different nook and cranny of the port city.

The participating teams that have drawn dozens of national and few well-known foreign players have been found busy with practice sessions at different grounds.

"We have virtually winded up all our necessary preparations to host the PCL and hope that it will be a grand success," said chairman of tournament organising committee AZM Nasiruddin yesterday.

"The PCL will definitely usher in a new era of enthusiasm in the sports arena of Chittagong as well as Bangladesh," said CDKS general secretary Sirajuddin Md Alamgir, also a director of Bangladesh Cricket Board

Chennai ride on Raina

A confused Suresh Raina's near-century paved the way for the Chennai Super Kings' second victory of the Indian Premier League over the Rajasthan Royals on Thursday.

In the second match of a double-header, Raina made 98 in guiding his team to 164-5 after Rajasthan won the toss and sent them in to bat.

He reached his half-century from only 26 deliveries and thought he had reached a ton off 55 balls in the final over - the result of a mistake displayed on the stadium scoreboard.

In fact, Raina was only on 98 when he lifted his bat in celebration. He went big off the next ball - the third-last of the innings - but was caught by Proteas skipper Graeme Smith in the deep and must have been seething when he got back to the dressing room.

Title holders Rajasthan were dismissed for 126 runs with seamer Lakshmipathy Balaji returning a magnificent 4-21 as Chennai secured a comfortable 38-run win.

Kamran Khan, who injured himself bowling, did not bat.

The Chennai bowlers combined superbly, with South African Albie Morkel and New Zealander Jacob Oram picking up two wickets each.

Middle-order batsman Ravindra Jadeja put up a fight for the defending champions with a defiant 37 off 33 balls, but received little support as Chennai took a morale-boosting victory. Earlier, Rajasthan spinner Yusuf Pathan, who

led the attack with a return of 2-17, had done a tremendous job with the new ball, removing Chennai openers Matthew Hayden and Parthiv Patel cheaply.

But Raina and Subraniam Badrinath put on 64 runs for the third wicket to steady the ship. **SCORES IN BRIEF**

MU gain slim advantage

Manchester United will take a 1-0 lead into the second leg of their Champions League semifinal with Arsenal after the holders failed to fully capitalise on

their domination here on Wednesday. An inspired display from Gunners goalkeeper Manuel Almunia ensured that John O'Shea's 17th-minute strike was the only reward Sir Alex Ferguson's side reaped from a first leg encounter they comfortably controlled.

Carlos Tevez's decisive role in the weekend comeback against Tottenham earned him a place in a United starting line-up in which there was no room for either Dimitar Berbatov or Ryan Giggs, who was made to wait until 66 minutes had elapsed before coming on to make his 800th appearance for the club.

Arsenal's defensive problems were

eased as former United centreback Mikael Silvestre and teenage left back Kieran Gibbs both came through late fitness tests, although the opening exchanges hardly inspired confidence in a back four missing both William Gallas and Gael Clichy.

Within two minutes, Darren Fletcher's cross had given Wayne Rooney the chance to force Manuel Almunia into a fine one-handed save and it quickly became apparent that Arsenal would struggle to cope with the tempo of United's opening salvoes.

A superb double save from Almunia denied Tevez just after quarter of an hour had elapsed but the resulting corner saw the holders claim the opener that their efforts deserved.

The initial delivery failed to trouble the Arsenal backline but, fatally, Michael Carrick was allowed to pick the ball up beyond the back post and hook it back across goal.

Theo Walcott's attempt to intercept

only served to direct the ball into the path of O'Shea and the Ireland defender finished with the aplomb of a seasoned striker, hitting a half-volley into the roof of the net.

Still reeling from that setback, Arsenal were fortunate not to concede a second when Cristiano Ronaldo headed an inviting cross from Tevez straight at Almunia.

But as the first half came to a close, the visitors began to string a few passes together although there were no clear chances to show for their attractive build-up and Almunia had to be quickly off his line to deny Ronaldo after a slipshod passback by Gibbs.

With United's energy levels slipping, chances were thinner on the ground after the interval, but the hosts were still unfortunate not to double their lead with just over 20 minutes left after a piece of brilliance from Ronaldo.

Picking up a loose ball just inside the Gunners' half, the Portuguese winger SEE PAGE 18 COL 5
