Tourists' batters make merry

The batsmen of the Sri Lanka Cricket (SLC) Development Team warmed up well on the first day of the only two-day practice match against the GP-BCB National Cricket Academy side at the Chittagong Divisional Stadium yesterday.

Four of the top-order struck half-centuries as the visitors made 339 for five in 90 overs at stumps.

Opener Dilshan Gunawardene batted for three hours to score 74 off 136 balls with the help of three boundaries before Lahiru Thirimanne (79), Ashan Priyanjana (61) and Nawamini Siriwardena (54*) all reached fifties of their own.

For the home side, left-arm paceman Shafaq Al Jabir took two for 63 while there was a wicket each for legspinning duo Marshall Ayub and Raihan Arafat and off-spinner Farhad Hossain.

The first Test of the series is at Lord's and starts next Wednesday.

ECB endorse P20

The England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB) confirmed here on Wednesday their plans to stage a twodivision Twenty20 competition next year, an event they hope will rival the Indian Premier League.

The move was backed by the English governing body's board despite criticisms that it will lead to too much Twenty20 cricket in a domestic season which also includes the existing Twenty 20 Cup.

The new tournament, which will be called the P20, is due to be staged in June when English officials hope many of the world's best players will be available to play, just as they do in the IPL which is currently taking place in South Africa.

Pakistan will consider selecting players who break away from the ICL on a case-by-case basis, following the decision by the BCCI to grant an "amnesty" to ICL players who cut ties with the league by May-end. Though the BCCI has put in place a 'cooling off' period of a year whereby an ex-ICL player will only be eligible to represent India after a year away from the ICLthe PCB has left the door open for players to return sooner.

The stance adopted by the PCB is understandable, given how badly it was affected by the ban on ICL players. Nineteen players from Pakistan signed up with the league, nearly half of whom, can conceivably represent Pakistan still. The defection took away nearly the entire bench strength of the national side. Key among them are the likes of Mohammad Yousuf and Abdul Razzaq, and even players such as Imran Nazir, who could well be part of a Pakistan lineup in one of the three formats of the game.

"It is pertinent to note that at the last executive board meeting of ICC, it was emphasized that the action against players who have participated in ICL is the prerogative of the home board," the PCB said in a statement.

"The PCB's position on players who have participated in ICL is that such players must resign from ICL if they are to be considered for selection by PCB. While permitting such players to play cricket, PCB will decide on case-tocase basis the penalties to be imposed and the time period for which they will remain banned. This arrangement will continue till the end of May 2009.

Earlier this year, a local Sindh court ruled that ICL players can play domestic cricket. Recently, Pakistan's selectors also picked three ICL players in a preliminary 30-man squad for the Twenty20 World Cup. They were withdrawn a day later, however, senior board officials calling it a "faux pas."

But the road back for players such as Yousuf or Razzaq - players the PCB "could do with in the national side" - will still not be an easy one. "ICL contracts, in the board's legal opinion, are pretty one-sided," a senior official told Cricinfo. "It will not be easy for a player to rescind from them. We have sent a communication to the ICL asking for some clarity on the contracts but have not received a reply yet. When a player does come to us and has documents stating that he has left the league, we will consider his case."

Further muddying up the issue is the recent flirtation of a number of Pakistan's ICL players with the American Premier League (APL), another - thus far - unauthorized, private Twenty20 league. The APL, brainchild of local entrepreneur Jay Mir, is scheduled to be held in October on a converted baseball field in Stater Island, New York City. But the ICC has said it will hold the same status as the ICL; effectively that players involved cannot play internationally.

"A number of our ICL players are interested in the APL," the official said. "That will complicate matters even more. Jay Mir has been in touch with us, the ICC and the BCCI and he has been told that his league needs to be authorized first. If players join that, then it will become more difficult."

The triple Olympic gold medallist Usain Bolt has been involved in a car accident in Jamaica but walked away with only scratches. Bolt, along with his brother and a female passenger, was taken to a hospital in Spanish Town, near Kingston, where the Jamaican sprinter was treated before

Bolt's manager, Norman Peart, said that the 22-year-old sustained nothing worse than scratches from thorn bushes when he stepped out of the car on the side of the road. "We are very relieved he's OK," Peart said. "Everybody is fine."

He is reported to have had a thorn stick him on the soft part of his left foot, after he stepped out of the car which overturned in a ditch off the highway. The extent of the damage to the car was unclear.

The injury may see Bolt miss an invitational meeting in Kingston on Saturday. He is

also due to run a 150m street race in Manchester on May 17. "We will see how he is in the next few days before his coach will decide if he is able to run

on Saturday," Bolt's agent said

Police sergeant David Sheriff reported that Bolt lost control of his BMW M3 a present given to him by his sponsors at Puma after his performances at the Beijing Olympics after apparently speeding on a rain-slicked highway west of Kingston. The car, Bolt's favourite, is believed to have been left in a ditch.

Pakistan can beat Australia Friday to keep alive their hopes of winning the current one-day Ajmal. series, coach Intikhab Alam said Thursday.

Despite being 2-1 down after losing the third game Monday, Pakistan was still determined to win the remaining two games and the series, Alam said, if only for their fans back home.

"We desperately want to win the series for the sake of millions of fans... who have been deprived of watching (international) matches" by security concerns, Alam said. Pakistan was forced to move the current

series to neutral venues in the United Arab Emirates after Australia refused to tour Pakistan, citing the high security risks. Pakistan started the series promisingly by winning the first match by four wickets. But Australia came back strongly, winning the

second match by six wickets and the third by 27 Despite Pakistan's setback, Alam believes

Australia are still beatable. "If you look at the results of the last two defeated AH Khan Smriti matches, they did not outplay us. We made mistakes in batting, especially in the third match," he said of his team's failure Monday to chase a modest 199-run target.

Pakistan were cruising along at 95-0 before Australian spinners Nathan Hauritz and Michael Clarke shared six wickets between them, to blow their opponents away for 171.

Alam said he had asked his senior batsmen to take more responsibility.

"We had a pep talk for two hours before training Wednesday and I told my senior batsmen that they must stay at the wicket and put a

value on their wickets," he said.

Pace spearhead Shoaib Akhtar, rested for the third match, will return at the expense of Sohail Tanvir. Pakistan may also strengthen their batting by including spinning all-rounder Fawad Alam in place of off-spinner Saeed

Ajmal's bowling action was reported as illegal after the second match, a decision which affected his performance as he failed to get any

wicket in the third match. Clarke, Australia's captain, said his players

will be on their toes Friday. "Obviously, they need to win on Friday but don't worry, we will be doing our best to make sure that we prepare better than we have done

thus far in this series," said Clarke. "It's a big game for us too, we really want to win... Pakistan have to be under pressure because they have to win to stay in the series, so we need to be more focused on what we are

Fast bowler Brett Lee joined the Australian squad Tuesday and trained with them for two days. However, he is unlikely to play as the team management is still assessing his progress

towards full fitness after injury. Coach Tim Nielsen said Lee may get a chance in the only Twenty20 on the tour, scheduled for Dubai on May 7.

ICL stays optimistic

The ICL appears to be facing an exodus of players who are eager to cash in on the BCCI's new amnesty offer but the unofficial league is confident of surviving the latest crisis. It's learnt that that the ICL management discussed the BCCI's offer on Wednesday and reiterated its decision to go ahead with plans for the next season in October.

"We are positive about going forward," a senior ICL official told Cricinfo. "Some of our players may be tempted by the BCCI's offer, but we are confident of retaining the players we want. We have legally binding contracts with the players and we expect them to honour those. Breaking contracts and walking away is not as simple as it sounds; there is a notice period, and no-objection clauses involved."

The official also dismissed suggestions that the league would be forced to shut down after it started downsizing its operations this year. The ICL cancelled its March programme due to the deepening economic recession as well as the non-availability of Pakistan players following cross-border political tensions. On Wednesday, barely an hour after the BCCI announced its amnesty offer, Himanshu Mody, the ICL's business head, revealed that the league would not be renewing the contracts of some players

and support-staff members. "Taking forward its Sports Performance Evaluation (SPE) process across all cricket operations, the ICL management has decided not to renew the contracts of some of the ICL players and support staff that have expired,' Mody said in a public statement. "As cricket professionals they are free to decide and

explore their options." The ICL official Cricinfo spoke to, however, said this was all part of a long-term plan. "The idea is to have a sharper and leaner programme going ahead with players who are committed to the league," he said. "Obviously, what we do has to be financially viable too." Apparently, some senior Indian players and some foreign players, like Nathan Astle, the former New Zealand batsman, are among those whose contracts

may not be renewed. ICL officials claimed that the BCCI's amnesty is a "desperate ploy" to bring the ICL to its knees before they take the ICC to court for rejecting their request for official recognition. "We have a strong legal case because the new ICC rules on unofficial cricket comes into force only on June 1 and can't be applied in a retrospective manner," the official said. "As per the old rules, the ICC is on a sticky wicket legally. The ICC knows that and this is just a desperate ploy to break us."

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The current ICC protocols for approving unofficial cricket events, which came into force in 2003, do not cover events not involving players currently contracted to its member boards, or reduced format events involving no more than three players contracted to those boards. The ICL started its Twenty20 programme in 2007 with its own contracted pool of players. Even though the ICC's new guidelines are tighter in this regard -- they clearly state that a cricket venture remains unofficial till granted approval by the home board -- it is doubtful whether they cannot be applied in a retrospective manner.

However, despite the ICL's confident posture, early indications are that it faces an uphill task in retaining a decent player base. Some key Indian ICL players admit that they are seriously looking at accepting the BCCI's offer because it "works well" for both the seniors and the voungsters.


As far as the senior players are concerned, the offer gives them an opportunity to safeguard their future in the official set-up, either as coaches, commentators or even administrators. And for the juniors, it opens the doors to return to their state teams at a time when the BCCI has enhanced player payments across the board.

Most importantly, the amnesty offer, which makes ICL players eligible for domestic cricket from June 1 if they cut all ties with the unofficial league before May 31, opens up opportunities in the lucrative IPL, which has been classified as a domestic event. "At least 99% (of the ICL players) will think

about this and may move back into the BCCI fold," a prominent ICL player told Cricinfo. "Even if you can't play international cricket now, the IPL is still there. A lot the ICL guys can make the IPL teams where there is a healthy international presence. This makes a big differ-

Another ICL player said that there are "two clear reasons" why the ICL will lose a lot of players. "Firstly, there has been no clarity on the future of ICL," he said. "Then, it is no secret that many of us have not been paid by the league for a while." Emotionally too, he says, the players admit they are "sick" of their outlaw status after having been barred from even practicing in their local college grounds by the BCCI's hardline anti-ICL stance.

The ICL official admitted that there is an issue with the dues but sought to link that with the performance appraisal process. "Once the process is complete and the picture becomes clear on who will be retained and who will not, the dues issue will be settled," he said. "As for the other issues, all I can say is that they walked into the ICL with their eyes wide open, so what's the problem now?"
