



### National commission to fix prices of farm produce

The government will constitute a national price commission to fix prices of agricultural products for protecting interests of the country's farmers, Food Minister Abdur Razzaque said yesterday.

"The marketing system of agricultural products is very weak in our country. This will be reorganised. A national commission comprised of agronomists and others concerned will be formed to ensure farmers' interests," he said while speaking as the chief guest at a seminar at Bangladesh Agriculture Research Council auditorium.

Bangladesh Agronomists Association organised the seminar titled "What type of budget we want for food security?"

# Govt moves to probe post-polls violence of 2001

The present government is actively considering formation of an enquiry commission to probe the 2001 post-elections violence and taking actions against the persons responsible for the violent incidents.

The government has informed this to the High Court (HC) through an affidavit in reply to its (HC) rule that came upon a writ petition challenging the inaction of the law enforcement agencies to prevent the criminal activities taking place immediately after the 8th parliamentary polls in 2001.

In the reply submitted to the HC through the attorney general's office on April 15, the government said the perpetrators of the alleged offences had the blessings of the government elected in 2001 polls and thereafter, an interim government ruled for

Though belated, the present government has taken up the matter for necessary action, it said.

According to the affidavit, the formation of a commission for investigation into the post-elections violence, including murder, rape, arson and grievous hurt, is under active consideration of the government.

In response to the writ petition filed by seven lawyers of Human Rights and Peace for Bangladesh (HRPB), the HC bench comprised of ABM Khairul Haque and Justice Md Abdul Hye on February 2 this year issued a rule upon the government to explain why it (government) should not be directed to form a judicial enquiry commission to probe the 2001 post-elections violence.

# Women representatives feel ignored

Female vice-chairmen of upazila parishads throughout the country could not begin their jobs even after four months of their election as the government is yet to issue any circular regarding the newly created posts.

The elected women representatives yesterday said at a programme in the city that even they have not been given any sitting arrangements at the upazila parishad offices while they are rarely allowed to play their role in development activities in their area.

They pointed out that the recently passed Upazila Parishad Bill also does not mention any guidelines for them.

Bangladesh Mahila Parishad organised a view-exchange meeting at the Biam audito-

rium yesterday to accord a reception to the female upazila vice chairpersons of the country. A total of 300 elected women were present on the occasion.

The additional post of vice-chairperson at the upazila parishads of the country has been created this year, exclusively for female candidates. Although the post is reserved for women, candidates are elected by direct voting.

Shamim Ara Dulari, an elected vice chairperson from Cox's Bazar, said, "I have not been able to take part in any of the development work in my area as there is no work plan for my post yet. There is also no sitting arrangement for me at the office."

Pakistani helicopter gunships and ground troops pounded Taliban fighters Saturday and Friday, killing up to 76 militants and destroying a dozen would-be suicide bombers in fierce fighting, the army said.

Troops on Saturday killed 16 militants in heavy fighting after Taliban militants attacked a security post in a tribal area near the Afghan border, killing two paramilitary soldiers, officials said.

## 2 murdered in city

Two people were killed and a BNP ward level leader sustained bullet wounds in separate incidents in the capital on Friday.

The deceased were Shafiqur Rahman, 30, of Jatrabari and Abu Bakkar alias Mollah, 70, of Turag, Tongi. The injured is Shamsul Haque Kabir, secretary of ward-8 unit of BNP in Shah Ali.

Police and family sources said Shafiqur Rahman sustained fatal injury when an electrician with his helper stabbed him in the throat with a screwdriver during an argument over payment. The incident took place at the victim's house around 1:00pm, they added.

Shafiqur was rushed to Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) where on duty doctors declared him dead, said police.

# 64 civilians killed in Lanka hospital attack

At least 64 civilians were killed and another 87 wounded yesterday in an attack on the last remaining medical facility inside rebel-held territory in northeastern Sri Lanka, a pro-rebel website reported.

Tamilnet.com said two shells fired by government forces hit the make-shift hospital at Mulliavaikal in the Mullaittivu district three days after its location was given to the military through the International Committee of the Red Cross. There was no immediate comment from the

ICRC, which has limited access to the combat zone, but the military denied targeting the area. "We have not carried out any shelling, but we heard some loud explosions inside the no-

He was later admitted to the hospital where he fell unconscious after ECG test and died at 2:15pm.
