


## Dhaka Sports in semis

A clinical Dhaka Sports Club raced to the semifinal of the Habib Group PCL Twenty20 tournament, beating Ispahani Sports Club by seven runs at the MA Aziz Stadium here yesterday.

Batting first, Dhaka Sports scored 137 for 8 in 20 overs and reply, Ispahani fell short thanks to Shahadat Hossain's match-winning two-wicket haul. The paceman took both the wickets in the 17th over of the innings, as Ispahani were restricted to 130 for 8 in 20 overs.

Dhaka Sports also had their Pakistani recruit Wasim Nayem to thank after the experienced performer in an all-round show.

Nayem first struck 42 off 43 balls that featured six boundaries and then picked up two wickets for 31 runs.

His opening partner and captain Rajin Saleh

was run out via a throw from Mahbubul Alam with the score on 22 as the two tried to force the pace.

Khaled Mashud also fell soon after, adding just 16 for the second wicket when Fazle Rabbi took a brilliant catch to get rid of the former national captain. Rabbi remained off the field for ten minutes to take medication for sustaining injury while taking the catch.

Wasim finally was dismissed in the 13th over to make his total 156 runs in three matches, the highest in the tournament.

Ziaur Rahman hit the second-highest score of 36 runs off 21 balls with four huge sixes that gave the final push to Dhaka Sports' innings.

Chasing the moderate target, Ispahani opener Shamsur Rahman and Fazle Rabbi added 44 runs in only 5.5 overs when the latter fell to Nayem.

Sri Lankan recruit Jeevan Mendis who was Ispahani's hero against the Dada Warriors, scored 35 from 33 balls with five boundaries.

Sahagir Hossain and Monir Hossain scored 15

## Derby Abahani's

Abahani came out on top in the local derby, beating Mohammedan Sporting Club

by 21 runs in the second match of the Habib Group PCL Twenty20 tournament at the MA Aziz Stadium here yesterday.

Though Abahani reached the semifinals stage before the match and Mohammedan are

already out of the tournament, the match created huge anticipation among the players and the viewers as well.

Batting first, Abahani reached 153 for eight in 20 overs before restricting Mohammedan for 132 for nine.

The most expensive player of the tournament and local hero Tamim Iqbal went back to the pavilion after making just 10 runs but Abahani's Sri Lankan recruit Chamara Silva led the team to seal the win with his 63 runs off 50 balls featuring six boundaries and a six.

Two-down batsman Silva stayed at the crease till the last over to push the score past the 150-mark. In the process of going for their runs, Abahani lost five wickets in the last seven balls.

National discard Hannan Sarker also hit a rapid 26-ball 36 that had a couple of sixes and three boundaries.

Chasing 154 runs for a face-saving victory, Mohammedan lost the first three wickets for just 18 runs in 4.4 overs.

That slimmed the hopes of Mohammedan but they recovered to 84 for four in 12.3 overs with a solid Qaisar Abbas hitting 41 off 38 balls that had four boundaries and a six.

Both Qaiser and Ishtiaq added 56 for the fourth wicket with the latter hitting 36 off 29 balls.

Nayyer Abbas also contributed 22 runs but finally his team could reach only 130 runs.

## Chennai win Kings battle

Kings XI Punjab made Chennai Super Kings really sweat in a spirited chase towards a Duckworth-Lewis revised target of 187, but when it mattered most tactical nuance won it for Chennai. Simon Katich had set the tone for Punjab's bravado and Yuvraj Singh and Mahela Jayawardene batted superbly in the face of adversity, adding 90 in just 8.5 overs under lights. Then, with 30 left to defend off 12 balls, MS Dhoni took pace off the ball by calling on Suresh Raina's part-time off-spin, and that six-run over provide definitive.

Chennai's big total was set up by Matthew Hayden's belligerent 89, either side of an hour-and-a-half's rain delay, and Dhoni's sparky 56

from 27 balls. Up against the strongest batting line-up in the tournament, they were pummeled into submission for the second match running.

Either side of an hour-and-a-half's rain delay, Matthew Hayden bludgeoned his third and most dismissive half-century of the IPL to biff Chennai Super Kings to 185 in 18 overs. Hayden was rude to Kings XI Punjab's bowlers from the time MS Dhoni opted to bat, but his assault after the rain hold-up was stunning, with Sreesanth feeling the brunt of his power. Punjab may have thought they'd done damage control by getting Suresh Raina shortly after play resumed, but Hayden and Dhoni, who walked in and smacked an unbeaten 56 from 27 balls, compounded their woes and then some. Pace has been Punjab's main bowling weapon, but the bowlers were taken to the cleaners by

## Onions inspires Eng

Fast bowler Graham Onions took five wickets, including three in an over, on his Test debut to leave the West Indies contemplating the prospect of defeat inside three days at Lord's on Thursday.

The tourists were made to follow-on after a dramatic second day collapse in the first of this two-Test series with England off-spinner Graeme Swann also having a day to remember.

On his home debut, he made a Test-best 63 not out and then sparked the tourists' slump with two wickets in two balls before tea, including the prize scalp of Shivnarine Chanderpaul for a golden duck.

West Indies were bowled out for 152 in reply to England's first innings 377, 26 runs shy of avoiding the follow-on, with openers Devon Smith (46) and captain Chris

Gayle (28) the only batsmen to make more than 17.

Durham quick Onions took five wickets for 38 runs in 9.3 overs to grab a place on the

bowlers' honours board at Lord's.

Before the close James Anderson took his first two

## Clubs demand BNS matches in WC 2011

A section of Dhaka Metropolis' clubs have demanded that the Bangabandhu National Stadium must host matches of the 2011 Cricket World Cup.

Bangladesh are set to host eight matches of the world's biggest cricket competition as well as the opening ceremony which is slated to be held at the Big Bowl.

Addressing a press conference yesterday at a local hotel, Mohammad Abid Hossain of Brothers Union Club said they would soon submit a memorandum to State Minister for Youth and Sports Md. Ali Sarker demanding necessary measures to hold all the matches of the next World Cup Cricket in Bangladesh quota at the Bangabandhu National Stadium.

## Rajasthan romp to top

Rajasthan Royals moved to the top of the Indian Premier League (IPL) table with a convincing seven-wicket win over Bangalore Royal Challengers, who looked out of depth as they were bowled out for 105 -- the tournament's second lowest total -- and conceded the win inside 15 overs at SuperSport Park in Centurion on Thursday. Naman Ojha scored his second consecutive half-century in the brief chase but the win was set up by Amit Singh and Ravindra Jadeja, who took seven Bangalore wickets to ensure a low target for their side.
