### National probe report likely in a day or two

The national probe committee on BDR carnage is likely to submit its report in the next few days.

Sources close to the probe committee told The Daily Star that the report is prepared to submit any time but some other formalities including binding the copies of the report has not yet been done.

"It will take a day or two to finish the work and the chairman of the committee would then submit the report to the home minister," said a source.

The government formed an 11-member national probe committee headed by former bureaucrat Anisuzzaman to investigate the bloody mutiny at Pikhana BDR headquarters on February 25-26.

The committee is comprised of serving bureaucrats and high-ranking officers from the army, navy and air force.

Besides, a 20-member army probe committee submitted its report to the chief of army staff on May 11.

## Rajuk set to falter on timeline, again

Rajdhani Unnayan Karttripakkha (Rajuk) may miss the deadline for allotment of plots at Purbachal New Town Project and Uttara Model Town (3rd Phase) by June due to non-completion of scrutiny of around 1.65 lakh applications submitted against over 7,000 plots.

Besides, Rajuk has missed the deadline (January this year) for starting handing over the plots, which were allotted in 2001-2005 under the two projects. It will take another six months for Uttara to start even the process while three months for Purbachal project, officials at Rajuk said.

Although State Minister for Housing and Public Works Abdul Mannan Khan earlier told The Daily Star that it would take two months to complete the total process of plot allotment since the last

date of application, the minister changed his stance due to huge submission of applications.

"Around 1.65 lakh applications were submitted under the two projects and two months is not enough to scrutinise and complete other process. But we are trying to do this as early as possible," said the minister.

An official at Rajuk said they received 1,64,644 applications under the two projects till April 30. Of them, 42,600 plot seekers are expatriate Bangladeshi. Around two lakh application forms were sold against around 6383 plots under Purbachal project and around 870 plots under Uttara (3rd phase), he said.

Rajuk sources said now 100 officials are working to scrutinise the applications though only 30 officials were assigned initially.

An uncertainty about allotting the

plots in a transparent way is still looming, as the authorities concerned are yet to fix any criterion for allotting the plots, sources said.

The state minister said they are yet to finalise the criteria of plot allotment but working to find out the best way to make it transparent.

On November 25, 2008, Rajuk sought application in 12 categories including MP, justice, journalist, government service holder, autonomous body, Armed Forces, artist/sportsman, businessman and private service holder. The authorities later extended the time twice which ended on April 30.

Chairman of Rajuk Md Nurul Huda said they would engage the experts of Bangladesh University of Engineering Technology to complete the job as early as possible.

## Bombing, US strike kill 36 in Pakistan

A car bomb destroyed an Internet cafe and tore through a bus carrying handicapped children in northwestern Pakistan yesterday, killing at least 11 people and wounding many more, police said.

Elsewhere in the troubled region, an apparent US missile strike destroyed a Taliban training camp, killing 25 militants, while Pakistani troops killed dozens of Taliban in their bid to reconquer the Swat Valley, officials said.

Violence is engulfing Pakistani territory along the Afghan border as American and allied forces crank up the pressure on al-Qaeda and Taliban militants entrenched in the forbidding and barely governed mountains and valleys.

Washington and other nations are pouring in billions of dollars in aid and military assistance to prop up the pro-Western government in Islamabad, which on Saturday sought to allay concerns that its nuclear weapons could fall into extremist hands.

The car bomb devastated a street in the main northwestern city of Peshawar on Saturday afternoon as it was busy with shoppers and traffic.

Television images showed several vehicles burning fiercely and a stricken white-and-green bus that had been dropping handi-

capped children at their homes around the city.

The eight students still on board were injured, one seriously, medics and police said. Four other children and seven adults were killed, and dozens more were injured, they said.

Safwat Ghayur, a senior police official, said one of a string of shops wrecked by the blast was an Internet cafe—a favorite target for violent Islamist extremists in Pakistan who consider the Web a source of moral corruption.

Ghayur said the cafe had received several threats and even been attacked recently by gunmen. He said police were holding suspects in the shooting, but refused to elaborate.

It was unclear if any of the victims had been in the cafe or if it was the intended target. No group immediately claimed responsibility.

Militants have threatened more attacks in Pakistan in retaliation for dozens of American missile attacks on their strongholds in Pakistan's tribal areas.

In the latest strike, Pakistani officials said several missiles hit a religious school and a nearby vehicle on Saturday morning in Mir Ali, a town in the North Waziristan tribal region.

Two intelligence officials, citing reports from agents in the field, said at least 25 people were killed, including two foreign militants, and dozens more were wounded.

## CORRUPTION IN JS Speaker expects good gesture from the trio

Speaker Abdul Hamid yesterday expressed hope that former speaker Jamiruddin Sircar, former deputy speaker Akhtar Hamid Siddiqui and former chief whip Khandaker Delwar Hossain will return the money they took illegally against medical bills before the probe body submits its report in parliament.

The next parliamentary session is likely to start on June 4 and the next budget may be placed in the House on June 11, he told reporters after attending the inaugural programme of the biennial conference of television producers in the city.

Citing examples of the British parliament where many lawmakers have started returning money they illegally received, he said it would not be unusual if the same thing comes to the minds of Sircar, Akhtar Hamid and Delwar—if they realise that the money they received from parliament as medical bills was illegal.

### GENOCIDE IN 1971 Dhaka insists on Pak apology

Bangladesh has reiterated its demand for Pakistan's apology for its troops' genocides during 1971 Liberation War as Islamabad dismissed Dhaka's fresh insistence on saying sorry for the atrocities.

"There is no need for back and forth allegations or exchange of statements, we have not changed our position," Foreign Secretary Mohammad Touhid Hossain told BSS yesterday.

The comments came two days after Pakistan's foreign office declined to apologize for the atrocities saying the issue was settled under a tripartite agreement between the two countries and India in 1974.

### Govt pledges action against extra-judicial killings

UNB, Dhaka

Commerce Minister Lt Col (ret'd) Faruk Khan yesterday said the government would investigate all the extrajudicial killings taken place in the past, as it does not favour such incidents.

"The government is completely against extrajudicial killings and it is determined to prevent such incidents," he told a function marking the first anniversary of Saptahik, a Bangla weekly.

He said the government is aware about extrajudicial killings and it would take measures whether such incidents are taking place now. "If it is found, the government will investigate it and take proper steps."

Replying to a question, he

## India confirms first swine flu case

AFP, Geneva

The number of confirmed swine flu cases has soared again to top 8,000, the World Health Organisation said yesterday as India and Turkey reported their first infections.

Japan also confirmed its first three infections among teenage students who had not picked up the virus abroad, and officials voiced fears that it would spread in the country.

The number of people killed by the influenza A(H1N1) virus rose to 72, compared with 65 on Friday, with six more in Mexico and one in the United States, the WHO said.

Over the past week the number of people infected by the virus has risen sharply, going up by around 1,000 a day since Monday to reach 8,451 on Saturday.

The United States, followed by Mexico, where the epidemic began some three weeks ago, have recorded the highest number of cases. Two new countries, Ecuador and Peru, have been added to the WHO's official list.

India confirmed its first swine flu case after a 23-year-old man who had flown to Hyderabad from New York tested positive for the virus.

He had returned to India on Wednesday and was quarantined
