The England-bound national cricketers warmed up well with a comfortable 63-run victory against Maharashtra Cricket ball22thatcontainedthreefours and asix. Association in the first T20 match at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur yesterday.

The most encouraging factor for the Tigers, who are scheduled to fly for England on May 23 to take part in the ICC Twenty 20 World Cup, however was that they could finish the match despite heavy cloud hovering over during the match.

Shakib Al Hasan returned to full action as the left-hander took up the bat after a long break and made 16 off 12 balls including a massive mid-wicket six against Kiran Adhav before he was dismissed on the very next ball at long-off. The left-arm spinner later returned figures of 3-17.

"I batted after a long break and it takes a bit of time to get back the full confidence. I am hopeful everything will be okay because there are a number of practice matches before the start of the World Cup," said the world's number one all-rounder, who was out of action for the last few months due to groin injury.

It was however Mahmudullah Riyad who hogged the spotlight as the right-hander's

unbeaten 34-ball 40 enabled the local side, who played the match under the banner of BCB XI, post 150-8 in their share of 20 overs.

Southpaw opening pair of Tamim Iqbal and Zunaed Siddiqui made a solid start after being put in to bat as they added 37 runs in four overs before the latter was bowled by Srikant Mundhe for a 13-

Tamim quickly followed his partner as the Chittagonian flicked Ranjit Chauhan only to reach the safe hands of Kedar Jadhav at square leg for 15 off 13 balls.

BCB XI were well placed at 72 for four in 10 overs, and Riyad and Nayeem Islam, who added a 10-ball 19 with a four and six, helped them reach a reasonable total.

In reply, Maharashtra were bundled out for 87 runs in 17.1 overs as Shakib and spinner Naveem shared six wickets.

Nayeem took three for 20 runs in four overs. The visitors however were not disappointed with the result.

"It's just our second foreign trip after we had played in Sri Lanka last year. We are happy that we got a good opponent to play," said 20-yearold skipper Harshad Khadiwale.

Graham Onions took two wickets in three balls as England moved closer to winning the second and final Test against the West Indies here at the Riverside on Sunday.

The tourists, following on, were 115 for three in reply to England's first innings 569 for six declared at stumps on the fourth day.

That left them still needing a further 144 runs just to make England bat again on Monday's final day with the hosts now all but assured of regaining the Wisden Trophy they'd lost in the Caribbean earlier this year after their 10wicket win in last week's series opener at Lord's.

Onions, who at Lord's took seven wickets on Test debut, removed first innings centurymaker Ramnaresh Sarwan for 22, the batsman plumb lbw as he shuffled across the crease.

Two balls later the Durham quick gave his home crowd something else to celebrate when he had West Indies captain Chris Gayle caught at first slip by England skipper Andrew Strauss for a blistering

Left-handed opener Gayle, who in the build-up to this match made no secret of his preference for Twenty20 as opposed to Test cricket, had blazed away as if this were a one-day game, his fifty com-

sixes and six fours. Key batsman Shivnarine

Delhi's ninth win

Delhi Daredevils breezed past Rajasthan Royals as they won by 14 runs in their IPL encounter at the OUTsurance Oval in

Bloemfontein last night.

Batting first in chilly conditions, Delhi banked on AB de Villiers and Tillakaratne Dilshan to post 150 for three from their 20 overs, and went on to restrict Royals for 136-9 in 20 overs.

de Villiers struck eight boundaries and a six in a brilliant 55-ball unbeaten 79. He was well supported by Dilshan, who made 33 off 41 as they added 87 for the third wicket. Wicketkeeper-batsman Dinesh Karthik then added an 11-ball 23. Karthik and de Villiers added 48 for the fourth wicket.

Out of the three wickets that fell, Munaf Patel took two and offspinner Johan Botha had one. Patel was the best bowler on show for the the defending champions.

Royals, also taking a stunning return catch to get rid of Gautam Gambhir who continued his ordinary run with the bat scoring just eight.

Royals were always struggling in the face of Delhi's four-pronged pace attack. Openers Rob Quiney (6) and Graeme Smith (0) both holed out to the third-man fence before Naman Ojha scratched around for his nine.

Ojha's departure saw Botha and Ravinder Jadeja add 45 for the fourth wicket but that didn't add impetus to the innings as both departed soon after.

The Royals almost gave up when their trump card Yusuf Pathan was out for one when he edged a Farveez Maharoof delivery.

Ashish Nehra, Dirk Nannes, Maharoof and Avishkar Salvi took advantage of the cold conditions while leggie Amit Mishra picked up three easy wickets when the run-rate reached twelve an over.

Patel smashed three boundaries in the final over from Nannes but it was too little too late for

PCB pitches 2 options

Pakistan has put forward two options as it strives to retrieve what benefits it still can from the 2011 World Cup. In a meeting with Sri Lanka board counterparts, Ijaz Butt, the Pakistan board chairman, suggested a swap for World Cups or for the subcontinent boards to jointly ask the ICC to allow Pakistan to present alternate solutions.

The first option - swapping the 2011 World Cup, which is to be jointly hosted now by India, Sri Lanka and Bangladesh, for the 2015 edition to be held in Australia and New Zealand - was put forth by former ICC president Ehsan Mani, who is advising the PCB on the World Cup. The with four others in the 8th ICC had stripped Pakistan of its rights to cohost the 2011 World Cup following the terrorist attack in Lahore when gunmen attacked the Sri Lankan team bus. The PCB responded by serving a legal notice to the ICC for its decision to move the World Cup headquarters from Lahore

DS de Silva, the SLC chairman, said he would stand by any decision made at the ICC meeting in Dubai though he would discuss the PCB's options with the rest of the interim committee members and get back to the PCB accordingly. The SLC will also wait for feedback from India and Bangladesh, with whom Butt will also meet on this diplomatic tour before taking a final decision on the World Cup options.

Butt put forward the same argument that forms the basis of the PCB's legal notice to the ICC; that the uncertain security situation in the entire subcontinent, following the terror attacks in Mumbai and Lahore, poor political relations between India and Pakistan and the slow pace of preparations for the World Cup indicated the subcontinent was not prepared to host the tournament in another two years. It is believed that this is option is unlikely to win backing among the co-hosts.

In the event of that option failing, Pakistan wants the Asian bloc to ask the ICC to provide them with an opportunity to provide alternate solutions on their internal security problems. This may, as some in the PCB have already SEE PAGE 18 COL 5 | Foyaz Ahmed.

Nurul Alam resigns

Nurul Alam Chowdhury has resigned from his post as deputy chairman of the National Team Management Committee of Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF) following differences with the committee's chairman Badal Roy.

In a letter to BFF president Kazi Salahuddin, Alam expressed his disgruntlement with Badal Roy's transparency but stated that it was not the only reason for his sudden resignation.

"The chairman of the national team's committee (Badal Roy) is not transparent with his work and I don't see myself working under him in the foreseeable future. The committee is a very experienced one and it is certainly not being used to its full potential," said Alam.

He also pointed that too much power has been given to the national coach and that his selection process was a matter of dispute between him and Badal.

"I believe that the current coach of the national team has too much say over team selection," added Nurul Alam.

"He should be made one of the parties to team selection and we as experienced football administrators must have a role otherwise what is the SEE PAGE 18 COL 5

Habibul Bashar was the first to come forward to take the opportunity of "amnesty" announced by the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) for the players who joined the unauthorised Indian Cricket League (ICL).

The former national skipper submitted a letter to BCB president Lt Gen Sina Ibn Jamali yesterday mentioning that he wanted to avail the 'amnesty" to come back to the main stream.

"I gave a letter to the board president but I will disclose the details tomorrow [Monday]. What I can only say that I took my own deci-

sion," said Bashar without elaborating. BCB's media committee chairman Jalal Yunus was however not only admitted that they

received a letter from Bashar but also revealed the details of the letter.

"He [Habibul Bashar] has given a letter to the board president today (Sunday) where he mentioned that he had also sent a letter to the ICL authority asking them to terminate his contract. He wants to avail the board's amnesty as the ICC [International Cricket Council] has imposed ban on all the players associated with the unapproved competition," said Yunus.

"He also said that he was available for Bangladesh cricket. We welcomed his decision and expect that others will follow his foot-

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Yuvraj leads Punjab

Yuvraj Singh grabbed a hattrick to bowl Kings XI Punjab to a vital one-run victory over Deccan Chargers in an Indian Premier League

match here on Sunday. The left-arm spinner finished with 3-13 off four overs as Punjab restricted Deccan to 133-8 in a thrilling last-over finish after posting 134-7 to keep alive their hopes of qualifying for the

semifinals. Deccan needed 11 to win off the last over, but left-arm seamer Irfan Pathan conceded only nine to build on man-of-the-match Yuvraj's effort. Pathan also claimed two wickets, including that of Rohit Sharma.

Sharma sustained Deccan's hopes with a quickfire 42 before being bowled. He smashed

three sixes and as many fours in his 26-ball knock.

There was no hint of collapse after Deccan reached 73-2 chasing a modest target, but Yuvraj dismissed Herschelle Gibbs, Andrew Symonds and Venugopal Rao off successive balls.
