



# Risky lending ups defaulted loans

Sluggish business also seen as reason for 5pc increase in Jan-Mar period

In the first three months of the current year, defaulted loans of the banks increased by Tk 1,067 crore or five percent mainly due to risky lending, sluggish business activities and seasonal factors.

On March 31, the banks' defaulted loans stood at Tk 23,584 crore compared to Tk 22,481 crore in December last year.

According to Bangladesh Bank (BB) statistics, the state-owned banks' (SOBs) defaulted loans increased by Tk 495 crore or four percent and those of private commer-

cial banks by Tk 547 crore or 10 percent.

But defaulted loans of foreign commercial banks remained unchanged over the last three months while those of specialised banks increased slightly.

A top official of Agrani Bank said the rise in defaulted loans in the first three months of the year is due to seasonal factors. In December, the banks launch massive drive for recovery of loans by the year end, and slacken the drive after December, he mentioned.

And a high official of Sonali Bank claimed that due to the global meltdown

many businessmen are deferring repayment of their bank loans. The banks are also putting less pressure so that businesses are not hampered, he said.

A Bangladesh Bank official however said besides these causes, risky lending by the banks led to a rise in defaulted loans.

Normally banks are expected to limit their lending to 80 per cent of their deposits. But many banks went for lending above 90 percent, and some for even above 100 percent of their deposits, he said.

Loans to unproductive sector have

# Japan closes 4,000 schools for swine flu

178 infections confirmed

Japan reported 178 swine flu infections yesterday and closed more than 4,000 schools, colleges and kindergartens for the rest of the week to slow the spread of the virus, officials said.

Experts warned that infections had probably already spread to other regions including the capital Tokyo, which with almost 36 million people is the world's most populous urban area and the heart of the Japanese economy.

"The virus's spread to Tokyo is near certain, and it would be little wonder if the virus had already landed in Tokyo undetected," said Yukihiko Nishiyama, a virologist at Nagoya University in central Japan.

"Of course, there is no need to overreact, but authorities and people in the capital should go ahead with their preparation," Nishiyama told AFP.

Visitors to many public places -- from the parliamentary visitors' gallery to the national

sumo tournament in Tokyo -- have been asked to disinfect their hands on entry, wear surgical face masks, or both.

Japan's first domestic cases of the (A)H1N1 virus were confirmed Saturday in the western cities of Kobe and Osaka, where they spread quickly in and between two high schools that had met for a volleyball tournament.

Hundreds have since been tested for the virus, and face masks have become ubiquitous on subways and in shopping centres of the affected prefectures of Osaka and Hyogo in the central region of the main island of Honshu.

The government has urged calm and reminded people that no one in Japan has so far died of the disease and that most infections are mild.

A total of 4,043 kindergartens, schools, colleges and universities were closed for at least this week in the two prefectures at the request of the government, up from some 2,000 Monday, an education ministry official said.

## Maya sent to jail on surrender

Former state minister for shipping and Awami League (AL) leader Mofazzal Hossain Chowdhury Maya and Munshiganj district unit AL president Mohammad Mohiuddin were sent to jail after they surrendered before a Dhaka court yesterday and sought bail in two separate graft cases.

Another Dhaka court sent former AL lawmaker Alhaj Mokbul Hossain's son Masudur Rahman to jail on his surrender in connection with a graft case.

Judge (in-charge) Mozammel Hossain of the Special Court-5 passed the order rejecting the bail of both Maya and Mohiuddin when the two appeared before the court.

Moving the bail petitions, their lawyers told the court that their clients were earlier sentenced to different terms in jail in absentia and later had

## Nat'l ID cards to be made must for all

Meeting finalises machine readable passport work plan

National identity (ID) cards would be made compulsory for every citizen of the country by amending the citizenship act, said Finance Minister AMA Muhith yesterday.

"If necessary laws will be amended to make national ID cards compulsory because laws are for the people's welfare," he told reporters after a meeting with Home Minister Sahara Khatun and State Minister for Home Affairs Tanjin

Ahmad Sohel Taj at the home ministry.

Muhith also hinted that in future none would be able to claim citizenship of Bangladesh without the national ID card and Tax Identification Number (TIN) would also not be given without it.

The meeting with Sahara in the chair was held to finalise the work plan on launching the Machine-Readable Passport (MRP) and Machine-Readable Visa (MRV) projects.

## 2 women killed Youth missing after brutal murder

Two young women were brutally murdered and another was injured in city's Khilgaon area in the early hours yesterday.

Police are on the look for a young man who identified himself as a brother of one of the victims and spent the night in the house, but fled after the killings.

The deceased were identified as two cousins, Halima Akther, 20 and Shanta Islam Moyna, 22. The injured woman Kohinur Nesa Brishti, under going treatment at Dhaka Medical College Hospital at present, was their flatmate.

All three girls were the tenants of a two-room house on the second floor of a four-storey building owned by Abu Taher in Sipahibagh Bazar in Khilgaon.

Police identified Shanta as an employee of Noman Fashion at DIT Road in Malibagh while Halima worked at a beauty parlour. Brishti worked in a private clinic, police said.

Brishti said, a young man identifying himself as Shanta's brother Reza, came to the house on Monday evening. He stayed with Shanta and Halima who shared a room in the house while Brishti occupied the other.

"I woke up at around 3:00 am on hearing screams in the room next door. When I rushed there, I found Shanta and Halim's slaughtered bodies. There was also stab marks all over their bodies," Brishti said.

## Cong picks Manmohan to lead again

Newly elected Congress lawmakers formally chose Prime Minister Manmohan Singh as their leader for a second term yesterday, clearing the way for the swearing in of his new government this week.

Sonia Gandhi, the Congress Party chief, proposed Singh's name, and lawmakers approved it without a vote amid clapping and the thumping of desks, said party spokesman Janardhan Dwivedi.

Singh is expected to meet President Pratibha Patil on Wednesday to set a date for his swearing in. The president administers the oath of office to the new prime minister and Cabinet ministers.
