Lanka dismisses threat of war crime charges

24,000 soldiers killed in long conflict with LTTE

Sri Lanka's President Mahinda Rajapakse yesterday brushed off calls for an investigation into alleged war crimes committed by government troops in their offensive against Tamil Tiger rebels.

There are some who tried to stop our military campaign by threatening to haul us before war crimes tribunals," Rajapakse said in a speech to tens of thousands of supporters outside the national parliament.

"They are still trying to do that, but I am not afraid," the president said.

"The strength I have is your support. I am even ready to go to the gallows on your

behalf."

Sri Lankan Army lost nearly 24,000 personnel in its three-decade long conflict with the LTTE rebels, including over 6,200 in the latest offensive which began in late 2006, a senior official said yesterday. Defence secretary Gotabhaya Rajapaksa, said the Army paid a heavy price in militarily vanquishing the LTTE. The final offensive began in August 2006 with the troops retaking a Tiger seized irrigation canal.

"Since then the security force, including the Army, Navy, the Air force, police and the civil defence force have lost 6,261 soldiers killed and 29,551 wounded,"

Rajapaksa, brother of President Mahinda Rajapaksa was quoted as saying by the state TV. "We made huge sacrifices for this victory," he said. The total number of troops killed since 1981 when the offensive began was 23,790, he added.

The United Nations has estimated that nearly 100,000 people may have been killed in the near four-decades long ethnic conflict in Sri Lanka. The Defence Secretary, however did not give the casualty of the LTTE cadres killed in the conflict.

The Tamil Tigers had late last year admitted that they had lost over 22,000 cadres in its fight against the Sri Lankan

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Season change could spread swine flu in Asia-Pacific: WHO

The virus to hit the poorest harder

The change of seasons in the Asia-Pacific region could make it easier for swine flu to spread, World Health Organisation (WHO) officials warned yesterday.

"The southern hemisphere is about to enter its influenza season," officials at the WHO Western Pacific office said, warning that the factors that contribute toward the spread of (ordinary seasonal) influenza will also enable the spread of A(H1N1)."

The greater prevalence of ordinary flu will also make it harder to detect swine flu, said the officials in a briefing at the WHO regional office in the Philippines.

WHO infectious diseases expert Julie Hall warned that vaccines against seasonal influenza did not appear to protect people from A(H1N1).

Some Asian countries are better equipped to deal with an outbreak of swine flu, thanks to precautions taken during SARS and bird flu alerts over the last few years, Hall said.

"The health systems are a lot stronger than before. The investment that went into preparing for bird flu and SARS are starting to yield the benefits," she said.

However she warned that SARS and bird flu were different from influenza A(H1N1) as bird flu was less likely to infect humans while SARS was spread mainly by people who were already showing symptoms.

In contrast, A(H1N1) can be spread by people who do not appear to be infected, she said. She also cautioned that the new virus was

infecting mainly young people, the largest demographic in some Asian countries.
