The Olympiad will be held at divisional and national levels in two groups - junior group (from class VI-VIII) and secondary group (class IX-X), said Prof Mohammad Kaykobad, coordinator of Science Olympiad 2009-2010, at a press conference at National Press Club in the city

yesterday. At the divisional level, the Olympiad will be held on the second Friday of December every year while National Science Olympiad will be held on second Friday of January the following year, he said.



Auditing taxpayers' files starts after couple of years

The National Board of Revenue (NBR) has started auditing the taxpayers' files after a lapse of a couple of years.

The government in the budget for fiscal 2006-07 curtailed the discretionary powers of the Deputy Commissioners of Tax (DCTs) to ask anything about the file of an individual taxpayer as the universal self-assessment system was adopted.

Under the system, there was a provision for auditing tax files, but the DCTs had to take prior permission from the NBR in this regard after submitting proper documents.

As the process was found complicated, the DCTs showed their reluctance to submit documents in favour of audit.

"But the DCTs found out that many individual taxpayers were evading taxes under the self-assessment system and that's why they've started applying to the NBR to audit individual tax files," an NBR official told UNB.

He said some DCTs identi-

individual taxpayers are evading taxes taking advantage of the universal self-assessment system.

"They've identified many people who had long been paying reasonable amount of tax regularly suddenly started paying less amount of tax."

When these incidents were brought to the notice of NBR higher authorities, the DCTs were given permission to audit the dubious tax files.


Currently, there are around 8 lakh people paying taxes although the number of taxpayers' identification numbers (TINs) is more than 24 lakh.

"NBR now wants to increase the income tax base as well as boost the revenue collection from the existing taxpayers. To generate more revenues from the existing taxpayers, the NBR has no option other than conducting audit in the income tax files," he said.

Finance Minister AMA Muhith recently-hinted-that the revenue target for fiscal 2009-10 would not be less than fied that a good number of Tk60,000 crore.

Devotees, police clash at Keraniganj 20 injured

At least 20 people, including three policemen, were injured in a clash between police and devotees at South Keraniganj on the outskirts of the capital over recovering grabbed land of a mosque.

Witnesses said over 500 Muslim devotees from four to five nearby mosques went to Kaliganj Bazar Baro Masjid area after Juma prayers to recover a piece of its land grabbed by a group of people for constructing a market.

As devotees tried to break down some shops near the grabbed land, police prevented them from doing it and the clash ensued.

"We resorted to baton charge when the devotees vandalised seven to eight shops near the mosque. At one stage, devotees hurled stones at police, leaving three policemen injured," said Nirutpal Dey, officer-in-charge of Dakkhin Keraniganj police station.

"The mosque is around 50 years old. Grabbers have been trying to grab the land of the mosque over the years. Some locals managed to grab it by erecting a wall with the help of mosque caretaker Harun-ur Rashid on May 22 this year," said Mukter Hossain, a devotee who resides beside the mosque.
