Despite their unimpressive credentials, the New Zealand World Twenty20 squad are talking boldly from their camp at Sir John Paul Getty's palatial

estate on the outskirts of London. "A lot of thought has gone into the preparation for this tournament and we hope that it will be rewarded," coach Andy Moles said.

If the just-completed Indian Premier League (IPL) series is any yardstick that is a big hope, but then New Zealand takes the view that the shorter the game the more level the playing field. Ranked eighth in Test cricket and leaping to

fourth in ODIs, New Zealand sees opportunity in

the blossoming Twenty20 version of the game -even if none of its seven players in the IPL tournament performed with real distinction. Ross Taylor of the Bangalore Royal Challengers -- the beaten finalists -- was the

best of the stroke makers but his average 31.11 only ranked him 15th in the tournament. Kyle Mills was on the Mumbai Indian payroll but not used at all while the rest of the New

Zealand contingent fell somewhere between Taylor and Mills with largely non-descript performances from limited appearances. But the failure of the cream of New Zealand's cricket crop to set the IPL alight did not bother

Twenty20. "The nature of the beast which is the Twenty20 game is very hit and miss," Turner said, adding that even net practice at the IPL was better than "sitting at home in the winter Zealand.

Notwithstanding the IPL performances, an upbeat Moles maintained New Zealand deserved to be ranked as potential champions given that the hit-and-hope nature of Twenty20 reduced the talent difference between sides.

"We have plenty of match-winners with bat and ball; it's a matter of them performing as consistently as possible. This is our strongest squad so there are no excuses," he said.

Moles is promising New Zealand will be "very aggressive" in the tournament, and one area which could prove vital is their renowned fielding, where accuracy can go some way towards compensating for batting and bowling shortfalls.

There could even be a lift from the pride of playing for country instead of IPL cash, although a recent survey of New Zealand's top cricketers showed 45 percent now see an IPL contract as the pinnacle of world cricket.

But the bottom line is that the senior players who failed to impress at the IPL who will have to find a sudden burst of form to lead the way. In addition to Taylor, Brendon McCullum

was showing signs of class with the bat towards the end of the IPL although his Kolkata Knight Riders finished last.

However, the remainder of the New Zealand contingent -- Jesse Ryder, Jacob Oram, Daniel Vettori and Scott Styris, were relegated to being spare parts contributors.

Of the balance of the squad Iain O'Brien, James Franklin, Ian Butler and Peter McGlashan have been playing in England while Brendon Diamanti, Nathan McCullum, Neil Broom and Martin Guptill remained in New

Chance to end drought

uncomfortable truth.

world South Africa haven't won a major international tournament in more than a decade.

The World Twenty20 in England provides another opportunity to end the drought.

The offices of Cricket South Africa have cabinets gleaming with trophies from successful bilateral series and several triangular or quadrangular tournaments.

But the only International Cricket Council honour remains the ICC Knockout trophy, now known as the ICC Champions Trophy, which South Africa won in Bangladesh in 1998. "We've been number one in the one-day

game, close to number one in the Test arena and it's a bit frustrating that we haven't got any silverware," said Procter.

"So we're taking the World Twenty20 very seriously. It's a World Cup and we want to win it."

Planning for the tournament began in earnest when South Africa picked a 15-man squad for two Twenty20 internationals against Australia in March.

All 15 men played in at least one game but for Procter it was equally important that the players, including some experimental selections, spent time with national coach Mickey Arthur and captain Graeme Smith in a squad environment, "so it won't be a judgment just on a particular game".

Thirteen of that squad will be in England, including two of the relative unknowns who were tried against Australia, left-arm pace

bowler Yusuf Abdulla and slow bowling allrounder Roelof van der Merwe.

The core of the side, though, have a wealth of experience and most of the key players had successful campaigns in the recent Indian Premier League, including veteran all-rounder Jacques Kallis, whose Royal Challengers Bangalore team reached the final.

Kallis won a Twenty20 recall after being con-For all their success on the cricket fields of the troversially left out of the side that played in the inaugural world event in South Africa in 2007.

The history of South Africa in world events is one of near-misses, none more heart-breaking than their tied match against Australia in the 1999 World Cup semi-final in England which eliminated the tournament favourites on run rate.

Another tied game, against Sri Lanka in the 2003 World Cup in South Africa, meant elimination at the group stage, again on run rate.

In the first World Twenty20, South Africa won four out of five matches but their single loss, against eventual champions India, condemned them to yet another run rate dismissal after India, New Zealand and the Proteas finished in a triple tie on points in their Super Eight group.

With quick-scoring batsmen like Smith, Herschelle Gibbs, AB de Villiers and JP Duminy, and hard-hitting all-rounders in Albie Morkel, wicketkeeper Mark Boucher and Van der Merwe, agile fielders and some capable bowlers, coach Arthur is confident South Africa have a team well-equipped to succeed.

"Whether the conditions suit pace or slow bowling, I believe we can field a team with seven possible bowlers and batting down to number ten," said Arthur.

But as hosts and close-up witnesses of the extravagances of the Indian Premier League, South Africa are painfully aware of the unpredictability of Twenty20 cricket where one bad over can cost a team its chance of glory.

Security stops Lankans from going to Oxford

Less than three months after their team bus came under terrorist gunfire in Lahore, members of the Sri Lankan cricket team have withdrawn from a scheduled visit to Oxford due to security concerns.

Muttiah Muralitharan, Kumar Sangakkara and team manager Brendon Kuruppu informed the Oxford Union debating society on Friday they feared a backlash after a front-page story in the Times in which it was claimed that 20,000 Tamil civilians had been killed in recent hostilities between government troops and LTTE.

The Sri Lankans arrived in England this week ahead of the World Twenty20; their first international assignment since the attack outside the Gadaffi Stadium, which claimed the lives of eight herall-actionstyle, but seldoma security and transport personnel and wounded seven players and coaching staff. Murali, who is himself a Tamil, had been due, along with Sangakkara and Kuruppu, to deliver an oration at the Oxford Union - following in the footsteps of US presidents and other heads of state - but the visit was scrapped due to uneasiness over security arrangements.

Kuruppu, the former Sri Lankan wicketkeeper who is now the team's manager, told Cricinfo that after reading the newspaper article, the team management had decided not to take any chances. The Sri Lankan government has denied the Tamil civilian death toll quoted in the frontpage report.

"It is nothing alarming, Kuruppu said. "We just don't want to take chances."

"Especially here in France, I think they always love the underdog, and they always love the one that comes back from behind, or the one that's not expected to win. I'm probably that person."

Sharapova admits that the 10 months she sat on the sidelines have given her a new perspective on life allowing her to enjoy new experiences and take some time away from the spotlight.

But she says that the time was ripe for her return to competition and she is determined to make the most out of it no matter how it goes.

"I'm full of surprises. I surprise myself on a daily basis," she said.

"I'll tell you, just when you think you've seen everything, I manage to just shock everyone. Just ask a member of my month injury layoff to deal

"I think coming into Warsaw and coming into this tournament, it's all really a test
