Eviction drive hamstrung

Constraints, poor coordination need to be solved for effectiveness

The ongoing eviction drive against encroachment on the rivers slows down due to manifold constraints and lack of proper coordination among the agencies concerned.

Though Gazipur district administration asked for 200 labourers every day, Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority (BIWTA) provides only 50 to 100.

The drive suffered on the very first day due to slack coordination and directions, said Assistant Commissioner (land) in Gazipur Atul Sarkar.

Experts call upon the agencies involved to sit together before embarking on further drives and seriously determine how to carry out the demolition, restoration and demarcation.

Abul Bashar Md Ameer Uddin, senior assistant commissioner, Gazipur, said, "The drive faltered as BIWTA could not mobilise its stronger tugboats to knock down illegal heavy structures."

Heavy pieces of equipment are required to remove structures built with RCC construction, said Ameer, adding they now depend mainly on labourers.

Md Abdul Bashar, BIWTA joint director, said as the drive slows down, it is costing additional resources and work hours.

Besides lack of resources, stay orders from the High Court also put a bar on the authorities concerned from demolishing a number of illegal structures.

Prof Mujibur Rahman of civil engineer department, Buet, said mere removal of superstructures would not help achieve the goal if the government works in an uncoordinated way and without a long-term vision.

Part of two RMG units knocked down

Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority (BIWTA) and Narayanganj district administration yesterday demolished portions of two multi-storied garments factories built illegally on the river Shitalakhyা in Narayanganj.

As part of the ongoing drive against river grabbers, the eviction team knocked down parts of a five-storey building owned by Khandker Sharif Uddin.

The team also completed dismantling a section of a seven-storey garments factory owned by Shanewaz at Tanbaraz.

The drive resumed in the morning for the fourth day under the supervision of Executive Magistrate Abul Kashem and BIWTA Deputy Director Alamgir Kabir.

A BIWTA Employees Union leader was out to save the building from demolition, as the owner of the building is his relative, said our Narayanganj correspondent.

Alamgir said that around

UN slaps tough new sanctions on N Korea

Pyongyang responds with plutonium threat

The UN Security Council has imposed tough new sanctions on North Korea, punishing the country for its second nuclear test.

Pyongyang responded to the resolution yesterday by vowing to "weaponise" all its plutonium and will consider any blockade "an act of war."

The Security Council agreed Friday to expand an arms embargo and authorise ship searches on the high seas, with the goal of derailing the isolated nation's nuclear and missile programmes.

56 indigenous families evicted

Goons pounce on them since Friday; police silent


Hired goons of a BNP adherent evicted at least 74 families, including 56 Indigenous families, from their land in a series of attacks at Khatirpur in Porsha upazila of Naogaon to grab their land.

Allegedly backed by local police, they made the series of attacks between Friday evening and yesterday morning to evict the families.

They beat up members of indigenous families, ransacked and torched their houses Friday evening and finally looted their household items, bullock carts and human hauliers yesterday morning.

According to the victims, around 200 armed goons of Nur

Killing spate scales up sense of insecurity

Alarming number of murder incidents in last few days attest to the deterioration of law and order in the city triggering a sense of insecurity among the citizens.

Despite special anti-crime drives from May 13 at least 15 people were killed in the first nine days of June while the number was 20 last month.

Apparently Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP) is unable to cope with the ever-

increasing crime incidents due to inadequate number of patrol teams and negligence in duty of some officers at check-posts and during patrol.

DMP sources said there are around 435 snatching-prone areas in the city while DMP has arranged about 275 police patrol teams—an average of five teams for each police station.

Moreover about 40 gangs of car lifters and around 300 members of dope gangs are active in the capital.
