ANTI-ENCROACHMENT DRIVE 4 big structures on Shitalakhya knocked down

On the eighth day of the ongoing eviction drive against encroachers, portions of four big structures on the Shitalakhya at Narayanganj were pulled down yesterday.

Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority (BIWTA) and Narayanganj district administration jointly carried out the drive.

Meanwhile, BIWTA and Dhaka district administration will launch a similar drive against river grabbers in the river Turag at Amin Bazar in Dhaka this morning.

On-duty Executive Magistrate Abul Kashem of Narayanganj said, "We resumed the drive with demolition of four large-sized structures simultaneously."

The officials on Tuesday had to make fresh marking on a six-storey Chand Flour Mills, as the earlier marking to denote encroachment was altered to evade demolition.

Abdul Matin, chairman of Alirtek Union Parishad and owner of Chand Flour Mills earlier sought two days from authorities to pull down the structure himself.

The time ended yesterday and now the authorities will serve a fresh notice upon the mill owner, Executive Magistrate Abdul Hossain said.

Another six-storey residential building owned by Khabir Uddin Mollah, also the owner of Mollah Salt, was illegally constructed on the river.

**Take strong
steps to get
due share**
JS body asks ministry
about water of
common rivers

The parliamentary standing committee on public undertakings yesterday asked the water resources ministry to take firm steps so that Bangladesh gets its fair share of water from rivers that flow into the country through India and Myanmar.

The committee also expressed its dissatisfaction over "irregularities and inconsistencies" in the accounts of expenditure of Water Development Board.

The committee directed the Water Development Board to submit its expenditure reports of the last four years after having its expenditure audited by the Comptroller and Auditor General's Office.

"We asked them to come up with the reports of the last four years. They had submitted expenditure report of one year. We rejected the report as

Govt asked to
review money
whitening
provision

The government should review some provisions in the proposed budget, including the issue of whitening money that would discourage the sincere taxpayers as well as weaken the tax policy, speakers told a roundtable yesterday.

Outsiders 'instigating' unrest at Barapukuria

A cloud of uncertainty is gathering over the Tk 1,600 crore Barapukuria coalmine as increasing interference by groups outside the mine is triggering unrest among workers, officials claim.

They said several stints of workers' strike and violent protests to realise irrational demands have already inflicted a loss of Tk 10 crore on the mine during 2008-2009 fiscal year.

According to official sources, the coal extraction cost of the mine increased about 30 percent as miners instigated by outsiders realised their demands through several protests. Those demands include doubling and tripling the daily wages.

The costly coal project of Petrobangla at Parbatipur upazila of Dinajpur ushers in hope for the nation in the energy sector as domestic gas production is gradually diminishing which eventually might hamper power generation.

None will be

NAT'L ENVIRONMENT COMMITTEE

No meeting in more than a decade

The national environment committee headed by the prime minister to deal with environment issues did not hold a single meeting in more than a decade, a parliamentary sub-committee disclosed yesterday, and urged the national committee to sit immediately.

Although environmental disasters occurred repeatedly, the highest level body formed to oversee environmental issues and give necessary directives did not sit in the last 11 years, said Saber Hossain Chowdhury, chief of House sub-committee, while briefing journalists at the media centre of parliament.

The national committee comprised of ministers for industries, environment and other high-ups held its last meeting in between 1997 and 1998.

The House body at its first meeting yesterday held Dhaka City Corporation (DCC), Water and Sewerage Authority (Wasa) and different industries responsible for pollution of rivers.

It asked high officials of the DCC and Wasa, and also the chairman of Rajuk to be present at its next meeting on June 24 to discuss how to tackle river pollution.

The sub-committee also asked owners of industries located in the city and its adjacent areas to attend the meeting as industrial waste greatly pollutes rivers.

Saber said 10-11 lakh tonnes of waste is generated in the capital every day, but Wasa is able to treat only 10 percent of the waste and the rest is dumped into rivers severely polluting them.

The DCC also has very limited capacity to treat over five lakh tonnes of solid waste

It was 11:54am Nepalese time on June 14. Two Bangladeshi mountaineers achieved a feat many compatriots dreamt of. Musa Ibrahim and Tawhid Hossain conquered the Mt Annapurna IV, a Himalayan peak at the height of 24,682 ft, as first Bangladeshis without supplementary oxygen after tremendous hardship.

They were accompanied by Nepalese climber Sarin Prakash Pradhan. All three are members of the North Alpine Club Bangladesh (NACB).

There was shivering cold with 2-3 degrees Celsius, mighty wind, continuous

28 Taliban killed in
Pakistan offensive

Tribesmen seeking to avenge a deadly mosque bombing killed six Taliban in northwest Pakistan yesterday, while 22 suspected rebels died in an ongoing military offensive, the army and police said.

Pakistan's security forces are locked in a seven-week battle to expel Islamist extremists from three northwest districts, a push informally joined by thousands of local tribesmen in Upper Dir district this month.

As many as 3,000 villagers took up arms in early June, forming a militia -- known locally as a lashkar -- after 38 people were killed in a

suicide bombing at a mosque in the district, which was blamed on the Taliban.

According to information we received, the tribal lashkar have killed six Taliban and destroyed their hideouts," Ijaz Ahmad, district police chief in Upper Dir, told AFP by telephone.

POST-POLL UNREST IN IRAN
Opposition protests
despite crackdown

Iran's opposition stepped up its challenge to the Islamic regime yesterday holding another rally even as the authorities intensified a crackdown on the media to try to contain the biggest crisis since the 1979 revolution.

Tens of thousands of supporters of defeated presidential candidate Mir Hossein Mousavi took part in what was billed as a "silent" protest rally, marching through central Tehran, witnesses said.

Wearing green wrist- and head-bands in the colour of Mousavi's campaign, the demonstrators carried placards accusing re-elected President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad of having
