Choose Dohar-Bhadrasan site to save Tk 10,000cr

Speakers urge govt

Speakers at a roundtable yesterday called on the government to construct Padma Bridge at Dohar-Char Bhadrasan site instead of Mawa-Jajira site to save at least Tk 10,000 crore.

"The government should reconsider its decision of constructing the Padma Bridge at Mawa-Jajira site, because it will cost more Tk 10,000 than Dohar-Char Bhadrasan site," they said.

The speakers said this at the roundtable on 'Government planning for construction of Padma Bridge and national interest' organised by Centre for Studies in Social Transmission at the National Press Club in the city.

Presenting a keynote paper, engineer Md Enamul Haque, former director general of Water Development Board and coordination of the centre, said, "If the bridge is constructed at Dohar-Char Bhadrasan site, it will require 35 kilometre

highway from Hemayetpur to Dhaka and 15 kilometre highway from Talma of Faridpur to be linked with the bridge which may cost an additional amount of \$75 million. But it will save Tk 10,000 crore during total construction process."

According to a study of Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA), the length of the bridge at Mawa-Jajira site would be 6.2 kilometre and it would cost \$1,074 million, he said, adding that on the other hand, the length would be 5.5 kilometre, costing \$966 million at the Char Bhadrasan site.

Preferring the Char Bhadrasan site, he said hard soil of the left side and hard point, constructed by Water Development Board, on right side of the site would really be suitable for construction of the bridge, which is absent at Mawa-Jajira point.

He also opined for constructing another two kilometre hard point in Dulshara area, the left part of the site, and strengthening the existing hard point of Haziganj at Char Bhadrasan, the right part

of the site, to make the site perfect.

Enamul also viewed for constructing 1.5-kilometre guide embankment on both sides of the bridge.

He presented some positive aspects of the bridge at this site, including ensuring more security of the bridge by controlling the course of the river, avoiding the Mawa-Jajira, the most erosion-hit site, and resolving disputes between the people of south and south-western parts of the country.

The former WDB director general criticised some studies of JICA regarding the site selection process and blamed the company for unveiling some incorrect and inadequate information to the government and the countrymen 'intentionally'.

Prof Sirajul Islam, president of the centre, chaired the meeting, while Ahmed Kamal of Dhaka University, Anwar Parvez, former chief engineer of Bangladesh Inland Water Transport Authority (BIWTA), and engineers Shahidullah and Anisur Rahman were present at the roundtable.

Don't get panicked about swine flu

Says health minister

Health Minister Prof AFM Ruhul Haque yesterday reassured people that there is no need to get panicked about swine flu as the person who was detected with the virus is getting well and no further case has been detected in the last three days.

The minister said the man is kept isolated and he is receiving treatment. Cautionary measures have also been taken to resist spread of the virus.

"What is needed most for the people is to be more cautious. If anyone develops flu-like symptoms, he or she should be taken to the physician," said the minister.

He was talking to reporters following the inaugural ceremony of the 4th International Congress of the Society of Laparoscopic Surgeons of Bangladesh at a city hotel.

Speaking as the chief guest, he also said that the country lacks expert physicians, including laparoscopic surgeons.

CPB blames govt for allowing foreign co to sell gas

Communist Party Bangladesh (CPB) leaders yesterday criticised the government decision on allowing a foreign company to sell gas resource to a third party instead of its own effort to do so.

CPB President Manjurul Ahsan Khan and General Secretary Mujahidul Islam Selim in a statement said the permission to a foreign company for selling gas to a third party has violated the Production Sharing Contract (PSC).

Due to such permission, the proven recoverable gas reserve would certainly be exhausted soon, they said, adding that it would be suicidal as well as would pave the way for them to loot the natural resources.

They also demanded steps to ensure 100 percent national ownership over the non-renewable resources like oil, gas and coal.

The demands include freeing the power, energy and mineral resources ministry from corrupt officials, including Toufiq-E-Elahi, and bringing them to book.

Form National Peace, Security Commission'

Leaders of some non-government organisations (NGOs) yesterday urged the government to form a constitutional and independent 'National Peace and Security Commission' to clamp down illegal arms, terrorism and militancy in the country.

The NGOs, including Bangladesh Development Partnership Centre (BDPC), Bangladesh Network on Small Arms (BANSA) and South Asian Alliance for Poverty Alleviation made this demand at a press conference at Dhaka Reporters' Unity (DRU) in observance of the 'Global Week of Action Against Gun Violence-2009'.

The weekend yesterday in participation of hundreds of organisations and thousands of people in 80 countries across the world. These organisations earlier submitted memorandums to the prime minister, foreign minister, law minister and the home minister as part of their weeklong programmes.

Sharif A Kafi, director of BDPC, Prof Dr Rashid-e-Mahbub, former president of Bangladesh Medical Association (BMA) and country representative of South Asian Alliance for Poverty Alleviation, Rubina Yasmin of BANSA, Noor Jahan Khanam and Mizanur Rahman also demanded to constitute a peace commission for South Asia.

The leaders of the NGOs urged the government to invest more in the sector and enhance the allocation in the budget for creating employment. They demanded to the government to introduce one-way education system and bring the madrasa education under the same system.

They also urged the government to ratify the newly signed Arms Trade Treaty (ATT) proposed by the United Nations to stop illegal trade and smuggling of small arms.

Sharif A Kafi, in his written speech said that the government should formulate a national plan of action in line with the UN sponsored programme to stop smuggling, illegal trade and use of small arms.

He also demanded formation of a regional taskforce and pragmatic approach regarding the same issue among the South Asian countries.
