

# Call to amend Tobacco Control Act 2005

Pictorial warnings on tobacco packs stressed

Pictorial warnings depicting the effects of smoking could discourage a significant number of people from smoking who cannot read the written warnings on tobacco packs, speakers at a view exchange meeting said yesterday.

Pictures of affected lung, heart and teeth on the cigarette packs would certainly discourage youths from taking up smoking, they added.

They also stressed the need to amend the Tobacco Control Act 2005 so that the tobacco companies cannot take the advantage of the loopholes of the law to expand their market through various tricky measures.

Health Reporters Forum, Bangladesh (HRF, B) and Bangladesh Consortium on Tobacco Control (BCTC) jointly organised the meeting on Show the Truth: Pictorial Warnings save lives at the Consumers Association of Bangladesh (CAB) auditorium in the city.

The speakers said smoking is responsible for lung cancer, heart disease and various other diseases. Though the government earns Tk 24,000 crore revenue from tobacco companies, more money is spent on the treatment of smoking-related diseases.

Reading out the keynote paper, Member Secretary of BCTC Iqbal Masud said some 25 countries have started

using pictorial warnings and that the government should force the tobacco companies to use such warnings covering 50 percent of a cigarette pack.

"Consumption of tobacco can be controlled if the Framework Convention on Tobacco Control (FCTC) treaty and the government's National Strategic Plan of Action for Tobacco Control can be implemented properly," said Quazi Farook of CAB.

Borhan Ahmed, president of CAB and executive editor of the daily Janakantha, presided over the discussion while President of HRF, B Moniruzzaman Uzzal and Dr Akramul Islam of The Union also spoke.

## 563 bags of rice for relief seized

A patrol team of Bangladesh Navy seized 563 bags (each bag weighing 50 kilogram) of rice from two trawlers in the river Shishu at Nalian under Dakop upazila in Khulna on Sunday.

The government had allotted the rice to distribute among the cyclone Aila-hit people in Koira upazila.

The rice was being taken to Khulna for sale in the black market. Eight people were arrested for carrying the rice in two engine trawlers.

Rice trader Sohrab Sikri who purchased the rice from Koira has been absconding getting information of arrest of his eight employees who were carrying the rice to Khulna, police said.

When contacted, Koira Upazila Nurbahi Officer Md Arif Pasha said he is not aware of seizure of the rice meant for relief in his area.

## Brac worker rescued five hours after abduction

The police arrested two people on charges of abducting a woman field worker of Brac who was finally rescued at Atwari border in Panchagarh five hours after her abduction yesterday.

The two arrestees -- Bashirul Islam alias Bashir, 45, of village Dhaidhajpara in Atwari upazila and Abdus Sattar, 47, of Panchagarh Pourasava area -- along with another accomplice Abdul Khaleque tried to traffic Parbati Rani, 20, to India, but local people rescued her.

On receiving information, police rushed to the scene and arrested the two. Khaleque managed to escape.

Quoting witnesses, the police said the three forced Parbati into a microbus on Monday morning when she was going to her workplace at Nalpukhuri village.

The three then took her to Mirgarh border in Atwari upazila to traffic her to India, according to Rani.

## Chemicals worth Tk 3cr gutted in Benapole fire

Imported Goods Worth Tk 3.33 crore were gutted in a fire at No 33 chemical shade of Benapole port yesterday.

Port authorities said that the fire originated from an explosion caused by friction of chemicals at about 10:00am and soon spread to different areas.

Twelve people were also injured while trying to douse the fire.

Fire fighters and port workers managed to bring the fire under control after two hours.

Director (Traffic) of the Port Shyam Kishore Roy said 49 consignments of goods in the shade have been damaged while 33 consignments have been completely destroyed.

A five-member probe body has been formed to investigate into the incident.

Billal Hossain, owner of local importer Chowdhury Enterprise, said Tk 18 lakh magnesium sulphate imported by him have been reduced to ashes. He demanded compensation from the port authorities.

## Conduct research on speed control device

HC asks BRTA

The High Court (HC) yesterday directed the Bangladesh Road Transport Authority (BRTA) to conduct a research on a new device developed by NITS Services Private Limited, an organisation of Nitol Motors Limited, to control the speed of vehicles in order to prevent road accidents.

The HC bench of Justice ABM Khairul Haque and Justice Mamtazuddin Ahmed passed the order while two BRTA high officials were explaining before the court as to why they could not implement the HC verdict asking them to take steps to install 'speed governor seal' in all types of vehicle to prevent road accidents.

He was among 222 persons whose names were listed by the National Coordination Committee (NCC) against serious crimes during the rule of the last military-backed caretaker government.
