#### Five hurt as bomb goes off in train

A bomb went off in a bogie of a train in Mobarakganj Railway Station of Kaliganj upazila in Jhenidah yesterday leaving five people injured.

The injured were Abu Bakar, 54, his wife Jobaida, 45, of Chuadanga, Tisha, 23, Toma, 8, and Suraya, 9 of Darshana. Jobaida was serito Jessore Sadar Hospital.

Police and locals said when the train, heading for Sagardari, reached Mobarakganj around 5:30pm the bomb exploded and the

A garment worker was killed and 25 others were injured as Ansars personnel yesterday opened fire on agitators ously injured. She was rushed | demanding a pay hike at a sweater factory in Ashulia.

Several hundred protesting garment workers set fire to the Ansars camp at the factory "S Suhi Industrial Park Ltd" in Jamgara and blocked the Dhaka-Tangail Highway for half an hour.

The protesters also damaged five

panes and doors of the factory and torched a vehicle parked at the compound.

Police sources say they lobbed around nine teargas canisters to calm the situa-

Bullet-hit Al-Amin, 26, was rushed to Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) where he died during treatment. His colleague Rony also received a bullet and is undergoing treatment at DMCH.

The other injured were taken to local

vehicles on the road, vandalised window- hospitals and clinics, witnesses say.

The witnesses add the clash ensued when the agitating workers beat up general manager Anisur Rahman and assistant general manager (AGM) Kamal Uddin at the factory gate around 9:30am.

Earlier, the workers got agitated hearing that three fellow workers -- Manju, Liton and Abu Bakkar -- were not allowed to enter the workplace.

FM asks India

Foreign Minister Dipu Moni has asked the Indian Government not to proceed with the construction of Tipaimukh Dam until Hafiz Uddin Ahmed said the newly constituted parliamentary team from Bangladesh visits the site and a comprehensive study regarding its impact on the environment is done.

> The foreign minister, now in New York, raised the issue during a meeting with Indian State Minister for Foreign Affairs Preneet Kaur Thursday, according to a message received yesterday.

She mentioned that India has assured Bangladesh of not how could it be an Asian doing anything detrimental to its interest and "Bangladesh would like to believe that".

The foreign minister proposed a meeting of Joint Rivers Commission (JRC) and reminded the Indian state minister that joint assessment of the project should be done, as it is "widely believed that this would harm the environment of Bangladesh".

## Climate aid pledges not coming in thick

Govt urges donors to send in more assistance

Food and Disaster Management Minister Abdur Razzak yesterday called upon the western countries and international donor agencies to send more aid to developing countries like Bangladesh to address the challenges of climate change.

Some western countries and foreign donor agencies failed to keep their promise of sufficient financial and logistic assistance to Bangladesh, he said.

"They promised to give 0.7 percent of our total GDP in aid to face the challenges of climate change but no country except Denmark has given assistance to us," he added.

The minister was addressing a seminar on 'Climate Change Effect, Mitigation and Adaptation' organised by Civil Engineering Division of Institution of Engineers Bangladesh (IEB) at its old auditorium in the city chaired by IEB President Prof SM Nazrul Islam.

#### India to make mandatory disclosure of judges' wealth

New health forms for inbound passengers

The government has decided to distribute yellow coloured health forms among the inbound passengers in every flight soon to strengthen the screening programme for swine flu virus in the

Meanwhile, another person who returned from India was found with the symptoms of swine flu in Chuadanga district vesterday.

The government officials at a seminar held at Mohakhali vesterday said the health forms would be distributed in the flight as many inbound passengers somehow escape the health help desk at the airport.

Under the screening programme, the inbound passengers have to report their health condition and if any of them report swine flu like illness he or she is tested immediately, said Director of the Institute of Epidemiology, Disease Control and Research (IEDCR) Prof Mahmudur Rahman.

### Padma to have double-decker US okays historic climate change bill

The US House of Representatives has narrowly passed historic legislation to limit pollution blamed for global warming, handing President Barack Obama a major hard-fought victory.

By a 219-212 margin, lawmakers voted Friday for the first time in US history to limit heat-trapping carbon emissions and shift the US economy to cleaner energy in a move backers said will create jobs and restore Washington's shaky leadership on climate change ahead of global talks set for December.

Obama immediately hailed the vote, telling reporters at the White House that it amounted to "a victory of the future over the past" as well as "a bold and necessary step.'

'The American people are demanding that we abandon the failed policies and politics of the past; we no longer accept inaction; that we face up to the challenges of our time. And today, the House has done exactly that," he said.

The "American Clean Energy and Security Act" aims to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 17 percent from 2005 levels by 2020, and 83 percent by 2050, create "green" jobs, and wean the US economy from oil imports. The bitter, day-long debate pitted supporters who argued the

bill would put a shine back on the battered US economy and foes who described the measure's more than 1,200 pages as a grim recipe for long unemployment lines. "Just remember these four words for what this legislation

means -- jobs, jobs, jobs, jobs. Let's vote for jobs," Democratic House Speaker Nancy Pelosi exhorted her colleagues minutes before the vote.

#### Up to 300MW being saved a day

Minister on daylight saving programme

The daylight saving time is saving electricity of up to 300 megawatts a day, State Minister for Power Shamsul Haque Tuku told parliament yesterday.

The power saved is supplied to export-oriented industries, he said in answer to ruling Awami League lawmaker Tarana Halim's question.

Replying to a query from AL lawmaker Sharier Alam, the state minister said the government is looking to generate electricity-making use of wind and solar energy.

In the renewable energy policy, it has already announced financial incentive to promote power generation by alternative means like solar panels and windmills.
