# Leased for tourism, used in other ways

Govt moves to reclaim misused Cox's Bazar land

The government has decided to reclaim the Cox's Bazar plots, which were leased out to boost tourism but have been illegally used for other purposes, to make the beach town a modern tourist hub.

formed a high-powered committee to identify the structures used illegally for purposes other than tourism in violation of the conditions of the Hotel/Motel Zone under Jhilangza mouza along the sea beach.

"The tourism secretary will head the committee, which will visit Cox's Bazar soon and submit a report in 30 workdays," Land Minister Rezaul Karim Hira told newspersons after the meeting says a source in Cox's Bazar. held at the conference hall of his ministry.

Aviation and Tourism Minister GM Quader, Land Secretary Delwar Hossain, officials from the ministries of land, tourism and public works, and Cox's Bazar district administration attended the meeting.

According to officials, over 100 plots on 150.75 acres of land in Jhilangza mouza were An inter-ministerial meeting yesterday declared as Hotel/Motel Zone and were allotted to different individuals.

> As per rules, the plots were meant for building hotels and motels in three years to boost tourism on the world's longest beach.

> "But conditions of the lease were violated in case of at least 61 such plots," says a land ministry official.

> "Besides, at least 47 plots are still vacant,"

# Govt working on closing salary gap

The government may narrow the gap between the highest and lowest salaries for public servants, fixing the lowest basic salary at Tk 4,800 by doubling that on the present scale of pay.

The Pay Commission had suggested the lowest basic salary at Tk 4,000 but a cabinet committee for implementation of the pay scale recommended doubling the present Tk 2,400.

Headed by the cabinet secretary, the com-

mittee has almost finalised the report of its review of the Pay Commission's proposals and it will submit it to the cabinet very soon, committee sources said.

They said the recommendations have been made in accordance with the desire of government high-ups to minimise the salary gap between the highest and lowest echelons.

According to the existing pay scale, the ratio of the lowest and highest salaries is 1:9.58. The

At the first meeting of JWG, high officials of the two countries primarily identified the areas of cooperation, including sharing intelligence and training of law-enforcers.

They agreed to hold the next meeting of the group by the end of this year to finalise the modalities of their cooperation under the

The family of Michael Jackson yesterday ordered a second autopsy of the pop icon as associates told of mounting anger over "unanswered questions" surrounding the superstar's death.

Jackson's family members were huddled at their compound in Los Angeles, where they have gathered since the most famous member of their clan died suddenly on Thursday at age 50 after suffering an apparent cardiac arrest.

Los Angeles police yesterday conducted a second interview with doctor Conrad Murray, the only person with him when he collapsed. A spokeswoman for the cardiologist said he "clarified some

# Jackson family Pakistan offers reward for capture of Mehsud

Troops kill 11 militants

Pakistan yesterday offered a 615,000-dollar reward for information leading to the capture, dead or alive, of local Taliban head Baitullah Mehsud, currently holed up in the tribal belt.

Two national Urdu-language newspapers and local papers in the northwest city of Peshawar carried an advert offering the 50million-rupee (615,300-dollar) reward for Mehsud, and other amounts for 10 of his senior militants.

"The government has announced a cash reward for anybody providing authentic information leading to the capture of these (11), dead or alive," said the advertisement. It then

lists the wanted men, along with their bounties. "Innocent people are being killed because of the bloody activities of these so-called defenders of Islam," the advert adds.

been pounding Mehsud's hideouts for weeks,

ahead of an expected ground offensive following a similar operation to root out Taliban in and around northwest Swat valley launched in late April.

In the latest offensive on Sunday, warplanes and helicopter gunships pounded suspected militant positions in Pakistan's troubled northwest, killing 11 Taliban fighters, intelligence officials said.

Elsewhere in the region, two government soldiers were killed and four were wounded when insurgents attacked a pair of military outposts near Wana in South Waziristan shortly after morning prayers with rockets, missiles and small arms fire, two intelligence officials

The military confirmed that two bases had been attacked, but could not immediately comment on casualties.

Violence has spiked in recent weeks in South Fighter jets and helicopter gunships have Waziristan, a rugged tribal area along SEE PAGE 15 COL 7


