DESTRUCTION AT ITS WORST













Demonstrating workers burned down factories of Ha-Meem Group at Narasinghapur in Ashulia on the outskirt of the capital yesterday as violence in the RMG sector showed no sign of wearing off on the third consecutive day. The government declared tough action against the perpetrators and also promised a thorough investigation into the incidents. The death of two workers on Saturday and Sunday sparked the agitation. Our photographer Shafiqul Alam captured the rage on his camera.

Police recovered body of a seven-year-old boy from staircase of a building in the city's Mirpur yesterday.

The deceased was identified as Belal, son of a household aide Monwara.

Officer-in-charge (OC) Nazim Uddin said on information they recovered the body from a 4th floor staircase of a six-storey building around 7:00pm.

He said the body bore several injury marks and the legs were tied with rope.

As Monwara works in the area, Belal oftentimes used to go to the building, said the OC, adding however Monwara was unaware when Belal went there yesterday.

Police said they picked up a security guard of the building for interrogation.

The body was sent to Dhaka Medical College Hospital for autopsy, said police.

Cuts allocation in city cleaning; gives not much attention to mosquito menace

Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) yesterday announced its budget for the fiscal year (FY) 2009-2010 increasing allocation for traffic infrastructure development and maintenance by 32.04 percent over that of FY 2008-09.

DCC Mayor Sadeque Hossain Khoka placed a Tk 1411.58 crore budget at Mohanagar Natya Mancha.

It has reduced allocation for special cleaning drive by 11.36 percent, which may affect the city's cleaning activ-

Addressing the ceremony, Khoka announced that DCC would construct a graveyard on 100 acres of land under a Tk

254 crore project adjacent to flood protection embankment in the city although the mayor has failed to keep his earlier pledge to construct four

graveyards. It has allocated Tk 225 crore for road and traffic infrastructure maintenance and development, which was Tk 170 crore in the FY 2008-09. Of which, Tk 150 crore has been kept for road, footpath and surface drains.

Among the development expenditure, DCC has increased allocation to Tk 15 crore from its earlier Tk 5 crore to construct footbridges and underpasses while allocated Tk 1 crore each for median and electricity on the roads.

It has allocated Tk 16 crore to curb mosquito menace, which is Tk 1 crore higher than that of the last FY.

Tk 3 crore has been allocated to modernising and maintenance of different rides of Shahid Zia Shishu Park while Tk 6 crore for development of other parks in the city, which was Tk 7.50 crore in the

Tk 2 crore has been kept for car parking which was Tk 15 crore in the FY 2008-09.

Among other development expenditures, Tk 20 crore has been allocated for construction and development of community centres while Tk 1 crore for slaughterhouses, Tk 4 crore for equipment of food SEE PAGE 15 COL 5

The High Court (HC) yesterday issued a set of directives on the government to stop allowing cattle markets in open places or on streets in the capital before Eid-ul-Azha to prevent environmental pollution.

It also ordered the authorities concerned to take steps to dispose of the remains of sacrificial animals within 24 hours after they are slaugh-

tered. The HC bench of justices Syed Refaat Ahmed and Moyeenul Islam Chowdhury directed the Dhaka City Corporation (DCC) mayor to submit a report on implementation of the court's directives

by October 11 this year. The directives came following a writ petition filed as SEE PAGE 7 COL 7

The five-time world champions looked out for the count after Clint Dempsey and Landon Donovan put the Americans two up at half-time but they bounced back with a Luis Fabiano brace drawing them level with 16 minutes

It set the scene for an exciting finale and captain Lucio made it a memorable night with a powerful header from an Elano corner with six minutes remaining.

It was their third Confederations Cup crown following triumphs in 1997 and 2005.

32 killed in Pak clashes, airstrikes

Clashes and airstrikes killed at least 27 militants and five civilians as fighting surged yesterday across Pakistan's northwest tribal belt, a Taliban stronghold, officials said.

Fighter jets pounded suspected insurgent hideouts in South and North Waziristan, where the military says it is using air raids to lay the groundwork for a full-scale assault against Pakistani Taliban warlord Baitullah Mehsud. Pakistan has offered a 615,000-US-dollar reward for informa-

tion leading to the capture, dead or alive, of Mehsud, who is holed up in South Waziristan and who has been blamed for some of the worst attacks in the nuclear-armed country. About 2,000 people have died in bombings since July 2007

and the United States has put Pakistan at the heart of its war against al-Qaeda and efforts to stabilise Afghanistan, welcoming a military push to clear out Taliban havens. "At least seven militants were killed after jet fighters pounded

their hideouts in Saam village of South Waziristan," a security official told AFP on condition of anonymity because he was not authorised to speak to the media. "Three houses, one school occupied by militants and a

Taliban office, were targeted in the air strike," he added. In North Waziristan, five rebels were killed when helicopters shelled their hideouts in the town of Madda Khel in retaliation for an ambush which killed 12 soldiers Sunday, said a security official in the region's main town Miranshah.
