


Freddie could be dropped

England captain Andrew Strauss said here on Tuesday that Andrew Flintoff was not immune from being dropped for disciplinary reasons after the all-rounder's latest indiscretion.

Ex-England captain Flintoff missed the team bus for the squad's Saturday morning visit to the World War One trenches at

Strauss, who made a big point about player responsibility when appointed captain in January, also revealed there had been several other incidents of players turning up late since he'd become skipper.

Opening batsman Strauss found himself having to comment on Flintoff's failure to turn up on time after it was reported in the British press Tuesday.

The incident, which happened the morning after a team dinner, took place during England's pre-Ashes 'bonding' weekend away in Belgium and just over a week before the first Test against Australia starts in Cardiff on July 8.

It was not the first time the 31-year-old Flintoff had courted controversy for his off-field behaviour.

During the 2007 World Cup in the Caribbean he was briefly dropped from the England side and stripped of the vicecaptaincy as punishment for an alcohol-fuelled night which ended with him capsizing a pedalo in the early hours of the morning in St Lucia.

Prior to that the Lancashire star, when captain of England, was sent away from training by then coach Duncan Fletcher after turning up to a practice session in Australia during an Ashes series his side lost 5-0.

Strauss, asked at a news conference at Edgbaston here on Tuesday, if he would be prepared to drop Flintoff - the star of England's 2005 Ashes series win - on disciplinary grounds, replied: "That has got to be an option with anyone who transgresses badly enough.

"But I am absolutely certain it's not going to come to that and it would be a very sad day for English cricket if we had to do that.

"But it's vitally important to a team functioning properly that everyone is treated the same."

Australia all-rounder Andrew Symonds was sent home before last month's World Twenty20 in England because of an alcohol

David Morgan, the International Cricket Council (ICC) president, has hinted that Test cricket may be reduced to four days to protect and therefore coloured clothing. and enrich the game's oldest format in the face of lucrative Twenty20 leagues like the Indian turing design that replicates a red ball, maybe an Premier League (IPL).

The suggestion comes in the wake of a few other changes that are being mooted, including a two-tier format and day-night Tests to attract more crowds.

that we are examining is whether Test match cricket can be played over four days rather than five," Morgan told the India Today magazine. "I would be very surprised if within a year you haven't seen some significant changes in Test match cricket."

Morgan felt it wouldn't be too difficult for players to make a mental shift from five days to four. He added that Test cricket needed many more adjustments, and that special cricket balls would have to be made to facilitate night Tests in white clothing.

"We need better over-rates, better pitches that give a good balance between bat and ball and we need to consider day-night Test cricket," Morgan said. "There is great support for it, the issue is the colour of the ball and the quality of the ball. It would be a pity if Test match cricketday-night -- had to be played with a white ball

"We are looking very closely at ball manufacorange ball, a ball that could still allow us to play in white clothing and still at night."

The two-tier structure was recently mooted by Dave Richardson, the ICC general manager for cricket, to divide the stronger and weaker "Another thought that many people have, teams and make the format more competitive. The ICC has also given the go ahead for the Umpire Decision Review System (UDRS) from October following trials in specific series over the last year. Umpires will have greater scope to decide on bad-light interruptions and the penalties for slow over-rates have also been increased.

Grameen-Danone Nations' Cup

Williams closed in on a sixth Wimbledon title on Tuesday with a 6-1, 6-2 victory over Poland's Agnieszka Radwanska whose quarterfinal challenge

melted in the searing heat. World number one Dinara Safina reached semifinals for the first time with a 6-7 (5/7), 6-4,

6-1 win over unseeded German teenager Sabine Lisicki. Despite losing the first set by doublefaulting on a tie-break, the top-seeded Russian

recovered to beat the world number 41 in two hours, 28 minutes on Centre Court. Safina faces defending champion Venus Williams, the third seed, for a place in the final.

Fourth seed Elena Dementieva also eased into the last four for the second successive year after crushing unseeded Italian Francesca

Dementieva made it at the All England Club for the first time last year before losing to eventual champion Venus Williams. The Russian will hope to go one step further

this time when she faces either Serena Williams, the second seed and two-time champion, or eighth seed Victoria Azarenka in the last four. Since losing the finals of the French and US

Opens in 2004, Dementieva has been unable to make it to the title match of a Grand Slam.

Venus, bidding to become the first woman to win a hattrick of Wimbledon titles since Steffi

Graf's three-in-a-row from 1991 to 1993, next faces either top seed Dinara Safina or Defending champion Venus Germany's Sabine Lisicki for a place in the final. The 29-year-old American, seeded three, has

Venus ran away with the next six games to claim victory after 68 minutes.

"I really had to play well. It was close at the start of the second set. She's a good grasscourt player so I'm happy just to get through," said the American who has now reached her eighth semi-final in 10 years.

"If it was an all-Williams final that would be fantastic but we still have great players to meet and will have to bring our best tennis to the court.

Later Tuesday, two-time champion Serena Williams, the second seed, takes on Belarusian eighth seed Victoria Azarenka who is aiming to reach her first Grand Slam semi-final.

The last quarter-final features Londonbased Italian Francesca Schiavone, bidding to reach her first semi-final in a major, against Russian fourth seed Elena Dementieva who

Vaughan says that's it

Former England captain Michael Vaughan announced his retirement from all professional cricket with immediate effect here at Edgbaston on Tuesday.

The 34-year-old Yorkshire batsman said the time was right for him to step aside and allow a new generation of players their chance to shine.

"It's been a hard decision," Vaughan, who as captain led England to their 2005 Ashes series triumph, told a news conference at Edgbaston here on Tuesday.

"The decision came two weeks ago at Worcester when I realised there were younger players around the Yorkshire team, and certainly England, who need to be given a chance to move the

game forward. "I wanted to give it one last effort to get into the Ashes squad. I've given it that shot but haven't been playing well enough. I've game. He scored freely during the recent World

had a great career." Vaughan, England's most successful Test captain, has not played for his country since tearfully resigning the captaincy in

August during the home series loss to South Africa. His career has been blighted in recent years by a knee injury and speculation about Vaughan's future intensified after Vaughan failed to win a place in England's squad for the Ashes

series against Australia which starts next week in Cardiff. "It was always a long shot to get me back in [to the England team]," Vaughan added. "The last thing players like Ravi Bopara needed was for me to get a 100 [for Yorkshire] and for the media to build up my chances.

Reflecting on his career, Vaughan said: "The Ashes in 2005 was the pinnacle. "We captured the nation and cricket hadn't
