Hefty fine on Asif

AFP, Lahore

Pakistani cricket authorities on Thursday fined Mohammad Asif one million rupees (12,500 dollars) over the fast bowler's 19-day detention at Dubai airport for alleged drug possession.

Asif. 26, was detained last June on his way back home after playing in the Indian Premier League (IPL).

A three-member Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) committee headed by former captain and PCB director Wasim Bari investigated the matter.

"On recommendation of the committee we have fined Asif one million rupees," the PCB said in a press release.

Dubai authorities found opium in Asif's possession, but a prosecutor determined that the quantity was small and deported the bowler. Asif is also banned from

until September after testing positive for the banned anabolic steroid Nandrolone last year. "Asif will be available for selection once he completes

the IPL ban," said the release. The mercurial fast bowler also tested positive for Nandrolone during tests conducted by the PCB in 2006: He and fellow bowler Shoaib Akhtar, who failed the test too, were banned for one and two years respectively.



Roger Federer's run of 21 consecutive Grand Slam semi-final appearances will probably never be matched, his fellow Wimbledon semifinalist Andy Murray said.

Murray said his own consistency was "very, very good", but Federer's was "incredible", as the top two seeds in the draw stayed on course for a clash in the

The Scot, who faces America's two-time Wimbledon finalist Andy Roddick for a place in Sunday's showpiece, vowed to get the adrenaline pumping for Friday's semi-final - saying he might well lose if he does not.

Murray said five-time Wimbledon-winner Federer's Grand Slam run was astonishing.

"The consistency in the big tournaments, is ridiculous," the 22-year-old said. "No one will ever match that. The consis-

tency is the one thing. I don't think it's been surprising that once he won a few slams, everyone was saying that he could be the best ever. "But just to have no slip-ups, to have no

injuries - maybe he has but covered that well to not be really sick or to miss one event, one slam through injury, it's pretty incredible." On his own consistency level, the All

England Club third seed, who lost to Federer in September's US Open final, said: "Since Wimbledon last year, my consistency has been

Pakistan has complained of being marginalised in the draft of the next six-year international cricket programme, forcing the signing of the schedule to be postponed, an official said Thursday.

The International Cricket Council (ICC) last week began chalking out a Future Tours Programme (FTP) which aims to provide a structured schedule of cricket for the ten member countries from 2012 to 2018.

Teams have been wary of playing in Pakistan amid a wave of Taliban-linked attacks over two years, and the nation was stripped of its World Cup matches after a deadly attack on the Sri Lankan cricket team in Lahore in March.

The ICC had hoped to get the programme approved by member countries last week, but Pakistan objected, saying it had not been granted enough matches.

Pakistan Cricket Board chief operating officer Salim Altaf said the ICC had now assured Pakistan that its interests will be looked after, as the schedule went back to the drawing board.

Pak objection to new FTP Hussey hits form

Mike Hussey came back to form with his first century in nine months on a day when several Australia top-order batsmen failed in their final warm-up game before the Ashes.

Hussey made 143 not out on the first day of the four-day tour match with the England Lions, the national 'A' side, here at New Road on Wednesday as Australia reached 337 for eight at stumps.

His century was Hussey's first in any form of match in Bangalore last October.

much time at the wicket so it was pretty important at the start of this tour to get my confidence up and spend some good time at the crease," said Hussey. After a devastating new ball spell by Stephen Harmison, Hussey, approaching his first Ashes

series in England at the age of 34, helped rescue Australia with a 141-run stand alongside opener Simon Katich (95).

"It was important to get a partnership going," Hussey explained. "I thought (Katich) played very well again. He's been outstanding

Harmison, bidding to regain his Test place, earlier struck left-hander Phillip Hughes square on the helmet with his first delivery of the day.

He then accounted for the 20-year-old with another rising delivery, Hughes caught off his bat handle fending to Joe Denly at gully.

The Durham paceman also struck Ricky Ponting on the shoulder in a fiery opening spell -- which signalled his intent to return to the senior side ahead of Sunday's first Test squad announcement -- before Graham Onions, his county colleague, dismissed the Australia captain for a single.

Ponting's cheek on the first morning of the 2005

Ashes series at Lord's but was dropped during England's tour of the Caribbean earlier this year after some wayward displays.

Hussey and Katich steered the tourists away from trouble before the number four, playing up the order above Michael Clarke, shared a crucial seventh-wicket stand with Mitchell Johnson worth 109 in just 29 overs.

Australia had lost four wickets for 32 runs to be 215 for six at tea after Katich, Clarke (four), Marcus North (one) and Brad Haddin (seven) all succumbed in quick succession.

Katich struck 15 boundaries in his 95, but gave England's toiling attack a gift when he failed to capitalise on a wayward leg-side delivcricket since his 146 against India in a Test ery from Harmison and picked out Onions on

the fine leg boundary. "It's been a long time for me to spend so The Durham duo are widely regarded to be competing for the same Test place but Onions said he hoped they could play alongside each

unflappable in humid conditions. His return to form will delight the touring side following relative failures against South

Africa over the past six months. Hussey averaged close to three figures for the early part of his belated international career but that dropped to 22 for Australia's 2-1 series Harmison famously drew blood from win in South Africa and just 17 in their preceding home series loss to the Proteas.
