## Forest Dept to legally fight tree plunderers

Forest authorities have decided to fight a legal battle against the plunderers of 15,000 Keura and Bain trees on a vast 40-acre forest belt near Sonaichhari coast in Sitakunda two days after razing of the greens.

A few influential people in a bid to develop ship-breaking yards hired workers, who felled the trees worth over Tk 1.1 crore with electric saws and machetes on Friday.

The move by the forest authorities came following press reports and subsequent enquiries by the ministry concerned.

Divisional Forest Officer of Chittagong Coastal Forest Division SM Khaleque Khan yesterday told The Daily Star, "We'll appear to the court to either withdraw its earlier order or stay it by dint of which they [the plunderers] managed to destroy the vast forest belt."

The mass destruction of invaluable green forest belt is feared to cause grave environmental disasters and put the coastal embankment on threat.

Witnesses and sources say more than 500 workers started chopping down the Keura trees since Friday afternoon and completed the destruction by midnight.

# Govt to buy 28 lakh MT food grains this year

#### 26 lakh MT to be distributed under social safety net programmes

Food Minister Abdur Razzaque yesterday said the government has set a target of briefing at his ministry. procuring 28 lakh tonnes of food grains in the current fiscal year of which 26.75 lakh tonnes will be distributed under public food distribution system.

Of 28 lakh tonnes of food grains, 16 lakh tonnes will be procured from domestic market, 1.50 lakh tonnes are expected as aid while 10.50 lakh tonnes will be imported.

Besides, the government will take up employment generation programme of Tk 1,176 crore to create 14 lakh employRazzaque was addressing a press said

"At least 23 lakh tonnes of food grains will be distributed under various social safety net programmes. This is probably the largest amount to be used for the

programme," the minister said. He said that ensuring food for the poor is a high priority of the government, but expressed concern that such big allocation for social safety net is done by diverting money from the development programmes.

Health, education and infrastructure

ments for the hardcore poor during lean sectors could get more allocation if social safety net required less money, Razzaque

> "This [social safety net] is where the development partners should come forward. But, unfortunately the foreign aid has come down significantly, despite various promises," he told newsmen.

> Still, the government has decided to expand the social safety net programmes, considering the fact that around six crore people live below the poverty line, Razzaque noted.

Bangladesh has applied for the membership of Egmont Group, a coordinating company of over 100 financial intelligence units across the world, in an effort to bring back siphoned off money.

It will be easier to collect information on siphoned off money after obtaining Egmont's membership, Finance Minister AMA Muhith yesterday told parliament in reply to a query from Awami League lawmaker Mahmud Us Samad Chowdhury.

The finance minister said the government is keeping communications with different countries and international organisations and memorandums of understanding are being signed with them.

He said the government has formed a task force to communicate with foreign organisations and coordinate the government efforts to bring back siphoned off money.

## RMG makers told to be responsible

#### Faruk Khan on checking unrest in industry

Commerce Minister Faruk Khan yesterday urged the ready-made garment (RMG) manufacturers and exporters to play a 'responsible role' so that any untoward incident in the garment sector can be averted.

He said the garments manufacturers will not use 'only good branded cars wearing brand suits' but they have to ensure the workers' welfare in the factories to avoid workers unrest.

The minister said this while distributing cheques among the dependants of workers

killed in various incidents including the recent worker unrest in Ashulia, at Bangladesh Garment Manufacturers and Exporters Association (BGMEA) office.

He said a section of unidentified miscreants had vandalised the garment factories and set fire to those during Ashulia unrest, which was a pre-planned conspiracy to damage the gar-

## 16 UN de-miners kidnapped in Afghanistan

A roadside bomb and a rocket-propelled grenade in southern Afghanistan killed two British soldiers, while gunmen in the east abducted 16 mine-clearing personnel working for the United

Nations, officials said yesterday. The attacks that killed the British troops in Helmand province's Gereshk district came as thousands of US Marines pour into the Taliban's southern heartland, in the biggest US military offensive operation in Afghanistan since the toppling of the militants in 2001.
