



# Food supply boost pledged

G8 unveils \$20b food security fund for developing world

Barack Obama and fellow rich nation leaders unveiled a 20 billion dollar fund to help feed the developing world on Friday as they were urged to help the poor survive the downturn.

On the last day of the G8 summit in Italy, the US president and his peers tried to answer criticism they had turned their backs on those most vulnerable to the global economic crisis and held talks with African leaders.

As Obama prepared to embark on his first visit to sub-Saharan Africa, delegates said he played a key role in persuading around 30 countries to bankroll a fund aimed at helping smallholder farmers increase crop yields.

It was initially expected the fund would total 15 billion dollars, but Obama said that figure had now reached 20 billion.

The United States will reportedly stump up around 3.5 billion dollars of the cash and Japan and the European Union between three and four billion each.

"We have committed to investing 20 billion

in food security, agricultural development programmes to help fight world hunger. This is

in addition to the aid we provide," said Obama. "Going into the meeting we had agreed to 15 billion. We exceeded that mark and obtained an additional five billion of hard commitments."

The fund signifies a shift in focus by richer nations away from food aid towards practical help for local agriculture.

"We believe that the purpose of aid must be to create the conditions where it's no longer needed to help people become self-sufficient, provide for their families, and lift their stan-

dards of living," said Obama. Kanayo Nwanze, head of UN agricultural agency IFAD, was among those who welcomed the launch, saying the plan represented a "shift from food aid -- which is like providing medication after the child is ill -- to providing assistance to help the countries... produce food by

Around 200 metres of Sirajganj town protection embankment went into the gorge of river Jamuna yesterday due to onrush of water from upstream, threatening the town.

### Govt to recruit 6,000 doctors, 3,000 nurses

The government would soon appoint 6,000 doctors and 3,000 nurses in public hospitals to address the acute crisis of healthcare personnel in the country, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina said yesterday.

"We have already decided to appoint around 6,000 doctors considering people's healthcare," she said addressing a reunion programme held on the occasion of 64th founding anniversary of Dhaka Medical College.

"I have suggested that the health minister appoint as many doctors possible on ad hoc basis and they will be regularised later through would start soon. She directed the authorities a BCS examination," she said, adding that the

nation's need is more important than the process of appointment. She termed appointments through the Public Service Commission a time consuming process.

"The appointment of 3,000 nurses in posts that have been lying vacant for a long time will be done soon on special arrangements," she said, adding that the government would build hostels for medical students and quarters for doctors.

She urged all to work for the people's welfare refraining from looking at the work from a political point of view. Hasina said construction of the second


A gang of four muggers stabbed a woman and her son and snatched Tk 5.25 lakh from them yesterday morning in the city's Rampura.
