

## Nazmul to cover for Mashrafe

Bangladesh on Monday named medium-pace Nazmul Hossain as a cover for injured captain Mashrafe Bin Mortaza for the remaining two-Test series against the West Indies.

Hossain, who played his first and only Test in December 2004, would fly to the Caribbean later Monday night, Bangladesh Cricket Board spokesman Rabeed Imam told AFP.

"Nazmul Hossain has been named as a cover for Mortaza. The Bangladesh captain will undergo scan on his injured knee and then the team will decide whether he will feature in the remaining matches of the series," he said.

Mortaza, named captain just ahead of the West Indies series, fell over and injured his right knee while bowling on Saturday, the third day of the ongoing first Test at Kingstown, St Vincent.

The fast bowler left the field and was taken to hospital for a precautionary medical examination.

## Flintoff scare for England

England face a nervous wait on the fitness of injury prone all-rounder Andrew Flintoff after a knee problem threatened his participation in the second Ashes Test against Australia at Lord's on Thursday.

Flintoff, the quickest and most menacing member of England's pace attack during the drawn first Test in Cardiff, sustained a right knee injury while fielding at Sophia Gardens.

That was his first international appearance this season after another right knee problem, which he endured while playing in the Indian Premier League, ruled him out of England's home series against the West Indies.

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## Tamim takes Tigers in a position of strength

Tamim Iqbal cracked a maiden Test hundred to lead Bangladesh to 321 for five in their second innings against West Indies in the opening Test on Sunday.

Tamim, who made 128, took advantage of a depleted West Indies attack, operating on an unresponsive pitch in sweltering temperatures, to smash 17 fours from 243 balls in close to five and a half hours of batting to give Bangladesh the platform for a lead of 252 at the stumps on

West Indies were 22-1 in 3 overs chasing a target of 277, half an hour before lunch on the final day. Bangladesh were all out for 345 after resuming the day on 321-5, leaving the West Indies 80 overs to reach their target.

the fourth day.

Another middle-order collapse however, undermined Bangladesh's progress in the final session before Shakib Al Hasan (26 not out) and Mushfiqur Rahim (28 not out) batted through the last 90 minutes to share an unbroken stand of 54 for the sixth wicket to get them back on track.

Tamim held centre stage and arrived at his milestone from 206 balls, when he guided a delivery from off-spinner Ryan Austin into square cover, and scrambled a single as a bout of cramp surged through his right-leg.

Fortune had favoured Tamim twice in his

innings though.

He was 30 when Floyd Reifer dropped him at first slip off Darren Sammy, and he was 76, when Omar Phillips muffed a straightforward chance at mid-wicket off Austin.

The left-handed opener, however, kept his nerve, and anchored two vital stands.

He shared an opening stand of 82 with Imrul Kayes, who scored 24, and then added 146 for the second wicket with Zunaed Siddiqui, who made 78.

"It's a dream come true for any player to score a hundred in Test match cricket," said Tamim.

"Our head coach Jamie Siddons always says that 'the more balls we can leave, the more our chances increase of us getting a big score'. In other words, it is not always about the shots. The good balls you respect, and the bad balls you put away."

"The pitch is very flat, and if you do not want to get out, no one can get you out. It is a really flat pitch. I was going well, but then I got out playing a poor stroke."

He added: "We are going very well right now, but we lost four wickets in the last session which set us back a bit. Mushfiqur and Shakib are doing a good job though, and if we can get a lead of around 300, I think it would be enough to put them under pressure."

"Shakib is also one of the best spinners in the world, and I think he and the other bowlers can make it hard for the West Indies on the last day."

Shakib and Rahim eased the late pressure on Bangladesh, after the Tigers lost Siddiqui, Mohammad Ashraful, and Rakibul Hasan for nine runs in the space of 16 balls to slide to 267 for five.

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## Alam ton brings Pakistan back

Debutant Fawad Alam scored an unbeaten century as Pakistan produced a remarkable turnaround to claw their way back in the second Test against Sri Lanka on Monday.

The tourists, who were bowled out for 90 in their first innings, hit back to dismiss Sri Lanka for 240 and then cruised to 178-1 in their second knock by stumps on the second day.

Left-handed Alam led the way with a determined 102 not out to give Pakistan a lead of 28 runs with nine wickets in hand on a dry pitch that appeared to have eased out under the hot sun.

The fearless 23-year-old from Karachi moved to 98 by lofting left-arm spinner

Rangana Herath for a six over mid-wicket and then flicked the next ball for two runs to reach the coveted century.

Alam put on 85 for the first wicket with Khurram Manzoor, who made 38 before he was caught behind by wicketkeeper Tillakaratne Dilshan off Herath.

Skipper Younus Khan, who was dismissed for zero in the first innings, was unbeaten on 35 at stumps after adding 93 for the unbroken second wicket with Alam.

Sri Lankan captain Kumar Sangakkara rotated his seam and spin attack in short bursts to gain quick breakthroughs, but Pakistan's batsmen were not found wanting a second time.

Pakistan's fightback was launched by seamer Umar Gul and off-spinner Saeed Ajmal, who took four wickets each to keep Sri Lanka's

## 'Conquering heroes'

Britain's media Monday hailed most of England's cricket team as conquering heroes after they salvaged a draw against Australia in the first Ashes Test in Cardiff.

James Anderson and Monty Panesar were praised for their gritty determination after the last-wicket duo saw out the final 40 minutes at Sophia Gardens during a 69-ball stand that took England to safety on Sunday.

"England tasted one of those glorious dramatic draw yesterday that only Test cricket at the highest level of intensity can deliver," Simon Barnes wrote in The Times newspaper.

Bowler Panesar, for his part, said he just tried to stay calm and focused in the final minutes of the match.

Writing in the Daily Mail, Panesar also said he realised England had a "big chance" when Australia brought on part-time spinner Marcus North.

Paul Collingwood was also singled out in the press for his patient last-day innings of 74 which spanned nearly six hours.

"Collingwood, unshaven, sunburnt and mired in sweat and dust, batted for 17 minutes shy of six hours, 245 balls of sheer bloody-mindedness and self-restraint to take England

to the brink of safety," The Times' Mike Atherton, a former England captain, said.

But the press rounded on some of England's top-order batsmen for their poor performances, saving savage criticism for Kevin Pietersen, who made eight in the second innings and 69 in the first.

"The rest of the England batting, as it had been for most of the match, was at times pitiful in its application or ability to absorb fundamental lessons," the Guardian newspaper's Mike Selvey -- an ex-England pace bowler -- wrote.

"Pietersen has run into real trouble in this Test. Ritual defiance will not protect him from the suspicion that his lone wolf tendencies are now hurting his team," the newspaper also said.

There was also little sympathy for Australian captain Ricky Ponting, after he complained of time-wasting by the home side during the tense final stages of the match.

The Daily Telegraph said "in similar circumstances most teams would have pushed their luck" as well.

Ponting, writing in the same newspaper, described England's tactics as "pretty ordinary" but said the Australian team would not dwell on them ahead of the second Test starting at Lord's on Thursday.

"We will play by the spirit of the game and leave the England team to whatever they do," Ponting said.

## What an escape!

James Anderson and Monty Panesar staged one of cricket's great escapes as England clung on for a dramatic draw in the first Ashes Test at Sophia Gardens here on Sunday.

England's last-wicket duo batted together for 40 minutes to deny Ashes holders Australia what seemed a certain victory.

The left-handers' stand of 19 spanned 69 balls after England had been in desperate trouble when Paul Collingwood was out for 74 for a gutsy innings lasting nearly five-and-three-quarter hours.

Collingwood's exit left England on 233 for nine.

But the 10th-wicket duo held firm as England ended the match on 252 for nine with Anderson 21 not out and Panesar unbeaten on seven.

The teams now head to Lord's, where Australia have not lost a Test since 1934, for the second match in this five-Test

series starting on Thursday.

"It is huge for us," said Anderson, who batted for 72 minutes.

"To go to Lord's in a couple of days now still level in the series is a massive boost us."

Panesar praised "cricket buddy" Collingwood for helping him with his batting.

"He's been throwing me balls and working really hard with me on my batting and it has paid off today."

England captain Andrew Strauss said: "All credit must go to Paul Collingwood -- he was outstanding."

"Also we have to mention Jimmy and Monty. The batsmen shouldn't have let them get in that position, but they showed a lot of character."

Meanwhile, Australia captain Ricky Ponting, named man-of-the-match for his 150 in an innings of 674 for six declared, was left with thoughts of what might have been.

"I am disappointed we didn't win the game, I thought we played well enough over the five days," he said.

"But I am still really proud of the boys. We can take a lot of heart out of the game although we came up a bit short in the end."

Apart from Collingwood, no other top-order batsman made more in the second innings than Strauss's 17.

And when Collingwood was eventually out, caught at the second attempt in the gully by Michael Hussey off fast bowler Peter Siddle, having faced 245 balls with six boundaries, it seemed England had lost all hope of avoiding a convincing defeat.

There were a minimum of 11.3 overs remaining when Anderson and Panesar came together.

But they demonstrated a defensive
