Gives no reason for sacking several thousand Bangladeshi workers; ministry still in the dark

The Mauritian government has decided to send back, by the end of this year, several thousand Bangladeshi workers working mostly in the African nation's readymade garment and textile industries.

The authorities however gave no official reason for the decision, but textile companies of the island country said they were asked by the authorities to sack Bangladeshi workers and repatriate them to their homeland, according to a recent report of Africa News, a Port Louis based online newspaper.

"I am persuaded that the government will reconsider its decision, the industrial sector needs those workers," Bangladeshi Honorary Consul in Mauritius Ganny Joonas however said.

Meanwhile, Bangladesh is totally unaware of the Mauritian decision.

"No, we have no information about sending back of workers from Mauritius. Rather I know, that country will hire more workers from Bangladesh," Expatriates' Welfare and Overseas Employment Minister of Bangladesh Khandker

Mosharraf Hossain told The Daily Star. He said he will check the authenticity of the news immediately.

Bangladesh sent around 12,000 workers to Mauritius since 1992, mostly in readymade garment and textile industries.

The African nation's decision comes when thousands of Bangladeshi workers reportedly lost jobs in Malaysia, Singapore, and Dubai. Malaysia cancelled work visas of 55,000 workers early this year.

Child labourers exposed to acid

They work in stove burner factories without protection, earn Tk 200-250 a week

As darkness descends on the Buriganga river, Tauhid begins blowing sulphuric-acid-dipped nozzles of stove burners in bare mouth being completely unaware of the corrosive impacts the acid would leave on his body.

Tauhid tests several hundreds of such burners throughout the evening with his uncle, none of them wearing any precautionary measures.

Physicians say acid as a corrosive substance would cause deep burns and damages to different parts of the body including kidneys and corneas of the eyes.

But it is life risk for the children who work at such factories only for Tk 200-250 a week.

There are at least 25 such factories producing stove burners in Keraniganj. Many of them have no names, leave alone registration, and employ mostly children for the hazardous work.

Tauhid takes the risk in vain as he would not get any money in return. He is just helping his uncle Khokon, who is trying to establish his factory in Tinpatti in Keraniganj near the bank of the Buriganga. Khokon has five employees including three children who

work over 12 hours a day at his yet-to-be-named factory. Tauhid

works from 9:00am till 7:00pm six days a week. He sometimes

does overtime for three more hours if it is necessary. SEE PAGE 15 COL 4

Price of water on Wasa lorry doubles

Dhaka Water Supply and Sewerage Authority (Wasa) doubled the price of one lorry of water with effect from yesterday.

The price hike comes when Wasa is struggling to meet the demand for water in the city.

The price of one lorry of water (5,400 litres) was increased to Tk 400 from Tk 200, said Chief Engineer of Wasa Mohammad Nurul Haque.

"We increased the price to Tk 400 since the previous price was fixed at least 10 years ago," he said, adding that the price was fixed following a recent decision of the Wasa board.

Nurul said a committee, led by himself, had suggested that price of each lorry of water be fixed at Tk 662 after considering water and transportation costs. But the board fixed the price at Tk 400.

There are allegations that some Wasa officials and employees concerned with

The government is in a dilemma over which law the trials of the February 25-26 BDR mutiny and carnage will be held under. An inter-ministerial meeting sat yesterday to decide on the

matter but failed to make any decision as loopholes of different laws were pointed out in the meeting. They, however, decided to scrutinise the laws elaborately, a meeting source said.

"The meeting decided to scrutinise the laws so that none can challenge the verdicts of the mutiny cases in the High Court, said the source.

In a post-meeting briefing at the Bangladesh Secretariat, Law Minister Shafique Ahmed said, "We did not make any decision today because there are some legal complexities. After scrutinising the laws, we will make a final decision on July 27."

The meeting was adjourned till 4:30pm July 27. The two-hour-long meeting chaired by the law minister discussed whether the trial could be held under the army act, the Bangladesh Rifles act or other conventional laws. It also discussed possible legal complications of holding the trials under these laws. SEE PAGE 15 COL 3

168 people killed in Iran plane crash

An Iranian airliner en route to neighbouring Armenia caught fire mid-air and crashed in farmland yesterday, killing all 168 people on board in the worst air disaster in Iran in recent years.

Witnesses and state media said the Caspian Airlines plane was ablaze before plunging into the ground and exploding near a village northeast of Tehran shortly after taking off from the capital's international airport.

Television images showed a vast crater at the disaster site littered with debris of plane parts, shoes and clothes. "All people aboard... the crashed plane are dead. The plane

had 153 passengers and 15 crew members," said Mohammad Reza Montazer Khorasan, head of the health ministry's disaster management centre. Among those on board the Tupolev were about 25 Armenians, according to an airline representative in Yerevan,

while Iranian officials said they included 10 members of Iran's

"I saw the plane when it was just ... above the ground. Its wheels were out and there was fire blazing from the lower parts," witness Ablolfazl Idaji said, according to the Fars news agency.
