

Fresh initiative to dredge Karnaphuli

An initiative is underway to dredge the river Karnaphuli to free the lifeline of the port city from siltation and construct a 2.5km marine driveway along the river.

A Development Project Proforma (DPP) has been prepared in this regard to implement a project at an estimated cost of Tk 411.72 crore to be funded by Chittagong Port Authority (CPA).

A project proposal is likely to be finalised immediately after recasting the DPP to reduce the project cost substantially, said the sources concerned.

The project aims at removing the silt deposited in the river Karnaphuli due to construction of two bridges over the river, Shah Amanat Bridge and the Third Karnaphuli Bridge, sources said.

Under the project some 2.9 million cubic metre of dredging work would be done over a three-kilometre stretch from the Shah Amanat Bridge in the upstream to Sadarghat in the downstream. At the same time, a 2.5km marine driveway with bank protection wall would also be constructed along right bank of the river stretching from Sadarghat to upstream.

As per an estimation made by Bureau of Research and Testing Authority (BRTA), Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology (Buet), the dredging work would cost Tk 92.92 crore, construction

of the bank protection wall and driveway Tk 282.03 crore while Fender and Bollard Works would cost Tk 1.62 crore.

Besides, Tk 7.70 crore was kept for physical contingency and Tk 19.00 crore for price contingency, informed BRTA and Buet through a letter on July 1, 2008.

The project was scheduled to start on January 1, 2009 to be completed on December 31, 2011, said the sources.

CPA took a Tk 74 crore capital dredging project under a Japanese Debt Cancellation Programme for the same

dredging and bank protection work in 2005.

In response to a query from Shipping Secretary Md Manjoor Elahi, the BRTA, Buet through a letter last week informed that RCC pillars can be used for construction of the bank protection wall of the marine driveway.

The BRTA, Buet in its letter said compared to sheet-piling, which it suggested earlier for the bank protection wall, RCC is less costly, user-friendly and can be made locally.

BRTA also mentioned in the letter that it earlier suggested for sheet-piling under pressure from the then project director of the project, said the sources at CPA.

Manjoor directed the CPA for making query about the dredging cost which has been estimated at Tk 360 per cubic metre in the DPP.

Besides, CPA would revise estimated cost and several other aspects of the project while recasting the DPP that would bring down the project cost significantly, said the sources.

The project is likely to be finalised within a very short time and its implementation would also help CPA reclaim huge land through landfill along the bank," said CPA Member (Engineering Captain) Zobaer Ahmed.

Amropali paves way for economic prospect in CHT

Mango farming in the Chittagong Hill Tracts (CHT) is gradually gaining popularity among the indigenous people instead of traditional jhum cultivation as it paves way for economic prospect for them.

The indigenous people get inclined to mango cultivation, popularly known as Amropali, as it ensures brighter prospect and offers handsome return than traditional jhum cultivation.

With technical support from a local NGO, Development Concern, which played a vital role in

reducing pest attack on the mango farms, the farmers in Rangamati got a bumper yield of Amropali this year.

Amropali farming has already helped a good number of mango growers in Rangamati change their wheel of luck.

Some 1350 hectares of hilly slope in Rangamati were brought under mango farming so far under Horticulture Development Project of Department of Agriculture Extension. A total of 5100 mango farms have been created in three hill districts under the project.

According to sources in DAE, some 14,850 metric tons of mangoes mostly

'Amropali' have been cultivated so far at 100 orchards involving 7000 people in Rangamati.

"I got only five mounds of mangoes from 200 trees last year due to severe pest attack. However, I have already harvested 12

mounds from my farm and expect to harvest double from rest of the trees," said Ful Kumar Chakma, a mango farmer at Sapchhari in Rangamati Sadar upazila.

He said he is getting good yield of Amropali due to technical support of Development Concern.

"Timely spray of proper pesticide as per their suggestion helped me save the farm from pest attack and

get the good harvest," he said.

Dipen Dewan, adviser of Development Concern, said they are giving technical support to the farmers for achieving expected result. This year many growers harvested bumper yield of mangoes since they could save their farms from pest attack."

He said they have given technical support to at least 20 farms this year and hope to expand it next year.

During visit to different mango orchards at Wagga, Chhilchhari and Chitmorong in Kaptai, Sapchhari, Balukhali, Bondukhingga, Jibitali, Mogban in Sadar upazila, Kalampati and Betbunia in Kawkhali upazila, this correspondent found a large number of orchards with plenty of mangoes.

Md Lise Uddin, deputy director of DAE, said Mango can be produced in large scale in hills bringing thousands of hectares of fellow land under fruit orchards. There is huge potential for mango farming in the hills that are enough to meet the demand of whole country, he said.

About the pest attack on the mango farms, he said the pest attacks the farms as the farmers do not clear their gardens timely and they are almost ignorant about pest attack.

Felling of trees protested

A human chain was formed here on Sunday demanding an end to felling trees at Sitakunda coastal belt in Chittagong.

Non-government organisation

Young Power in Social Action (YPSA) organised the human chain in cooperation with developing organisations Bangladesh Environment Lawyers' Association (BELA), Nawjowan, Bangladesh Paribesh Andolon (Bapa), Sangshakti, UTSA and Ship Breaking Trade Union Forum in front of Chittagong Press Club.

Speakers at a rally during the programme said the coastal green belts are now being damaged to build ship-breaking yards through felling trees in the coastal forests for long.

They expressed strong resentment and protested felling of around 18,000 trees in a most unethical way in the coastal areas over last few days.

They demanded shifting of the ship-breaking yards from the coastal area and emphasised on afforestation in the area.

Five held for pilfering crude edible oil

Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) recovered 191 litres of crude oil while being pilfered on the way to

refinery and arrested five people in this connection here on Thursday.

Other members of the gang managed to flee jumping in the river.

Members of the elite force made the seizure during a drive at TSP jetty adjoining area under Patenga police station.

The criminals were stealing the crude palm oil on the way to refinery depot from the vessel MT Sulu Wind, sources said.

The arrestees were identified as Jane Alam, 50, Noor Alam, 45,

Md Nezam, 45, Md Iqbal, 30, and Md Jasim, 22.

Rab sources said a syndicate of some 50 criminals are engaged in pilfering crude edible oil on the way to refinery or depots from the vessels with the help of some dishonest crew.
