Austria bans vuvuzelas

The Austrian professional football league on Thursday imposed a stadium ban on the long plastic trumpet, the vuvuzela, which made such a noisy impression in last month's Confederations Cup in South Africa.

But the league said the vuvuzelas were being banned not for the deafening and tuneless din they produce but because they might be used as missiles.

"Vuvuzelas can be used as projectiles. Furthermore, they can incite aggressive behaviour amongst other fans," Austrian league spokesman Christian Kircher said.

Newly-promoted Wiener Neustadt had been counting on handing out 150 vuvuzelas to fans to make some noise during the league's seasonal kick-off at home on Friday against Austria Carinthia.

The trumpets caused consternation among some in South Africa for the Confed Cup, with several non-African players and coaches calling for their ban.

But the president of world football's governing body FIFA, Sepp Blatter, has given them his blessing, blasting the detractors by telling them Africa is about dance and music and that moaning about the instrument bordered on discrimination.

Bolt wants to shine

Usain Bolt will use his outing at the fourth meeting of the Golden League series to fine-tune preparations for an assault on next month's World Athletics Championships.

The Jamaican took the Beijing Olympics by storm, setting world records en route to victory in the 100 and 200m, as well as being part of his country's gold medal-winning 4x100m relay team.

But he was beaten into silver in the 200m in the 2007 world championships in Osaka by triple world champion Tyson Gay of the United States, who will not be competing at the Stade de France.

Bolt will be keen to set down a marker after some storming performances by Gay, whose Olympic adventure was disastrous after a comeback from injury.

But Gay has set the two leading times of the season over 100m, notably a 9.77sec into a headwind in Rome, the fourth fastest time ever run over the blue riband event.

"Everything is possible," said Bolt, who on July 7 recorded the fourth fastest time in history in the 200m of 19.59sec. "If it's fine weather, I can manage a quick time. I never run just for laughs.

"I'm maybe at about 85 percent," he told L'Equipe newspaper. "I won't be at 100 percent before Berlin. I've still got some work to do on the 200 and 100m.

"I've been working on my starts. In training it's going well but when it comes to competition time, I try to anticipate the orders too much."

There might not be a showdown with Gay or

Jamaican compatriot Asafa Powell on Friday, but a strong field includes Churandy Martina of the Dutch Antilles, Trinidadian duo Richard Thompson and Marc Burns, and veteran St Kitts and Nevis sprinter Kim Collins. Bolt, however, is not in the running for the one-million-dollar Golden League jackpot for the athlete who wins all six races in their discipline throughout the season.

Of the five men's events (100m, 400m, 3000m/5000m, 110m Hurdles, Javelin Throw) and the five women's (100m, 400m, 100m Hurdles, High Jump, Pole Vault), there are just four jackpot contenders.

Kenenisa Bekele of Ethiopia has notched up three wins over the 5,000m, while Jamaican Kerron Stewart remains unbeaten in the women's 100m.

American Sanya Richards looks comfortable in the women's 400m while Yelena Isinbayeva is so dominant in the pole vault that it will take a serious upset or injury to derail the Russian, who shared the 2007 jackpot with Richards.

In the men's pole vault, local hopes will rest with rising star Renaud Lavillenie, who has set a season's best of 6.01 metres, considerably more than the field he'll be up against.

Three high-profile late withdrawals have, however, taken the shine off some events.

Ariane Friedrich has pulled out of the women's high jump in which she would have resumed her rivalry with Croatian Blanka Vlasic, the German having come out on top in their first head-to-head outdoors in Berlin. Richards will miss competition from nemesis Christine Ohuruogu of Britain, who produced an amazing finish to snatch Olympic gold in Beijing from the American.

And Olympic champion Dayron Robles will miss the men's 110m hurdles as he struggles with a nasty bout of flu.

FINA allows swimsuit

Australia's head swimming coach Alan Thompson believes the upcoming world championships have been blown wide open by the dominance of the new generation of swimsuits and warns the issue could badly damage the sport.

Thompson's team began their final preparations for the worlds on Friday with a training camp in Manchester, where they will also be based before the London Olympics, before leaving for Rome on Wednesday.

The late decision by world governing body FINA to allow polyurethane suits has caused a scramble among the Australian team, who are sponsored by Speedo but have a clause in their contracts to allow the use of other suits. However many swimmers have only had access to them since arriving in Europe this month.

"To say that it's not a distraction would be glossing over it and I think it has been a distraction," Thompson said.

"Myself and my coaches have tried to take control over these things so the swimmers don't have to worry to much about it so they can focus on the job they have and the process they have put in place to be successful. There is a calmness about the suits with our team."

Still because of the swimsuits, Thompson believes there could be a few surprises in Rome, with athletes from countries without a strong swimming background creating the headlines.

"Medals and placings have become more and more widely spread over the last few years

anyway, but certainly it creates a situation where it's very difficult to predict who the favourites are," Thompson said.

"Not always the best athletes win the races at the moment and that's what we want to get back to. (A situation) where it's the best prepared athletes, the most talented athletes who have the best coaching, winning the events.

"It's the responsibility of FINA now to take some kind of control in the future and let's bring it back to just talking about the pure athletic performance of our athletes."

Thompson says FINA needs to show better leadership to stop the swimsuit issue alienating fans.

"I think the credibility of the sport is at risk now and if FINA don't move decisively and strongly and show strong leadership in this area, then there's a real possibility (of alienating fans)," Thompson said.

Thompson feels the world records generated in the new swimsuits have overshadowed the swimmers.

"When we were back in 2007 at the Melbourne World Championships, that was a fair competition I think and the decisions and the positions and the medals were given out based on the true performances of the athletes," he said.

"I think since that point in time, technology has assisted these performances and the new swimsuits have assisted these performances. We always talk about a level playing field for all but I don't think that's the case.

"The credibility of FINA has been severely dented there and needs to be sorted out in the very near future," Thompson said. "Hopefully we can put this period of time behind us like a bad dream and move forward."

Worcestershire to release Jones

England pace bowler Simon Jones is to be released by county side Worcestershire at the end of the season, the club said Friday, after being told he won't play again this year.

Jones was one of the key figures in England's 2005 victory over Australia, but the Welsh quick was a spectator in the crowd when the latest Ashes battle got underway in Cardiff on July 8.

A series of knee injuries have repeatedly sidelined the 30-year-old since that Ashes triumph four years ago and he was told last month he was still not fit enough to return to action.

Worcestershire said Friday that Jones had not been offered a contract extension beyond the end of the current season.

Steve Rhodes, Worcestershire's director of cricket, said: "This has been a difficult decision but is in the best interests of the club going forward.

"We all admire the effort that Simon has put in to regain full fitness and we know he is determined to be fit for the 2010 season," the former England wicketkeeper added.

"However we are not in the position to offer him a new contract going forward so he is free to talk to any other county about his future.

"We want to thank Simon for his contribution to the club's success in 2008 when his 42 wickets at 18.02 helped us secure promotion to Division One (in the County Championship) and we really do hope that he can win his fitness battle and resume his career," Rhodes added.

Jones, who began his career with Welsh county Glamorgan, took 18 wickets in four Tests at an average of 21 apiece during the 2005 Ashes before missing the series finale at the Oval because of injury.

He'd previously ruptured a crucial ligament in his right knee in Brisbane on the first day of the 2002/03 Ashes series.

Last month Jones was adamant he'd intended to continue his career.

"I am devastated but I always take the positives out of a negative and the good thing is the cartilage is in really good nick and just the bone underneath needs a little more time," he said.

"This isn't career-threatening. It's just a matter of giving it a bit more time and the knee will be fine.

"I've now just got to look forward to next season, get myself in good shape over the next few months and see what happens."

Jones's father Jeff, a left-arm quick bowler, played 15 Tests for England in the 1960s before his career was cut short by an elbow injury.

Lee targets third Test

Australia were reduced to just two bowling options for much of Friday morning at Lord's, but reinforcements are on the way. Brett Lee, Australia's senior fast bowler with 310 Test wickets, has declared himself on track to play the third Test at Edgbaston, while Shane Watson has returned to bowling at full intensity and is available for selection as an allrounder after Lord's.

News of Lee and Watson's progress might not solve Ricky Ponting's problems in the short-term - Nathan Hauritz's dislocated finger and Peter Siddle's illness left him with just two frontline bowlers on the second morning of the match - but will certainly expand Australia's options for the last three Tests of the series. Lee completed a series of sprints under the supervision of team physiotherapist Alex Kountouris on Friday morning, while Andrew Hilditch observed Watson bowling from his full run-up in the Lord's nets.

Watson's recovery from a thigh strain is at a more advanced stage than Lee's recuperation from a rib injury, but both could figure in Australia's plans for the Edgbaston Test, beginning July 30.

"I'm very optimistic that I can get up for the (Edgbaston) Test, selection pending," Lee told Cricinfo after Friday's training session. "I'll be giving myself every opportunity. If I don't feel

like I'm ready to go I won't push it. We've obviously got a massive series here. You don't want to turn a three week injury into a six month thing if you tear it right through.

"I haven't had a bowl as yet. It's ticking off every box. You start off with a light walk, progress to some light jogging, then heavy jogging then sprints. There are a couple of little stages I have to get through first. I'll be doing a bit of medicine ball stuff before I can bowl. Provided I'm pain free the bowling will start. Whether that's in a day's time, two day's time or four day's time will be determined by how quickly I progress with things."

Lee struggled to watch Australia's bowlers on the receiving end from Andrew Strauss and Alastair Cook on Thursday morning, but drew encouragement from their late innings riposte. Mitchell Johnson, in particular, could find himself under pressure if Lee returns for Edgbaston, given the left-armed's errant lines and profligate economy-rates thus far this series.

"It was difficult to watch, to say the least," Lee said. "I don't enjoy watching cricket, period. I think I'll enjoy it more when I'm finished. I just feel like I want to get out there and play. It's frustrating - if I'm on the sideline and injured, you just really want to try and get out there for your team. It was hard yesterday. I thought the guys early on, it wasn't our best start. However, the way the guys fought back, it showed a lot of character in our bowlers. To have them 1-200 and at stumps 6-360, with another wicket in our favour the day could have gone to us."

WIPA rejects WICB claims

The West Indies Players' Association has rejected both the notion that protesting players have taken strike action and the West Indies Cricket Board's latest claims of players breaching their contractual obligations.

In a letter to the protesting players, the WICB gave them 10 days from Thursday to explain their protest action over the last two weeks which the regional governing body noted had breached the Code of Conduct for players and team officials.

The WICB has charged that the players making themselves unavailable for the first Test against Bangladesh, as well as their refusal to travel to St. Vincent for the match, and their skipping of the official launch for the 2010 Twenty20 World Cup on July 4 in St. Lucia as breaches of their obligations.

But WIPA has denied taking strike action, and insists that players were not under contract, so they could not have breached any agreements.

"These players were under no contract with the WICB that imposed any terms, conditions, and obligations with regard to the first Test

against Bangladesh and have taken no strike action within this context," said WIPA executive president Dinanath Ramnarine in a statement.

He added: "Although the players participated in the One-day Internationals against India, again there was no contract setting out what the terms, conditions, and obligations were with regard to this series, and it was their understanding (that the Twenty20 World Cup launch) was an optional event."

"Under normal circumstances, the players may well have attended (the launch) in any event without a contract."

"But after a three-hour meeting at which it came to their attention that a large number of long outstanding issues had still not been resolved, they exercised the option not to attend. A letter was subsequently sent to the president of the WICB."

In the meantime, the WICB has frozen the payments of players with retainer contracts who are part of protest action.

Media reports indicate that the majority of players the WICB have targeted are among a group of 29 who hold retainers that offer an annual fee of between 25-60,000 US dollars.

The WICB said that payments will be suspended until they indicate in writing their "resumption of obligations under the contract."

Plans for US-style IPL

There was a certain irony that on the day plans for a major Twenty20 tournament in the USA were announced, the USA Cricket Association's chief executive, Don Lockerbie, was at Lord's watching an Ashes Test, a format many seem to think is growing less relevant by the year.

Lockerbie was in town to meet with leading administrators to advance his plan to make the USA a major cricketing destination. While he wants to build the USA into a leading cricketing power, he also believes Twenty20 cricket is a format made for the American audience.

"I'd like to see a successful, world-class, best-players-in-the-game tournament, an invitational franchise league or something like that, in the near future," he said. "That would be the dream. It's too early to say what kind of format that would be, but we're putting out a tender for proposal."

Will that, as has been rumoured, be another IPL? "The IPL as I look at it now is a remarkable, fantastic model to follow. Look at what it's been able to do. Our hat is off to Lalit [Modi] and the people behind this fantastic sports property."

"So, of course, you want to look at it as a model to emulate, or as a model to partner with, or at least to come up with something that has its own fresh appeal."

"The USA is a country that wants to see the superstars, and that's what we have to focus on. We have to invite them to come and play in the USA, and eventually we hope to develop our own superstars."

Russia the team to beat

Even without superstar Anastasia Ermakova, Russia will be the team to beat as the FINA World Championships see seven gold medals on offer in eight days of synchronized swimming competition.

At the Beijing Olympics last August, Russia claimed both the duet and team titles for the third Games in a row.

Ermakova and Anastasia Davydova repeated their duet title from the 2004 Athens Olympics, and while Ermakova is taking a break this year, Davydova has moved smoothly into partnership with Olympic team gold medalist Svetlana Romashina, the pair taking duet gold at the European Cup in Andorra in May.

In contrast to the limited synchro programme at the Olympics, the World Championships will see seven gold medals up for grabs in the competition that runs from Saturday through July 25 in the temporary pool at Stadio Pietrangeli.

Medals will be awarded for both the technical and free programmes of the solo, duet and team events, and in the free combination.

Russia boast the longest streak of team success at worlds with six straight golds.

Four of those were "traditional" team golds in 1998, 2001, 2003 and 2005, while they captured team technical and team free gold when medals were offered in each for the first time at Melbourne in 2007.

Russia's depth of talent in the deceptively demanding sport was clear in Melbourne, where they won six of the seven titles. The only exception was the solo free gold of French legend Virginie Dedieu, who has since gone back into retirement.

But they will face strong challengers from Europe and Asia.

Gemma Mengual leads a strong Spanish team while Italy will be hoping to benefit from the support of home fans.

Japan are perennial medal contenders while China, led by twin sisters Jiang Tingting and Jiang Wenwen, are hoping to build on their bronze medal performance in Beijing.

China's team bronze in Beijing was the country's first Olympic synchro medal, and now the Jiang sisters will be hoping to claim the country's first place on a World Championships podium.

"We have our own advantage, which is, we have a good sense on dancing," Jiang Tingting said after the Chinese team returned to training in the wake of the National Championships in April.
