

Local govt bodies to be strengthened

Says Muhith

Finance Minister AMA Muhith yesterday said local government bodies, including district and upazila parishes, would be strengthened with a view to making them effective and increasing the locals' involvement in the development activities.

Although there had been some loopholes, those would be minimised very soon, he said, adding: "We want to make them workable in real sense."

The minister said this at a view exchange meeting at the Sylhet Press Club with President of the press club Muktabis-un-Noor in the chair.

He said, "We are ready to face any just criticism from the media since it helps discharge our duty in a right way. We believe in freedom of the press without which democratic values cannot be restored in society."

"We have zero tolerance on corruption. It is a major social curse."

Without curbing corruption, no development efforts can achieve success. Eliminating graft is possible through bringing major changes in management system, Muhith noted.

He asked the press club authorities for establishing a full-fledged information centre

which would provide all sorts of information through IT. The government is committed to building a digital Bangladesh.

Muhith said, "A country goes digital means it will be an e-state, all its activities such as governance, commerce, education, agriculture, etc will be powered by computer and internet. We are already working that way."

He further said the making of an ICT-driven society in the country is now just few steps ahead. The ruling party's election manifesto pledged to build a 'Digital Bangladesh' where people will get a developed life, free of crime, corruption and misrule and be able to face the challenges of the 21st century.

He said today almost every state is heading towards a knowledge-based society and the country cannot stay away from the advantages of it.

The minister later joined a reception accorded to GPA-5 holders at the city's Bluebird School and College and visited the Bangladesh Betar, Sylhet centre.

Lawmaker Syeda Zebunnesa Haque, Chief Editor of the Daily Uttarpurba Aziz Ahmed Selim, press club Vice President Al-Azad, Sadar Upazila Parishad Chairman Ashfaque Ahmed, district AL President ANM Shafique and press club General secretary Ahmed Nur also spoke.

Call to cancel illegal leases in hilly areas

Sachetan Nagorik Samaj yesterday demanded the government cancel all illegal leases in hilly areas and bring the land grabbers into book.

'RTI Act to help ensure accountability'

The Information Commission would take steps to implement the Right to Information Act to ensure people's access to information, which will help ensure accountability and justice and reduce corruption in public and private organisations, Information Commissioner Prof Sadeka Halim said yesterday.

Prof Sadeka said this at an orientation programme on 'Right To Information Act and its implementation' organised by Nagorik 'Uddyog' at its seminar room.

The RTI Act will help ensure accountability in the government and non-government organisations, thereby reducing corruption and establishing good governance, said Executive Director of Nagorik Udyog Zakir Hossain, who chaired the orientation programme.

The speakers also called on the government to strengthen the Information Commission by recruiting more manpower, raising fund allocation and providing other logistic support.

11 shot in gunfight with robbers

At least 11 persons including four policemen received bullets in an hour-long gunfight between police and robbers early morning yesterday at Thaingkhali under Ukhiya upazila on Cox's Bazar Teknaf highway.

Police and witnesses said, when around 10 to 15 armed dacoits put up a barricade on the highway with logs of wood at around 4:30 am and were preparing to rob Dhaka-bound goods-laden trucks from Teknaf port, a police team led by Ukhiya thana OC Prodip Das reached there.

The robbers, sensing presence of the police, asked them

to retreat and started firing indiscriminately. Police also opened fire in self-defence and exchanged 20 rounds of bullet, sources said.

In an hour-long gunfight, Ukhiya thana SI Ekramul Haq, Md Kibria, Amir Hossain, constable Jamshed were wounded when bullets lodged in their hands, legs or head, police said.

They have been admitted into Ukhiya Upazila Health Complex.

Confirming the incident Prodip Das said, police conducted a raid in the area later and arrested bullet-hitting gang leader Mujibur Rahman alias Monia dakat, 30, and his accomplice Badsha Miah, 30.

Humanitarian cause of youths can make world different

One philanthropic medical student from the US and a group of BBA students from ASA University in the city once again showed that the strength of the youth can make a difference in the world.

Together they launched an organisation titled 'The Basic Needs Programme' with an aim to assist the marginalised segment of society living in the slums of Dhaka, focusing mainly on the street children.

The group also aims at lending a hand to families that lost male breadwinners either through death, disability or abandonment.

It all started back in 2007 when Richard Hubbard, a student of University of Sewanee in the US, came to visit Bangladesh to carry out a medical research.

"I was shocked to see such an incredible number of street children in Dhaka. One particular baby named Halima was my ultimate inspiration. She was malnourished to such an extent that she weighed only seven pounds at the age of one. Her skin held on to her bones like she was an old woman," said Hubbard, president of the programme, who later provided for Halima's treatment.

Halima was the last of seven children abandoned by their father. The mother could hardly provide for them. Earlier, Richard met another enthusiastic ASA student Sohan Rahman with similar inspiration. Together they decided to do something to give children like Halima a chance to live better in the world. Thus, the Basic Needs Programme started its journey.

Currently, the programme



has two branches -- one in Sewanee University and the other is managed by 16 BBA students of ASA University.

Sohan, managing director of the programme, said initially, just four families were involved in the programme.

Today the programme provides for 25 families, all with the personal charities made by the members and donations from individuals.

The families are involved in the programme for 12 to 18 months until they achieve a level of financial success.

They receive food, housing, schooling and most importantly, the mothers are trained and encouraged to seek employment or start a small business with loans, he added.

Basic Needs also launched a school-cum-orphanage in Goichachhia village under

three years. There are also plans to establish a farm, provide clean water and family planning advocacy programmes.

Part of the money earned from the farm will be given to the programme, the rest will go to the families involved, he added.

Hubbard said, "I found it most interesting that most street children are not orphans. Most of them lost

their fathers either to an accident or disease or he remarried. And their mothers are trained to be mothers or wives. Lack of life skills led them to their struggle."

"We want to provide a level of relief from the anxiety of survival to the families who are involved in our programmes," he mentioned.

BSF to launch women battalion

Women will now guard the borders of India with Bangladesh and Pakistan and assist in checking women and child trafficking as well as narcotics smuggling.

The JCI invites young entrepreneurs and professionals in the age group of 18-40 years to make positive changes in the society through providing various training to them.

Director General of Border Security Force (BSF) of India ML Kumawat told journalists at the BSF headquarters of Jammu Frontiers at Paloura on Saturday that the battalion would be commissioned by Union Home Minister P Chidambaram on July 25.

He said the battalion has been raised to increase participation of women in maintaining the security of the country and redressing their poor participation rate in comparison with their male counterparts.

The women battalion will be posted on the borders with Pakistan in Jammu and Kashmir, Rajasthan and Gujarat, and with Bangladesh in West Bengal, he said.

The women battalion will also carry out frisking operations and night patrolling on the border and other areas.

Kumawat said the deployment of the battalion would be of great help in checking narcotic-related crimes since women are increasingly used as couriers in trans-border narcotics smuggling particularly on the Indo-Bangladesh border.

Since male BSF personnel were unable to thoroughly frisk women suspects, the female battalion would go a long way in preventing narcotics-related crimes, he said.

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
