45,000 acre hills lands not used as per lease terms

JS body on CHT recommends cancelling lease

A parliamentary body yesterday recommended cancellation of leases of 45,000 acres of land in the three districts of Chittagong Hill Tracts (CHT) as those were not used as per terms of the leases in the last 10 years.

The lands were leased to 1,800 people for rubber plantation, farming and forestry.

The parliamentary standing committee on the CHT affairs ministry made the recommendations at a meeting held at

Khagrachhari District Council.

President of the committee Promod Mankin, who chaired the meeting, told journalists later that at least 25 acres of land were given to each lessees for specified purposes. But they violated the terms of the leases and did nothing on those lands.

"We have asked the deputy commissioner of Khagrachhari, Rangamati and Bandarban to submit details of the lessees with their recommendations at the next meeting of the committee," he said.

The House body also discussed the

activities of CHT Development Board (CHTDB) and Internal Displaced Affairs Taskforce, and progress of rehabilitation of returnee (from India) refugees.

The meeting was attended by committee members including State Minister for CHT Affairs and lawmaker from Rangamati Dipankar Talukder, CHTDB Chairman and legislator from Bandarban Bir Bahadur Ushe Singa, lawmaker from Khagrachhari Jatindra Lal Tripura and A B M Fazle Karim Chowdhury, Abdur Rahman Bodhi and Athin Rakhain.

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EC moves to enroll expatriates as voters

Decides to ask govt to amend act

The Election Commission yesterday decided to ask the government to amend the Electoral Rolls Act, in a bid to make way for registering as voters Bangladeshi citizens who are living abroad temporarily or have dual citizenships.

At a meeting yesterday, the EC also formally decided to begin the process of drafting proposals to bring sweeping reforms to the Representation of the People Order (RPO) to make it 'foolproof', meeting sources said.

Earlier the EC had sent a proposal to the immediate past caretaker government for amending the electoral rolls law for registering as voters only those expatriate Bangladeshis

who hold dual citizenships.

But the commission could not proceed with its plan, as the caretaker government did not bring the necessary amendment to the law before the recent parliamentary election.

This time around, the EC will send the proposals to an elected government, requesting it to amend the Electoral Rolls Act to register as voters all expatriate Bangladeshis, the commission sources said.

The details of the procedure for registering expatriate citizens as voters will be chalked out later.

Officials in the EC Secretariat however said Bangladeshi missions abroad must be engaged

India, US agree on defence deal

New Delhi approves sites for 2 US nuclear reactors

India and the United States agreed yesterday a defence deal expected to boost US arms sales in India, as New Delhi also approved sites for two US nuclear reactors, Secretary of State Hillary Clinton said.

At a joint press conference with Foreign Minister SM Krishna, Clinton said the two sides had agreed an "end-use monitoring" arrangement that would provide safeguards for the sale of sophisticated US weaponry to India.

The agreement "will pave the way for greater defence cooperation" Clinton said, while Krishna said it would help the "procurement of US defence technology to India."

A US official said the arrangement was for a provision to be written into future defence contracts, guaranteeing sensitive equipment will be used for its intended purpose and not transferred to a third party.

It will be welcomed by Lockheed Martin Corp. and Boeing Co., which are both competing with Russian, French and Swedish companies for a massive \$12 billion tender to provide 126 fighter jets to the Indian Air Force.

The press briefing came after a day of official meetings between Clinton and a series of senior Indian leaders including Krishna, Prime Minister Manmohan Singh and ruling Congress Party President Sonia Gandhi.

Mugging spree in capital

3 shot, 1 stabbed; 1 succumbs to injury

Unidentified muggers shot and stabbed two men inside a furniture shop at Rokeya Swarni in capital's Kafrul area and snatched away Tk 85,000 yesterday.

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Act quick to stop stone extraction

HC asks govt

The High Court (HC) yesterday directed the government to immediately stop the use of excavator machines in stone quarries at three rivers in Sylhet to protect the natural ecosystem of the rivers, and lives, property and livelihoods of the people living near the rivers.

The three rivers Plain, Dwaki and Dhala flow through Goain Ghat and Companiganj upazilas of the district.

The HC issued a rule upon the government to explain within four weeks why it (government) should not be directed to protect the rivers from mechanised excavation.

The rule also asked the government to explain why it should not be directed to initiate legal measures against such unauthorised and illegal excavating operations and to realise compensation from them for causing damages to the rivers and the people

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Mumbai attacker changes plea to guilty

The sole surviving gunman from last year's Mumbai attacks, a Pakistani national, yesterday pleaded guilty at his trial, admitting for the first time his part in the atrocity that killed 166 people.

Mohammed Ajmal Kasab, 21, told a special prison court -- where he had originally pleaded not guilty -- that he wanted to confess, taking the judge, the prosecution and his own defence lawyer by surprise.

"I plead guilty," he told the court in Mumbai, before narrating how the attacks were carried out, and giving details of his journey from Pakistan with nine other gunmen.

Kasab and accomplice Abu Ismail opened fire with AK-47 assault rifles and threw hand grenades at commuters at the Chhatrapati Shivaji Terminus, killing 52 and injuring 109 in the bloodiest episode of the 60-hour reign of terror.

The pair then fled the station, firing indiscriminately on the way, killing civilians and a number of senior police officers, including the head of the city's Anti-Terrorism Squad.

Kasab, who also placed an eight-kilogram (18-pound) bomb in a taxi that took him to the station and later exploded near Mumbai's airport, killing the driver and a passenger, was the only one of the 10 gunmen to survive.

"I was firing and Abu was hurling hand grenades," he told the court, according to the Press Trust of India news agency.

"I was in front of Abu who had taken such a position that no one could see him. I fired at a policeman after which there was
