



Resourceful Khulna left in the cold

Speakers at The Baily Star roundtable seek special govt allocation for development of the division

Khulna division is lagging far behind the rest of the country despite the fact that it is one of the most resourceful regions with good prospects for industries and tourism, speakers at a roundtable discussion yesterday said.

The speakers at the discussion titled "Development of Khulna division: problems and prospects" organised by The Daily Star at Hotel Royal International in Khulna attributed this . and crises of power and gas.

They also demanded special allocation to the division given that it is a disaster-prone area and natural disasters every year cause huge damage to its resources.

They suggested the government makes the swing to facilitate exports and imports. Mongla Port fully operational, accelerate the region and complete the construction of Khulna Khan Jahan Ali Airport to utilise the full potential of the region.

The government should take immediate

steps to reopen the closed newsprint and jute mills to bring back vibrancy in economy and form Khulna-Sudarbans Development Authority to turn the region into a tourism hub, the speakers said.

"Khulna produces jute and fish in huge quantity, especially prawn but we are ruining these industries as most of the jute mills are closed while it lacks proper infrastructure for fish cultivation and export," said Khulna

Chamber President Shahruzzaman Mortaza. He said the successive governments had backwardness to fragile road communications neglected Khulna, which is why very good river and road links had not developed here and power supply is inadequate.

Mongla Port has very good potential but the authorities are not paying attention to it, Mortaza said demanding its operation in full

"A tonne of goods for exports requires addiconstruction of Padma Bridge, supply gas to the tional transport cost of 20-25 dollars; we have to export them through Chittagong Port as we cannot use Mongla Port," said Abdul Mannan, a jute exporter.

Renal failure of 20 kids to be probed

Body formed to investigate deaths, paracetamol syrup in-take

The government yesterday formed a sevenmember probe committee for investigating the deaths of around 20 children from acute renal failure after taking paracetamol syrup.

The probe body has been formed at a meeting at the health ministry conference room with Additional Health Secretary BD Mitra in the chair. The meeting asked the committee to submit its report within five working days.

While talking to the newsmen, Prof M Moazzam Hossain, chairman of the department of Pediatric Nephrology of BSMMU said the government is considering the issue seriously and the sample collection has already started.

Some eight patients, aged between 11 months and three years, were admitted to the department of Pediatric Nephrology of BSMMU with acute renal failure since last one and a half months and five of them died.

Besides, some 26 children were admitted to Dhaka Shishu Hospital with acute renal failure since June to July 19. Among them, 17 died at the hospital.

Form intelligence units, tackle unrest

JS body recommends shifting jhoot business from garment industries

A House body yesterday made a set of recommendations including shifting jhoot (garment by-products) business from the garments industry areas, and forming intelligence units to prevent further unrest in the sector.

Jhoot business in and around garments factories, nonimplementation of minimum wages fixed earlier, absence of trade unions, and extortions are the major reasons behind labour unrest in garments industry, said the parliamentary

standing committee on labour ministry. ' Jhoot tarders try to establish supremacy over each other creating an unhealthy situation that also leads to unrest in the garments sector. We therefore asked the authorities concerned to take steps for shifting jhoot business out of garments factory areas, Chairman of the committee Shajahan Khan told reporters after it met at the Jatiya Sangsad Bhaban.

A ruling Awami League lawmaker, Shajahan also said, "We have recommended that the government form intelligence units for garments industry. They will provide information SEE PAGE 12 COL 5

Khaleda warns govt not to take 2 Afghan cities hit by Taliban: 14 die AP, Gardez

Eight Taliban militants attacked three government buildings and a US base in two eastern cities yesterday in nearsimultaneous attacks a signature of major Taliban assaults. Eight insurgents and six Afghan security forces died.

Using suicide bombings, gunfire and rockets, the militants attacked the governor's compound, the intelligence department and the police department in the eastern city of Gardez just before 11 am (0630GMT; 2:30 am EDT), officials said.

Tribal elders and government officials had just finished a meeting at the governor's compound about security for the country's Aug. 20 presidential election when gunfire broke out at the nearby intelligence department, said deputy Gov. Abdul Rahman Mangal.

A rocket fired into the intelligence department killed three officers, said Ghulam Dastagir, the province's deputy police chief, while a suicide bombing in front of a police station killed two police. A rocket was also fired at the governor's house, he


