



US, China set broad table for first top-level 'dialogue'

The United States and China will hold their first top-level "dialogue" on a broad range of issues in Washington this week that could set the agenda for the two megapowers for years to come.

The US-China Strategic and Economic Dialogue on Monday and Tuesday is to focus on bilateral, regional and global challenges on economic and foreign policy issues, as well as climate change.

The two biggest developed and developing economies will discuss the global economic and financial crisis, the worst since the Great Depression, and what further steps are needed for recovery and financial system reform.

On the policy track, North Korea's nuclear program, the war in Afghanistan, governance,

health and infectious diseases are among the array of subjects on the table.

A senior US official said "human rights, of course, will be discussed," citing Tibet and unrest in China.

The United States, the world's biggest energy consumer, and China, the biggest producer of carbon dioxide -- the chief greenhouse gas -- are set to tackle the thorny issues of climate change and energy programs.

More than 180 nations are due to negotiate a new climate change deal at a Copenhagen conference in December to replace the Kyoto Protocol.

Launched by President Barack Obama and indiscriminately while it was his Chinese counterpart Hu Jintao in April, the joint meeting aims to bring together high-level officials for intensive, in-depth discussions to SEE PAGE 15 COL 7

Long march by indigenous people to protest attacks

Over two hundred members of the indigenous community yesterday began a two-day long march across 55 kilometres from Porsha upazila to Naogaon town yesterday to protest attacks on indigenous families.

The march was organised under the banner of Jatiya Adibashi Parishad (JAP) after a gang led by Nur Hosssain Master of Soraigachhi attacked the houses of some 74 families including 54 indigenous families at Katirpur on June 12.

They torched, damaged and looted the houses and also randomly beat up indigenous men, women and children during the attack.

Since the attack, some 300 members of the affected families have been left without homes, and the local administration has not come

forward to help them, the protesters allege. On the first day yesterday, the protesters walked some 30 kilometres from Soraigachhi in

Porsha to Mohadevpur upazila sadar. They will be joined by 300 more people this morning as they begin the march to Naogaon town. At Naogaon they will submit a memoran-

In yet another level crossing accident, a woman was killed and her daughter and the driver of a CNG-run auto-rickshaw were injured as a speedy train rammed the three-wheeler trying to cross the level crossing at Malibagh last night.

Reena Majumder, 40, of west Dhanmondi died on the spot. Her daughter Aurin Majumder, 14, was rushed to Dhaka Medical College and Hospital in a critical condition while the driver of the auto-rickshaw was admitted to a local clinic, police said.

Reena and her daughter were returning to their Dhanmondi residence by the CNG-run auto-rickshaw.

Witnesses said the accident occurred around 9:45pm when the driver of the auto-rickshaw attempted to cross the level crossing although the Kamalapur-bound Parabat express from Sylhet was very close.

Officials of Kamalapur Government Railway Police said the body of Reena Majumder and the auto-rickshaw were taken in

their custody. Relatives of the deceased said the ill-fated mother and daughter returned to Bangladesh from the USA last month.
