# Unplanned urbanisation blamed for waterlogging

Speakers at a seminar yesterday blamed land grabbers and corrupt officials of Rajuk, Dhaka City Corporation, Public Works Department and Water Supply and Sewerage Authority (Wasa) for severe waterlogging in the capital.

A large part of the city goes under water whenever it rains due to unplanned urbanisation, causing immense suffering to city dwellers, they said.

Save the Environment Movement organised the seminar on 'Waterlogging in the capital: People's suffering, damage, causes and duties' at its office in the city.

The speakers said that a group of developers with the connivance of corrupt officials have constructed high-rise buildings by filling up water bodies, lakes and canals, which resulted in waterlogging during rains.

Besides, unplanned construction of box culverts and roads as per suggestions of the World Bank also causes waterlogging, they added.

Chairman of Save the Environment Movement Abu Naser Khan, President of Bangladesh Institute of

Planners Dr Sarwar Jahan, Prof Zahir Uddin Chowdhury, Director General of Haor and Water bodies Development Board Maj Golam Kibria Khan, Engineer Shafiuddin Sarker also spoke at the seminar presided over by Vice Chancellor of Buet Dr ANM Shafiullah.

The experts also placed some recommendations, including effective steps to recover water bodies and canals, preparing a master plan for drainage system, long-term and short-term plan to remove waterlogging and utilise rain-water.

Meanwhile, Citizen's Rights Movement along with Sheba, Green Voice and Sundar Jibon also formed a human chain in Hatir Jheel area yesterday demanding removal of the BGMEA Bhaban from the heart of the Jheel.

They also demanded immediate steps to recover 43 canals in the city to get rid of waterlogging problem.

In a statement yesterday, Wasa said it had taken enough preparations and removed waterlogging from the city within a short time on July 27 following record rainfall.

# Correct wrong info in textbooks

Speakers tell roundtable

Speakers at a roundtable yesterday protested incorrect information about and wrong representation of indigenous people in school textbooks.

They also demanded that a special committee comprising indigenous people and experts be formed to correct such wrong information.

Development Initiative for Inclusive People (DIIP) in association with Shikha Shasthya Unnayan Karjakram (SHISUK) organised the roundtable on 'Ethnic minorities, indigenous people's lifestyle: Our perspective' at the National Press Club.

Presenting the keynote paper, DIIP General Secretary Chowdhury Aatur Rahman Rana pointed out that the book 'Paribesh Parichit' for the students of class four and five is full of mistakes about indige-

nous people and that the schoolchildren get totally wrong impression of them by reading these books.

He said that incorrect names of several indigenous communities and the places where they live have been printed in the books. There are discriminatory and stereotyped comments about the lifestyle of the indigenous. The illustrations in the books are also discriminatory.

Apart from the textbooks, 'Bangladesh at a Glance' published by the Department of Films and Publications, journals published by Parjatan Corporation and even the Banglapedia have wrong information, he said.

According to the last census held in the year 1991, around 1.2 million indigenous people live in Bangladesh and the total number of indigenous ethnic groups is 27. Non-government organisations, however, put

the number in between 40 to 50 with around 3 million population.

Jatindra Lal Tripura MP, chairman of the Taskforce on Refugee Affairs, emphasised the need for constitutional recognition of indigenous people.

Dipankar Talukdar, state minister for Chittagong Hill Tracts Affairs, said request has been sent to the education ministry to take proper steps to correct the mistakes.

He also said the government has taken initiative to change the name of Tribal Cultural Institute to Indigenous Cultural Institute.

Prof Sadeka Halim, Narayan Chandra Chanda MP, Dr Sheikh Abdus Salam, Dr Rubaiyat Ferdous, Shaymol Dutt, editor of the Bhorer Kagoj, and Maruf Chini, executive editor of the Amader Shomoy, also spoke.

## 'Lease out water bodies to poor fishermen'

Speakers at a seminar here yesterday emphasised a common system for leasing out government water bodies among poor fishermen to create employment opportunities in rural areas.

They said it is necessary to adopt a poverty focused and environment-friendly policy on government water body management system through inter-ministerial coordination.

They were addressing the seminar titled 'Government water body: Potential source of poverty reduction, nutritional food supply and increase rural employment' at Cirdap auditorium in the city.

They also called for creating a database of water bodies, as those are being misused or grabbed for lack of inter-ministerial coordination.

Fisheries and Livestock Minister Abdul Latif Biswas and Land Minister Rejaul Karim Hira addressed the seminar jointly organised by Fisheries Department and Bangladesh Shrimp and Fish Foundation.

Abdul Latif said if the country's 28000 water bodies could be properly used through fish farming, those would be the most effective sources to cut rural poverty.

The minister, however, expressed his concern that the production of spawn and fry are declining due to the changing environment in water bodies due to filling up of riverbanks by encroachers.

He stressed the need for increasing shrimp production through using modern technology instead of expanding farming areas.

Land Minister Rejaul Karim said the government has adopted a fresh fish policy to increase the production so that the country could export fish meeting the local demand.

He also emphasised on inter-ministerial coordination to properly manage the government water bodies.

Principal Secretary to Prime Minister's office Abdul Karim, Land Secretary Ahsanul Fattah and BSFF Chairman Syed Mahmudul Haque, among others, addressed the seminar.

# Withdrawal of army from CHT a positive step

Speakers say at BBC Sanglap

Withdrawal of army from the Chittagong Hill Tracts (CHT) to implement the CHT Peace Accord is a positive step, and civil law enforcers should keep the law and order situation under control, said the speakers at a BBC Bangladesh Sanglap yesterday.

Commenting on the council of ruling Awami League they said the council did not follow proper democratic principles.

They however hoped that intra-party democracy would be ensured gradually.

Regarding the Tipaimukh Dam issue Finance Minister Abul Mal Abdul Muhith said four out of five names proposed by BNP as specialist were not specialists at all.

"Only Dr Ainun Nishat is a specialist in this regard, but he had felt embarrassed to visit the Tipaimukh site," Muhith added.

The finance minister alleged that BNP and Jamaat are now trying to make Tipai a political issue instead of trying to solve

the problem for the sake of the country.

About the withdrawal of army from CHT, Muhith said, "A section of people were involved in insurgency in the hill tracts, but after the CHT accord they discarded the insurgency, and in line with the peace accord we needed to withdraw army from the area."

Dr Saira Khan, professor of international relations at McGill University in Canada, said there is no need to deploy extra troops in the area, rather the existing troops should be withdrawn according to the peace accord which is yet to be implemented.

BNP leader and former minister Abul Moyeen Khan said they did not scrap the peace accord.

He also raised the question why Awami League could not implement the accord during their tenure from 1997 to 2001.

"The decision to deploy army should be taken basing on the need for security. If needed army should be there and if not they should not be there," he

added.

Poet Asad Chowdhury said nothing should be imposed on anybody.

"The hill people are also the part of Bangladesh. So why army should be deployed there?" he posed a question.

About the AL council Muhith said though none contested for the post of general secretary it was not the best way.

He hoped proper democratic norms would be maintained in all the tiers of the party.

He however said AL President Sheikh Hasina and General Secretary Syed Ashrafur Islam formed the committee after discussing with the party leaders and activists.

Moyeen said proper democratic principle was not followed in the AL council.

He hoped that his party would select leadership through election.

The dialogue on the contemporary issues of the country was organised by Bangla Service of BBC.

# South Asian bodies to display ideas to improve nutrition

Civil society organisations from across South Asia will gather in Dhaka this week to take part in a grant competition where they will display some of the best and most innovative ideas on how to improve nutrition in the region, says a press release.

The development marketplace (DM) competition is hosted by World Bank (WB) and is designed to showcase and fund such innovative approaches, focusing, especially on children under two years of age and pregnant women.

The event styled 'Family and Community Approaches to Improve Infant and Young Child Nutrition' will bring together 60 civil society organisations from Afghanistan, Bangladesh, India, Nepal, Pakistan and Sri Lanka which will compete for 20 grants of up to \$40,000 each to implement their ideas.

"The scale of the under-nutrition problem in South Asia is alarming," said Isabel M Guerrero, vice-president of WB South Asia region.

"Around 45 percent of South Asian children are undernourished which is 60 percent higher than the under-nutrition rate of Sub-Saharan Africa. We have all seen the devastating effect of poor nutrition. It robs a child of a chance to succeed and live a healthy, productive life and contribute to national development. We hope this initiative will raise awareness and arm people with knowledge and information that can help transform nutrition programmes."

The DM was launched in February 2009 by reaching out to communities across South Asia seeking proposals for local, small-scale projects with the potential to be scaled up and replicated.

In just over three months, almost 1,000 civil society organisations from across the region submitted their proposals.

"This DM event will showcase innovative approaches that can be incorporated into local and national nutrition strategies and programming," said Andrea Vermeiren, senior social protection specialist of WB.

"Importantly, it will highlight the need to empower women within their families and communities to address the socio-cultural determinants of under-nutrition."

A number of prominent organisations have partnered with WB to support the South Asia Regional Development Marketplace, including Unicef.
