

Tigers take it all

Bangladesh held their nerve despite wobbles at significant junctures to complete a whitewash in St Kitts. Set a target of 249, they were given a fiery start by Tamim Iqbal and Zunaed Siddiqui before Mahmudullah steered the side through nervy moments to clinch a historic victory.

Things were looking a touch dicey for Bangladesh at 133 for 5 in the 28th over but they recovered through a serene partnership between Mahmudullah and Mushfiqur Rahim, the wicketkeeper. It was almost risk-free cricket as the duo picked singles quietly and stole the odd boundary here and there to get closer to the target. Importantly, they knew the batting Powerplay could be taken later when acceleration was the need of the hour; till then it was time to play safe cricket. Mushfiqur picked up a couple of boundaries in the 38th

over but he was unlucky to be given out caught behind in the 40th over, when replays showed he did not get bat on a flick down the pads.

Bangladesh opted for the batting Powerplay in the 44th over and immediately Naeem Islam smoked three boundaries off Gavin Tonge. Two shuffled flicks followed a biff down the ground and the required rate dipped. Mahmudullah picked a six over long-off against Nikita Miller and Naeem hit another six, off Kemar Roach, before falling to the same bowler but by then the pair had ensured that they made full use of the Powerplay to clinch the win. West Indies were left to rue the first-ball reprieve that they offered to Mahmudullah when Darren Sammy spilled a catch at first slip.

Just as they finished strongly, Bangladesh had started their chase brightly. Tamim, in particular, was in some hurry, rattling three fours in the first over before repeating the dose in the third. The kind of shots also pointed to the poor bowling. Three were flicked fours and the other three were carved over point as Roach

sprayed it around. Tamim later swung Sammy over long-off before smashing one straight to mid-on.

His opening partner, Siddiqui, kept the momentum going with a measured innings. He started with a series of on-side boundaries against Tonge before he settled down to drop anchor as a couple of wickets fell. Mohammad Ashraful edged one behind, Rokibul Hasan was caught brilliantly by a diving Floyd Reifer in the covers and Shakib Al Hasan, who started with a flurry of shots, edged an attempted pull but Siddiqui batted on serenely. Though he got out after reaching fifty, Bangladesh had enough firepower to get past the line.

West Indies lacked similar firepower in the middle as they wasted a good start provided by Andre Fletcher. As they have done in the Tests and the ODIs, West Indies continued to struggle against the spinners. They lost two quick wickets, proceeded to recover smartly through a breezy fifty from Fletcher, only to lose their way against spin and be bowled out for 248 inside 50 overs.

THIRD ASHES TEST Day Three washed out

The third day's play in the third Ashes Test between England and Australia at Edgbaston here on Saturday was abandoned without a ball being bowled because of persistent rain.

Overnight and early morning rain meant the pitch and square were fully covered when the game, which had already been affected by bad weather, should have been restarting at 11:00am local time (1000GMT).

Umpires Rudi Koertzen and Aleem Dar held several inspections before a fresh downpour ended what slim chance there had been of play, with deep pools of water lying on the outfield, at 2:38pm

Windies duo tops list

Bangladesh completed a series whitewash against a weakened West Indies side after winning the third one-dayer by three wickets and it was Bangladesh's stand-in skipper Shakib Al Hasan who got the man-of-the-series award for his brilliant all-round performance.

It was, however, two local players - Travis Dowlin and Kemar Roach - who topped the batting and bowling lists in the three-match series.

Five Bangladeshi batsmen made it to the top-ten batting list but it was 32-year old Dowlin, who made his debut in the series, to become the highest run-getter with an unbeaten hundred in the second ODI.

None of the Bangladesh batsmen could reach three-figures in the series, however, it was refreshing to see the immediate past skipper Mohammad Ashraful scoring back-to-back fifties to follow the top-scorer with 140 runs in 3 games at an average of 46.66.

Shakib, Zunaed Siddiqui, Mahmudullah, Riyad and wicket-keeper-batsman Mushfiqur Rahim were the other Bangladesh batsmen in the list but dashing opener Tamim Iqbal failed to carry his Test form into the one dayers as the left-hander made only 59 runs in three games at an average of 19.66.

The performance of middle-order batsman Rokibul Hasan was also disappointing after an impressive Test series as the right-hander could muster only 37 runs in the three games at an average of 12.33.

Bangladesh spinners once again played the vital role in the series victory but it was West Indies pacer Kemar Roach who topped the wickets column with an impressive ten wickets in three games. Bangladesh's left-arm spinner Abdur Razzak followed him

with seven scalps.

The other left-arm in the Bangladesh side skipper Shakib Al Hasan troubled the

West Indies batsmen most with his accuracy as his economy rate (3.46) shows, but he
