

Spurs test for L'pool

Fernando Torres admits Liverpool face an early test of their Premier League title credentials in Sunday's season opener at Tottenham.

Rafael Benitez's side are expected to mount a strong bid to end Manchester United's three-year reign as champions this term, but Torres knows the Reds must win tricky matches like this weekend's trip to White Hart Lane if they are to improve on last season's second place finish.

Despite taking maximum points from four matches with United and Chelsea last term, Liverpool still ended up four points behind Sir Alex Ferguson's team.

Their Achilles heel was an inability to grind out victories against lesser opposition when either Torres or captain Steven Gerrard were injured.

With Gerrard a doubt for the Tottenham match with an ankle problem, Liverpool could get a chance to show they can cope without their talismanic leader.

Torres, who signed a new contract improving his wages to over 100,000 pounds a week on Friday, said: "We don't need to improve a lot on last season to win the title."

"There is only a slight improvement needed to give the fans and players the title they have wanted for so many years now."

"This is the best Liverpool team there has been in years. That is what many of the experienced players are saying. And now is our time. Second-best is just not going to cut it with me anymore."

Liverpool's hopes of laying down an early marker in the title race haven't been helped by injuries to centre-backs Jamie Carragher, Daniel Agger and Martin Skrtel.

Benitez hopes Skrtel and Carragher will be

able to start on Sunday, but new signing Alberto Aquilani, brought in to replace Xabi Alonso after the Spain midfielder's switch to Real Madrid, is out for several weeks after ankle surgery.

When all his walking wounded are fit, Benitez believes Liverpool will be right in the title mix again and he said: "We had 86 points last season to finish second, and we have more or less the same squad, so maybe we can do the same again or better."

"As for our title chances, the players know we were very close last season and they want to improve. We know what this team can achieve and they will be ready."

Tottenham boss Harry Redknapp is convinced Liverpool have as good a chance as anyone of taking advantage if United stumble.

"Liverpool are a terrific side. Last year they were outstanding. Only losing two games but not winning the league was an amazing statistic," Redknapp said.

"They'll be there this year pushing for the championship, along with Manchester United and Chelsea and Arsenal. It's a big test to see what we are made of."

Redknapp must decide whether to hand Peter Crouch a debut alongside Jermain Defoe or Robbie Keane, but he could be without Jermaine Jenas, who has a calf problem, while defenders Gareth Bale, Jonathan Woodgate and Michael Dawson are all sidelined.

Cameroon defender Sebastien Bassong, who joined from Newcastle for eight million pounds last week, is available after clarification of his suspension from last season.

"When we played Newcastle last year I spoke to Alan Shearer after the game," Redknapp said. "He said 'if I stay at the club there is no way Bassong will ever leave'."

"Alan didn't get the job and he (Bassong) was the first person we went for. He's a young player with a fantastic future."

Chelsea launch Aguero bid

Chelsea have offered Spanish side Atletico Madrid nearly 50 million euros for their Argentine international striker Sergio Aguero, a newspaper reported Saturday.

The English Premiership side would be willing to pay Atletico up to 57m euros if the deal included another Argentine player, Maxi Rodriguez, sports daily Marca said.

Atletico has consistently said that it does not want to let Aguero go.

The 21-year-old son-in-law of Argentina manager Diego Maradona has a rescission clause in his contract with Atletico worth 60 million euros.

He joined Atletico in 2006 from Argentine side Independiente and is under contract with the Spanish team until 2012.

Aguero scored in Argentina's 3-2 friendly victory over Russia on Wednesday.

If he plays for Atletico during the club's Champions League qualifier against Panathinaikos next week he will not be able to play in a European competition for any other side this season.

Toni on the mend

Bayern Munich's Italian striker Luca Toni, currently being treated for an Achilles tendon problem in Italy, is on the mend and should be back at the Bavarian club next week, coach Louis van Gaal said on Friday.

"One of the physios went to see him in Italy and brought back good news," said van Gaal ahead of Bayern's Bundesliga clash Saturday with Werder Bremen.

"We're expecting him to return on August 20. I hope that he'll have no further pain and that he can train with his teammates," added the Dutchman.

World Cup winner Toni, the top Bundesliga scorer in 2007-08, has not participated in any of Bayern's pre-season training sessions because of the pain.

Mark extends Fulham stay

Australia goalkeeper Mark Schwarzer signed a one-year contract extension with Premier League club Fulham on Friday.

Schwarzer, 36, joined Fulham on a two-year contract from Middlesbrough last year and helped the London club finish seventh in the Premier League to qualify for the Europa League.

Schwarzer's performances also earned him the club's player of the season award and he has now been handed a new deal which ties him to Craven Cottage until 2011.

"The club is delighted to announce that Mark Schwarzer has signed a one-year extension to his contract with Fulham - keeping him at the club until the summer of 2011," a statement on Fulham's website announced.

Dinara snaps Kim run

Kim Clijsters' comeback ran into a No. 1 problem. Playing her first tournament in more than two years, the Belgian couldn't keep up with the world's top-ranked player on Friday. Dinara Safina repeatedly broke her serve during a 6-2, 7-5 victory to reach the semifinals of the Cincinnati Open and finish Clijsters' uplifting week back on the court.

With both Williams sisters gone, Clijsters' return became the talk of the 2-million-dollar Western & Southern Financial Group Women's Open. The former No. 1-ranked player took a break in 2007, married basketball player Brian Lynch, gave birth to daughter Jada, then set about returning to the game at a top level.

While she was away, Clijsters watched one player improve more than any other: Safina.

"I really felt today that Dinara played some of her best tennis that I've seen," said Clijsters, who won six of their seven previous matches. "I think by far that's the best she's ever played against me."

No mother has knocked off a No. 1-ranked player since Evonne Goolagong Cawley beat Chris Evert in the finals of the Virginia Slims of Boston in 1978. Thirty-one years later, Clijsters got a good start at it, pushing the pace and

getting a service break for a 2-0 lead.

It unraveled fast. Safina used her powerful forehand to her advantage, hitting shots that eluded Clijsters' reach. She dominated the rest of the set, running off 24 of the last 31 points. For the first time all week, Clijsters looked like a player who had been off the tour for two years.

"I know exactly what to expect from her," Safina said. "For me, she's one of the best players. I thought I was very aggressive today and didn't let her dictate too much."

Clijsters started the second set by pushing the pace and getting another quick break to pull ahead 2-0.

Same beginning, similar ending. Safina broke her serve three times in a row, the last on Clijsters' double fault to take a 6-5 lead. When Safina served it out, Clijsters calmly removed her black wristband and visor, walked to the net, shook her hand, packed quickly and headed out.

Disappointing, but not discouraging. Clijsters played well overall in her four matches during the week, surpassing her expectations in some ways.

"Obviously so far, it's working," she said. "I had really good results, and feel my level here has risen." So much that she was already aching for another shot at No. 1.

"I kind of feel like I want to go out there and do it all over again," Clijsters said.

Fourth-seeded Elena Dementieva also advanced with a 6-2, 6-1 win over Caroline Wozniacki. It's the fifth semifinal this year for the Russian, who lost to Serena Williams at the Australian Open and at Wimbledon in semifinal.

It won't happen again this week. Serena and Venus Williams were bounced from the tournament on Thursday.

Dementieva will play Serbia's Jelena Jankovic, who beat Sybille Bammer 6-0, 6-3 in only 62 minutes. Bammer knocked Serena Williams out of the tournament on Thursday, but managed to win only 10 points while getting swept in her opening set against the fifth-seeded Jankovic.

A day after she upset Venus Williams, Italy's Flavia Pennetta reached the semifinals with a 6-3, 6-3 victory over Daniela Hantuchova of Slovakia. The win set up a semifinal against Safina and assured Pennetta of becoming the first Italian woman to move into the Top 10. Two Italian men, Adriano Panatta and Corrado Barazzutti, were ranked in the Top 10 in the 1970s.

"It means a lot," said Pennetta, currently ranked No. 12. "Everyone expected something like that from the beginning of the year, so everyone talks about it all the time. You know, it's a dream come true for me. I always hoped to be one of the best players in the world, and now I'm there. So it's crazy."

Moyes fumes at Huges

Everton manager David Moyes has launched an astonishing attack on Manchester City after losing patience with their attempts to prise England defender Joleon Lescott from Goodison Park.

Moyes is furious that City boss Hughes has made public his interest in Lescott as well as suggesting that the Toffees boss won't have the final say in whether the centre-back remains on Merseyside.

City have had two bids of 15 and 18 million pounds (24.7 and 29.7 million dollars) rejected for Lescott, while the former Wolverhampton star has handed in a written transfer request which has been turned down by Moyes.

Reports claim Hughes is likely to make a further bid of over 20 million pounds (33 million dollars) before the transfer window shuts on August 31, but Moyes, speaking on Friday, made it clear that only he decides who stays and goes.

"He (Hughes) said they were talking to people who make the decisions here. Well he knows who makes the decisions at Everton and it is me," Moyes said.

"There is no dialogue between us and Manchester City as far as I know. He (Hughes) has never once picked up the phone and given me a call, so he is not going to get the answer. I am the one who makes the decisions here, not like other clubs."

"It has disrupted us. They have been talking about it and we have not been talking about the start of the season that has been disruptive. So maybe that is what the overall plan was."

"I look back and see how Real Madrid did their business with Manchester United when they signed Cristiano Ronaldo. It was done at the tail end of the season, and it was done quickly to allow United to buy if they wanted to do so."

"We cannot be getting offers a week or two to go before the end of the deadline. And the offers they made shows that we value Joleon Lescott far higher than they do."

"Joleon is a massive player for us, we think so much of him and do not want to lose him." Moyes admits City's huge financial offer to Lescott has left the player in turmoil about his future.

The Everton boss is yet to decide whether to play Lescott in Saturday's Premier League opener at home to Arsenal, but he knows the Goodison faithful could give the defender a rough time.

"He has been distracted, he is in turmoil with the situation and you can see how things have gone," Moyes said.

"He has been consistently told by the manager that he will not be sold so he should get his head around that and get on with the job."

"His head has been twisted and I cannot say the way things have been done is right, it is not how we do things at this club."

"But maybe their football club is different, I control things here, maybe it is not quite the same there."

"It has not been handled correctly from over there (City). We do not do our business in public, we would go to the right people to find out what is happening."

"There is not a chance we will sell this close to the end of the window, the offers were not big enough. We think the world of him, as a centre-half and a left-back. He gives us two players in one."

Kasper heads for Sven's County

Sven-Goran Eriksson has overseen his first major acquisition as Notts County's new director of football by signing Manchester City goalkeeper Kasper Schmeichel for a club record transfer on Friday.

The 22-year-old son of former Manchester United star Peter played under Eriksson at Eastlands and has now moved to the League Two side for a fee which is believed to eclipse the 685,000 pounds County paid to buy Tony Agana from Sheffield United in 1991.

Manager Ian McParland told the club's official website: "We're very pleased that Kasper has chosen to come to Meadow Lane."

"He is a significant part of the jigsaw puzzle we're trying to complete before the transfer window closes."

"We look forward to strengthening the team further in the next couple of weeks."

Schmeichel added: "I am very happy to sign with a club with such a long and rich history and such great support."

"I am joining a very ambitious team which is building for the future and it is a very exciting time for us."

"I'm looking forward to working with Ian and the rest of the lads, settling in and getting on with the season."

Wigan land Amaya

Premier League club Wigan signed Spanish defender Antonio Amaya from Rayo Vallecano on a three-year contract on Friday.

Amaya is not expected to be available for Saturday's season-opener at Aston Villa as the deal cannot be completed until international clearance is secured.

Wigan manager Roberto Martinez said: "Antonio is someone I have admired from a distance for a long time, and I am very happy we have convinced him to come to us."

"He is a really powerful lad, technically excellent, with good pace and he will fit in well to our system. I have no doubts about him adjusting to English football."

"He has been the captain of his club for three years, which shows you his leadership qualities."

Amaya, 26, added: "To play in England is a big dream for me. I want to do everything I can to show Roberto Martinez and the people of Wigan they have made a good choice."

Fergie counts City out

Rafa Benitez might claim that Sir Alex Ferguson is worried by Manchester City's incredible spending spree but the man himself appears unconcerned ahead of Manchester United's Premier League opener against Birmingham on Sunday.

Many, including Liverpool boss Benitez, are tipping City to challenge for the Premier League crown currently held by United in the wake of their 100 million pound spending spree during the close-season.

United manager Ferguson, however, insists clubs like City who want to break the stranglehold the top four have had on the English game in recent years will face a tough challenge.

Ferguson, who will hand a debut to new signing Antonio Valencia at Old Trafford this weekend, said: "This is where the interest lies. They (City) have taken us off the back pages and I'm quite happy about that because sometimes I get fed up with reading about us."

"What's going to happen? Well, the only thing that matters is the results on the pitch."

"I don't think there is a threat to the top four. They are all well established. These will be the teams we have to beat."

"I mean the top four have been well established and have got all the right criteria, experience, quality, good stadia, good squads, to me that top four will still be hard to beat."

Ferguson is still without long-term injury victims Edwin van der Sar, Owen Hargreaves and Nemanja Vidic, but could welcome back

Nani after he recovered ahead of schedule from a dislocated shoulder.

Ben Foster (knee), Johnny Evans (ankle) and Rio Ferdinand (back) are all expected to be fit as United begin the defence of their domestic crown.

Birmingham counterpart Alex McLeish, however, couldn't find himself in a worse position after suffering horrendous defensive problems prior to the daunting trip to Manchester.

McLeish may have eased his left-back worries but centre-half still remains a problem area on the cusp of the new season.

McLeish has signed Gregory Vignal on a 12-month deal from FC Lens following a successful trial spell and he will go straight into the team at Old Trafford.

McLeish still needs to find two fit and capable centre backs for the showdown with the champions, with Liam Ridgwell, Scott Dann, Giovanni Espinoza and Martin Taylor all ruled out.

Full back Franck Queudrue could be switched, despite concerns about his fitness, to partner recent signing Roger Johnson, who knows his debut could well turn into a nightmare.

Johnson said: "It's not helped with all the injuries. Me and Scotty (Dann) both had off season operations and he is still not right and with Martin Taylor picking up the injury that he did it's just been carnage defensively."

"We've not been able to get any understanding with each other because I've not played with the same centre-half all pre-season. It's been difficult but in a few weeks we'll have everybody back fit."

'Cesc not for sale'

Arsene Wenger insists Cesc Fabregas is not for sale at any price after Barcelona were once again linked with a bid for the Spain midfielder.

Fabregas left Barcelona as a teenager to join Arsenal but he has repeatedly been a target for the Catalan club over the last three years.

The close-season departures of Emmanuel Adebayor and Kolo Toure to Manchester City and Wenger's struggle to find top-class replacements has left many experts predicting Fabregas will be the next to leave for a more ambitious club.

But Wenger, whose side start their Premier League campaign at Everton on Saturday, said on Friday: "Do you really think we sell now our players one day before the championship starts, players who are basic players of the team? There is no chance."

"You cannot stop people from having a lot of creative imagination during their sleepless nights, but that does not mean we will do it."

"I believe that in life you are committed to clubs with contracts and in no contract is the colour of your blood described."

"We are the beginning of a new season now, and it is important that everybody focuses - me, Fabregas everybody else, just on being successful for the club we love, and the best way we can do that is to do well."

Despite Adebayor and

Toure's exits, Wenger maintains his squad is stronger than this time last year and can win the Premier League for the first time since 2004.

"We are young and have developed. Why should we not be better in August than we were in March?" he said.

"We lost two great players. However, we have bought (Thomas) Vermaelen to replace Kolo and we have Eduardo back, who for me is a great player."

"We have players who develop very well and are

young, like Carlos Vela, Nicklas Bendtner, (Theo) Walcott, who are all strikers, so I do not feel we are short in these positions."

"The ambition is to finish as high as possible. What is as high as possible is to finish first, it is as simple as that."

"The competition is of a high level and many aspire to that, so let's continue to play the game the way we want to play it and I believe we can show that we have made big steps forward."
