

More time needed to start trial of war criminals

Says law minister

Despite budget allocation and updating of relevant laws, the government cannot start immediately the trial of war criminals as the Home Minister Sahara Khatun could not join the office due to her illness.

She suffered waist injuries when she fell in the washroom of her official residence on June 29 and she is now in rest after undertaking treatment in Singapore, sources said.

Talking to The Daily Star on August 13, Law Minister Shafique Ahmed said the

home ministry will appoint the investigators and then the law ministry will appoint the prosecutors and members of the tribunal for holding the trial.

He said names of some probable investigators were submitted to the home minister for scrutinising their profiles, but these were not finalised due to her illness.

So it cannot be said exactly how many days will be needed to complete the job, as it depends on the joining of the home minister to the office, he added.

Shafique said Tk 10 crore

has been allocated in the budget for holding the trial, and his ministry has been scrutinising the recommendations of the law commission on the International Crimes (Tribunal) Act 1973 under which the trial of war criminals will be held.

"We will only accept the law commission's recommendations on the technical points in the law, not all the recommendations," he added.

Shafique said the law commission has recommended bringing amendments to the International Crimes (Tribunal) Act 1973, saying that the

law should be amended with a view to holding the trial of war criminals as individual persons, not as auxiliary forces of the Pakistan army.

It also recommended constituting a comprehensive tribunal with more than one judge in Dhaka so that different benches can hold the trial under the unitary tribunal, he added.

Shafique said the commission also suggested inclusion of a provision in the law so that the government can appeal with the appellate court against the tribunal's verdict acquitting any criminal of charges.

BEPZA returns 35 godowns to food ministry

Bangladesh Export Processing Zone Authority (BEPZA) yesterday returned 59.28 acres of lands in Chittagong with its 35 godowns to Food and Disaster Management Ministry.

With this hand over, the storage capacities of godowns in the country were raised by 35,000 metric tonnes with its existing capacities of 12 lakh metric tonnes.

BEPZA Executive Chairman Brig Gen Jamil Ahmed Khan handed over the documents of the lands at Halishahar of Chittagong to the Food and Disaster Management Secretary Mokhlesur Rahman at the ministry.

The lands and godowns of the central store depot (CSD) in Chittagong were given to the BEPZA at a token price in 2006.

Food and Disaster Management Minister Dr Abdur Razzaque earlier sought assistance from the international donors to build more food stores in the country.

Earlier, the minister also said that the government would build three silos each with 50,000 tonnes rice storage capacity in Mongolia, Chittagong and Postogola in Dhaka and also has a plan to repair 3,333 food warehouses across the country.

The joint secretaries concerned will take necessary steps to resist corruption and unnecessary delay in the activities of the respective departments, the meeting decided.

The meeting directed DSHE to take necessary steps to curb corruption in recruiting teachers at all non-government schools.

Earlier on August 11, the education minister warned all under his ministry of not resorting to corruption, saying that he will continue his battle against bribery and corruption in any activity of the ministry.

Another severed head found in Kushtia

A severed head was found yesterday morning at a Kushtia village less than a week after police had recovered three severed heads from the district town.

Informed by the locals, police recovered the cut-off head wrapped in a polythene bag at about 8:00am lying beside the Kumarkhali-Kuthibari road near Chorailkhol village in Kumarkhali upazila.

The deceased could not be identified immediately. Police said they were searching for the body.

Earlier on August 10, three members of an outlawed organisation were beheaded allegedly by their rivals in Kushtia town. The bodies were recovered from Sonaidangai village in Sadar upazila.

Meanwhile, a suspected outlaw was killed at Gopalnagar village under Mujibnagar upazila in Meherpur yesterday.

The dead was identified as Moslem Uddin, 19, son of Alibuddin Hossain of the village.

Police said the assailants called Moslem out of his house over mobile phone at around 2:30am and hacked him taking to Gopalnagar High School.

On information, police recovered the truncated body of Moslem yesterday morning and sent it to Meherpur General Hospital for autopsy.

Moslem, who was involved with an outlawed party, might have been killed by his rivals over previous conflicts, police said.

The fair venue would remain open to all from 1:00am to 8:00pm.



US sends Taiwan aircraft for typhoon rescue

The United States flew a cargo plane to Taiwan Sunday as China offered to send helicopters to help rescue more than 1,600 people still stranded a week after Typhoon Morakot struck the island.

Those refusing to leave such areas may have to be removed by force, he said.

The official death toll stands at 124 but Ma has warned that the number could rise to more than 500, with hundreds feared buried beneath the rubble in the village of Hsiaolin alone.

After days of mounting criticism, the president convened his first national security meeting Friday and replaced Taiwan's head of emergency operations.

Helicopters criss-crossed mountainous regions in the south, airlifting survivors to safety as 41,000 troops fought raging rivers and crossed collapsed bridges to reach victims, many of whom have been without food for more than a week.

A new phase in the rescue operation began Sunday as troops shifted their focus from evacuations to searching remote areas for survivors and bodies, said Transport Minister Mao Chih-kuo, who is now leading the emergency response.

A total of 1,638 were waiting to be airlifted from 44 severely damaged villages as of Sunday night, Mao told a

news conference.

He said it could take up to six months to rebuild roads and bridges in typhoon-hit areas, making it hard for people to live in some remote villages in the meantime.

Those refusing to leave such areas may have to be removed by force, he said.

"One could hardly imagine the cost if those people continue to stay on the mountains and all of their daily needs have to be airlifted," he said.

A United States military C-130 transport aircraft carrying relief supplies landed outside the southern city of Tainan Sunday afternoon, arriving from an American airbase in Okinawa, Japan, the defence ministry said.

The US was also sending two heavy-lift military helicopters to Taiwan to help in evacuation efforts, Mao said.

The US flights marked the first US military deployment in Taiwan since 1979, when US troops based on the island left after Washington shifted its diplomatic recognition from Taipei to Beijing.

And in a sign of warming relations with China, Beijing offered to provide helicopters, the Taipei-based United Daily News quoted Fan Liqing, spokeswoman for China's

Taiwan Affairs Office, as saying.

The offer would include Russian-made helicopters, currently the world's biggest, which Chinese rescuers used during last year's earthquake in China, the report said.

About 60 countries, the European Union and 19 international and non-governmental organisations have contributed money to relief efforts, the foreign ministry said.

The government said it also received 1.14 million US dollars worth of medical supplies from Singapore and water purifiers and high-speed water-transport equipment from Israel.

Representatives of the US Agency for International Development have arrived to assess what extra aid Taiwan may need. The EU will also send representatives to the island in the coming days for the same purpose.

Typhoon Morakot slammed into Taiwan on August 8, dumping more than three metres (120 inches) of rain that unleashed floods and mudslides which tore through houses and buildings, ripped up roads and smashed bridges.

Admirers have been requested to attend the programmes.
