Trott to keep

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dropped Ravi Bopara.  
Essex batsman Bopara managed just one and nought during England's innings and 80 run fourth Test defeat at Headingley, a result that saw Australia level the five-match Ashes series at 1-1 with the Oval finale, which starts on Thursday, to come.  
Those scores compounded a poor series for Bopara who, batting at number three, has managed just 107 runs in seven innings against Australia at a meagre average of 15.  
England, with Kevin Pietersen out of the series following the second Test because of an Achilles injury, decided they had to do something to stiffen the top-order and so selected Trott, in the squad at Headingley but left out of the final XI.  
"I'm chuffed as hell really. I've been playing pretty well this season so hope I can play well this week," Trott told BBC Radio 5 Live's Sportsweek programme on Sunday.  
"I'm pretty much going to try and stay as relaxed as possible. I'd like to think that under pressure I perform - we'll see this week," added Trott, whose only previous experience of senior international cricket saw him score 11 runs in two back-to-back Twenty20s against the West Indies at The Oval in 2007.  
Trott, who played for South Africa Under-19s but qualified for England on the basis of parentage, has been in fine form this season.  
The 28-year-old reinforced his case for a Test call earlier this week with 121 for Warwickshire, whose director of cricket Ashley Giles is also an England selector, against Nottinghamshire at Trent Bridge.

Safina-Jankovic final

World number one Dinara Safina cruised into the final of the two million-dollar WTA Cincinnati Open on Saturday as Jelena Jankovic clawed her way into the title match.  
Safina needed just 56 minutes to post a 6-2, 6-0 victory over Italy's Flavia Pennetta. She improved to 7-0 lifetime against Pennetta, who was coming off a third-round victory over Venus Williams here as well as a title in Los Angeles last weekend.  
In the final, Russia's Safina will take on fifth-seeded Serbian Jankovic, who emerged from a scrappy match with a 7-6, 0-6, 7-6 victory over fourth-seeded Russian Elena Dementieva.  
Jankovic squandered three match points in the third set as Dementieva forced the tie-breaker.  
She fell behind 6-2 before winning the final six points, finally sealing the victory after 2hr 46min.  
She and Dementieva combined for 13 breaks of serve and 25 double-faults.  
"I don't believe I won this match," Jankovic said.  
There were no such worries for Safina, who reached her eighth final in 14 tournaments this year.  
"Every match I feel better," said Safina, the French Open and Australian runner-up who

eliminated former world number one Kim Clijsters in the quarterfinals to end the Belgian's first comeback tournament.  
"Today, stepping on the court, I was feeling very good and confident. I was feeling very good stepping in."  
Pennetta admitted her run of success, which saw her playing her 11th match in 13 days, had taken a toll.  
She had blisters on her feet and played with her aching right ankle taped.  
"She was playing much better than me," Pennetta said. "I was a little bit tired, of course, but I didn't lose for that. She was playing unbelievable."  
While Pennetta didn't want to make excuses, Safina said she could tell her opponent was running on empty.  
"I know how it is playing that many matches in a row," Safina said. "When somebody starts to put pressure on you from the first, it's tough mentally to face it."  
Safina won the first six points of the match, earned an early break to take a 2-0 lead and never looked back.  
"That was the key for myself. I wanted to put the pressure and to dominate, and not let her get into the match," Safina said.  
By reaching the semifinals, Pennetta ensured she will become the first Italian woman to break into the top 10 when the rankings come out on Monday. She started this week ranked 12th.  
Safina, 23, will try to wrap up her 17th straight week at number one with a title on Sunday.

Rhodes's thoughts on CT

Jonty Rhodes, the former South African player, has said home advantage will mean little in next month's Champions Trophy in South Africa since teams travel a lot more and are used to different conditions these days.  
"The support of the crowd does make a difference if things go a bit flat and they can lift you, but South Africa won't be relying on that," Rhodes told the Supercricket website. "They'll be relying on planning and getting in place all the processes involved in winning."  
Rhodes, a fielding coach for Indian Premier League team Mumbai Indians, said South Africa were favourites for the trophy along with Australia and India. "They [South Africa] are a really well-balanced unit and they are setting standards for the other teams to chase. But Australia are written off far too easily, they will obviously be strong contenders, they have a good record in the competition and they know

how to win. India are also very good, they've learnt how to travel and win and they have destructive bowlers and hitters in their line-up."  
South Africa's strength, Rhodes said, was their consistency, which is important in a 50-over tournament. The top eight teams have been divided into two groups of four each and the top two from each group will qualify for the semifinals of the two-week long tournament.  
"They've been playing great cricket, the team is settled and everyone knows their roles, they've got special players in batting, bowling and fielding. Their preparation and organisation will be excellent and they've learnt how to hit the ground running. They've learnt how to switch on very quickly and the management team of Graeme Smith and Mickey Arthur have been very good at that."  
"But you can't afford to have a bad day. We saw that in the Twenty20 World Cup, where we played great cricket but, to take nothing away from the opposition, someone like Shahid Afridi produced something special."  
South Africa will open the tournament, from September 22 to October 5, with a game against Sri Lanka in Centurion.

Rossi wins in Brno

Italy's Valentino Rossi on a Yamaha won the MotoGP race at the Czech Grand Prix meeting here on Sunday to extend his overall championship lead and all but clinch a ninth world title.  
After a thrilling head-to-head duel with Spanish stablemate Jorge Lorenzo, Rossi profited from the latter's fall five laps from the finish to extend his lead to 50 points.  
Lorenzo had passed Rossi three laps earlier but his spectacular tumble - from which he emerged unscathed - handed Rossi a clear run through to the finish and a 102nd career victory.  
The 30-year-old Rossi, nicknamed The Doctor, is now closing in on Giacomo Agostini's all-time mark of 122 race wins.

Kambli quits int'l cricket

Vinod Kambli, who last played international cricket in 2000 and senior domestic cricket in 2004-05, has announced his retirement from international cricket. He will continue to make himself available for domestic selection.  
Kambli made the announcement at the inauguration of his sports academy, Khel Bharati, in the presence of Virender Sehwag, who inaugurated the academy, and Ramakant Acharekar, who coached Kambli and Sachin Tendulkar during their youth.  
Kambli, 37, has gradually gone farther and farther from the selectors' sights after he was dropped in 2000. His international career was a classic story of promise gone wrong. He announced himself to the world with double-centuries in his third and fourth Tests, but sadly took the fast route to destruction. He made nine comebacks into the ODI team, but played his last Test in 1995, before he had turned 24. Since being out of the Indian and Mumbai teams, he has tried his hand at movies and reality shows on the small screen.

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It's Murray v Del Potro

Andy Murray made sure of claiming the world number two ranking, but he'll have to get past Juan Martin Del Potro to claim the ATP Montreal Masters crown.  
Third-seeded Murray beat French seventh seed Jo-Wilfried Tsonga 6-4, 7-6 in the semifinals and is set to rise to second in the world for the first time in his career.  
Sixth-seeded Del Potro, who won the title in Washington over Andy Roddick last weekend, continued his dominance over the three-time Wimbledon runner-up as he beat the fifth-seeded American 4-6, 6-2, 7-5.  
Del Potro fired 19 aces in a semifinal victory lasting just over two hours.  
"I'm so happy to be in another final," said the Argentine. "It's a great sensation. Andy and I are both very strong on serve. I just played better than him in the important moments."  
Del Potro owns former number one Roddick after winning all three of their meetings. He trails Murray, 3-1, earning his lone victory in their last meeting at the Madrid Masters in May.  
Del Potro trailed 5-4 in the third, saved a match point and then broke Roddick en route to taking the match.  
"I think I'm going to remember that game at 5-all," Roddick said. "I just played a terrible game."  
"It's the first time I've played a loose game like that in a long time. It's unfortunate that I had to end it that way."  
"I feel like my game is pretty good, my serve is certainly better than last week, and it has probably gotten better by the match. It's just a matter of kind of getting your arm back in shape after a little bit of a break."  
Scotland's Murray will replace Rafael Nadal in the slot behind Roger Federer when the new rankings are released on Monday.

"It's great, in terms of rankings it's the biggest step that I've made so far," said the 22-year-old, who is bidding for a fifth title of the season.  
"I played consistently well this year, so far winning a Slam, I've done enough to justify being number two and getting closer to hopefully one day becoming number one - it's one of my goals.  
"I've put in a lot of hard work to get to this stage, and I keep working hard to go one step further."  
Murray's trip to the final insured his promotion after Nadal - back after a break of more than two months nursing tendinitis in his knees - lost in the quarterfinals on Friday to Del Potro.  
The change makes Murray the first player other than Nadal or Federer to rank number two since July 18, 2005, when Australia's Lleyton Hewitt stood second behind Federer.  
"This is very special for me," said Murray. "Roger and Rafa have been one and two for the past five years. I played well and I'll try to justify this new ranking, but it will be very difficult."  
"For five years it's been Rafa and Roger on one and two, they are I think the two best maybe of all time. So it's pretty special to get in between them."  
Murray reinforced his status as the highest-ranked British player since the rankings began in 1973 as he won his 49th match of the season.  
"It's always tough against him, because he dominates or he dictates what happens in the match because of the way that he plays," Murray said of 2008 Australian Open finalist Tsonga.  
"I just had to stay solid and make enough balls for him to make a few mistakes and me to come up with a few big returns."  
Murray recovered from an early break to win the opening set. In the second-set tiebreaker he trailed 4-2, and saved two Tsonga set-points before claiming the victory on his second match point.  
"Andy's a very good player and it's tough to go to the net every time against him," said Tsonga. "But that's fine, I'm okay with that."

Dilshan may open in Test

Sri Lanka are likely to go in with a new opening combination for the first Test against New Zealand beginning on Tuesday in Galle. Having sat out the limited-overs leg of the recently concluded home series against Pakistan due to injuries, Tillakaratne Dilshan is likely to feature at the top of the order on his return.  
Dilshan, 32, had fractured his right index finger and underwent several stitches above his left eye on the second day of the third Test against

Pakistan at the SSC. But following his 68 off 60 balls while opening for Sri Lanka Cricket Development XI against the New Zealanders in the tour game in Colombo, he is likely to replace Malinda Warnapura as Tharanga Paranavitana's opening partner.  
"The selectors told me to have a knock here [in the tour match] as opener and I got a great opportunity to bat in the middle facing the new ball," said Dilshan. "It was good practice for me I am now ready for the Test match."  
"The coach and [Kumar] Sangakkara discussed with me and they wanted me to come up the order as an opener to bal-

ance the side. I said if you want me to open I will do it. It's a new position for me in Test cricket. It's not easy like in the one-dayers, but I will try to deliver 100 per cent. I am ready to accept the challenge."  
It will be the first time Dilshan will be opening the innings during his 55-match Test career, during which he has scored 3,166 runs at 41.11. The pressure will also be eased off as he would no longer be required to don the wicketkeeping gloves (as he did in the Test series against Pakistan) with Prasanna Jayawardene having recovered from a finger injury.  
Dilshan has continually strengthened his reputation as a limited-overs specialist, which has fetched him many accolades, the most recent being named man-of-the-tournament at the World Twenty20 in England. However, he was keen to repeat the success in the longest format as well.

Freddie set for finale

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absence of Kevin Pietersen, their star batsman, and like Trott, born in South Africa, after he was ruled out of the series following the second Test with an Achilles injury.  
All-rounder Flintoff, the hero of England's triumphant 2005 Ashes campaign, was controversially left out at Headingley after the selectors feared his longstanding knee injury meant he would not get through the match.  
During the game his fellow Lancashire pace bowler James Anderson suffered a hamstring injury but Miller said he anticipated both players to be available for selection.  
Flintoff, the bowling star of England's second Test win at Lord's and their top-scorer in

the drawn third Test at Edgbaston, has been desperate to play a full part throughout the campaign after announcing on the eve of the Lord's match this would be the final Test series of his injury-plagued career.  
England's selectors now face a tricky problem, with their side needing to take 20 wickets to win at The Oval.  
Assuming they recall Flintoff and retain Harmison, their quickest bowlers, someone else will have to make way and that will also be the case if they play a second spinner in Panesar.  
Australia need only a draw at The Oval to retain the Ashes they won 5-0 on home soil in 2006-07.

"I am not worried that I am playing in a Test but play in my own positive way and try to score runs off every ball," Dilshan said. "I am not going to change my gameplan because it is a Test. I will try to play to my strengths."  
"I've been in good form in the last one-and-a-half years and I will try to continue that form. If the ball is in the right area to hit I will go for the shot straight away. I am not thinking whether it's one-day or Test cricket and whether it's the first over, it doesn't matter."
