

WOMEN WITH DISABILITIES

Call to review law to ensure rights

Speakers at a dialogue yesterday demanded the government take steps for immediate review of the existing laws and policies for persons with disabilities, because it has failed to address the needs of women with disabilities.

There is no mention of women with disabilities in Disability Welfare Act 2001 and National Policy for Persons with Disabilities 1995 and Prevention of Women and Child Repression Act 2000 amended in 2003, they added.

The speakers said even the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women (Cedaw) did not mention their rights.

The national dialogue on Women with Disabilities Rights Implementation was organised by Bangladesh Protibandhi Kalyan Samity (BPKS) at the National Press Club in the city.

The speakers also underlined the importance of changing the rules of business of every ministry to address the issue of disability.

Presenting a keynote paper, Ashrafun Nahar, coordinator of Women with Disability Network, BPKS, said

women with disabilities face triple disadvantages, first for their disabilities, secondly gender and then for poverty. So, the issue needs a special attention.

She pointed out that these women are easy target of physical, sexual and psychological abuses which often go unreported for lack of social and legal support.

According to a survey conducted by World Health Organisation in 2000, persons

with disabilities constitute about 10 percent of the total population in Bangladesh. The total number is around 1.5 crore. Of them, about 75 lakh is women with disabilities. Only two percent of these women get the opportunity of education.

Speaking as the chief guest, Foreign Minister Dipu Moni said forming a law is not enough unless it is implemented with strict monitoring which requires political commitment.

She stressed the need to integrate persons with disabilities into mainstream development and create access for them into all spheres of life. To achieve that, it is urgent to find out the actual figure of the persons with disabilities.

On the other hand, Prof Imtiaz Ahmed of International Relations department at Dhaka University said currently war, terrorism and disasters, both natural and manmade, are the main reasons behind disability.

Rawshan Ara Begum, director general of the Department of Women Affairs, Abdus Sattar Dulal, founder and executive director of BPKS, Diane Lamberg-Liszkay, attaché of European Commission, and Lisa Johnson, capacity building officer of BPKS, also spoke.

Environmentalists at a human chain yesterday demanded the parks in the city be saved.

'Comprehensive law a must to fight human trafficking'

Poverty and lack of adequate legal framework potentially create obstacles to the fight against trafficking in women and children, experts at a seminar said yesterday.

"The primary barrier is the absence of a single comprehensive law to combat human trafficking," said Advocate Salma Ali, executive director of Bangladesh National Women Lawyers' Association (BNWLA).

RDRS (Rangpur-Dinajpur Rural Service) Bangladesh organised the seminar on 'Dimensions of trafficking in women and children and barriers to implementation of laws' at Spectra Convention Centre in the city.

Dignity and privacy of a trafficked and sexually abused woman must be protected during the investigation and trial, Salma Ali said.

Stressing the need for integrated efforts by the countries concerned, she said extradition treaty is required to tackle the issue effectively and bring the accused back from abroad.

Syeda Rizwana Hasan, trustee board chairperson of RDRS Bangladesh, said the police treat most cases of trafficking as abduction, which weakens the legal course and undermines the gravity of the offence.

State Minister for Women and children Affairs Shirin Sharmin Chowdhury said the foremost reasons behind trafficking in women and children include poverty, lack of education, lack of social awareness and natural disasters.

Rasheda K Chowdhury, executive director of Campaign for Popular Education (Campe), said that

mass awareness about the issue could be raised by incorporating materials in the post-primary education curriculum or as supplementary reading. It can also be achieved through street drama, music and extra-curricular activities.

Women and children are mostly trafficked to India, Pakistan and Middle Eastern countries, said Salma Ali.

Delwar blames govt for oppression

BNP Secretary General Khandaker Delwar Hossain yesterday accused the government of adopting 'autocratic attitude' and continuing torture and oppression of opposition leaders and activists.

He also protested the imposition of a ban on a memorial discussion at Manikganj where he and BNP leader Salauddin Quader Chowdhury were invited as guests.

The meeting was scheduled for yesterday at Daulatpur Upazila, but the upazila administration imposed the ban as the ruling party's local unit also called a meeting at the same venue.

Delwar said the government has infringed the peo-

ple's right to freedom of expression by imposing the ban on peaceful meeting.

Meanwhile, the BNP standing committee member Moudud Ahmed yesterday said it would not be a right decision to change the name, uniform and logo of Bangladesh Rifles (BDR) only for a few people's crime.

"BDR has a glorious past. So, the issue should be discussed in parliament before making any changes," he told reporters at his Motijheel chamber in the city.

The former law minister also said the people expect quick trial of real culprits involved in the carnage at BDR headquarters, but a group in the government is hatching a conspiracy to delay the trial.

Digitalised land management by '14

Says minister

Land Minister Rezaul Karim Hira yesterday said the land management system in the country would be digitalised by 2014.

Hira said they have placed a budget of Tk 3,000 crore to the government in this regard and a project has been taken to digitalise the land management system by 2014.

The minister said this while he was speaking at a programme titled "Meet the Press" organised by Dhaka Reporters Unity at its office.

He said all records and registration of land will be carried out digitally and the work has already begun in five moujas in Savar.

He said the ministry will fill up the posts of 312 AC land which have been lying vacant for years.

Hira said his ministry has handed over Khas land to around 22 thousand landless people by June this year while it is working for handing over 28 thousand jalmahals to people living on fishing.

"We are also trying to retrieve the land encroached by land grabbers over the years," he said, adding that land distribution among the landless would continue.

He said the ministry will implement the "Guchchagram project" in 184 police stations in four years at a cost of Tk 187 crore to provide landless people with home.
