

Mysteries pile

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last few years. The way investigation officials had worked under the past BNP-led government threw into question the credibility of their findings.

Prof Imtiaz Ahmed, professor of international relations at Dhaka University, said, "The perpetrators seem to have tried to achieve many goals through the August 21 blasts. They might be some quarters at home with links abroad.

Their motives could be keeping the country underdeveloped, destroying its secular spirit, hampering its economic growth, etc. The government should form a separate investigation organisation to unearth the whole thing including the motives and the masterminds."

He noted that a clear picture should emerge so preventive measures can be taken to stop recurrence of violence. The findings can be published.

Socio-political analyst Prof Sirajul Islam Chowdhury, historian Prof Syed Anwar Hossain and former inspector general of police ASM Shahjahan too emphasise forming a national body with experts drawn from a wide spectrum of professions to analyse an attack from varying viewpoints.

On this day in 2004, terrorists hurled grenades at the then opposition leader Sheikh Hasina on an Awami League rally on Bangabandhu Avenue.

Hasina survived the attempt on her life but saw 23 of her party leaders and workers killed and scores injured.

Incumbent President Zillur Rahman's wife Ivy Rahman was among those who died.

Three former investigation officers in the August 21 blasts case now face criminal proceedings for carrying out misleading probe during the BNP-led four-party rule.

Besides politicisation, limited purview of the probe and lack of efficient investigators have kept the nation in the dark about the conspiracy behind the attack.

From a court's verdict based on charge sheet, people can at best know who executed the attack. The masterminds, motives and the entire conspiracy would still elude them.

Former caretaker government adviser ASM Shahjahan, who was CID chief twice, suggested constituting a committee to delve into the conspiracies behind the major terror attacks and assassinations since criminal investigation cannot necessarily reveal everything.

All information except those which may hamper national security should be let out in the open in the public interest, he continued.

"Uncovering of the whole truth is essential for the sake of justice and the rule of law."

Referring to the recent US revelations about Bangabandhu killing, the analysts said the criminal investigation of this case could not unearth such aspects, which are too vital for the nation to miss.

Syed Anwar observed, "In cases like August 21 blasts, trial and execution of verdict are never enough. We need to know everything about the plots behind."

The government should constitute an enquiry commission that would bring out the truth and publish it in white papers."

"I am just counting my days. I can't even manage the studies of my two daughters - Joya and Priya," Ruma said, shedding tears. She is dependent on well-wishers for her young family's meagre meals.

Asma Zerin Jhumi, who is now an AL MP in the reserved quota, said Ruma was not officially being given anything from the party but her former colleagues were helping out whenever they could.

Still that is not enough to keep a family alive, she said.

Sheikh Hasina helped send Ruma to India four times for treatment between 2004 and 2005. At the time Awami League helped with monthly monetary assistance, also and she provided them an amount monthly. But after 1/11, the help stopped.

Many other victims of the August 21 grenade attack are doomed to a life of misery.

The analysts pointed out that political and financial influence, lack of professionalism and inefficiency of investigators as major problems in ensuring a fair probe into the incident.

Prof Imtiaz said whoever Huji or JMB had carried out the August 21 attack is a non-state element.

They have network inside and outside the country and carried out the attacks efficiently dodging the intelligence agencies.

The perpetrators were well prepared and disciplined. Other well-organised forces might have been behind them. Even a part of the state machinery might have been linked to such non-state elements, he said.

He said non-state elements carrying out subversive activities can remain untouched only if the foundation of a country's democratic structure is weak.

He suggested that the government assign think-tanks to conduct research or to find out facts behind such attacks and form a body like "Public Security Council".

STATUS OF AUGUST 21 CASES

Charges were pressed in two August 21 cases on June 11 last year against 22 people after years of drama over investigation during the tenure of BNP-led coalition government.

Top Harkat-ul-Jihad (Huji) leader Mufti Abdul Hannan and BNP leader and former deputy minister Abus Salam Pintu are among the charged accused.

A Dhaka court on August 3 issued an order for further probe into the incident as the earlier one failed to identify the collectors and suppliers of grenades used in the attacks.

Senior ASP of CID Abdul Kader Akand was made the new investigation officer as the court had asked the police chief to submit the report within two months.

"I have just reviewed the case documents and started probe into the incident," Kader told The Daily Star yesterday.

"We have asked Rajuk not to delay in giving permission if owners want to unify their land," said the state minister.

He said high-rise buildings would be constructed in every district and divisional headquarters to solve housing problems.

GP shares to hit

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As many as 6.94 crore shares will be floated through GP's IPO to draw Tk 486.08 crore from the capital market.

After the meeting, SEC Executive Director Anwarul Kabir Bhuiyan told journalists that "The Grameenphone's IPO will widen market depth."

He also said it might have a temporary impact on the liquidity flow during the subscription period, but will not have "any major impact on the market."

The value of the approved IPO is Tk 37 crore more than the company's proposed offer of Tk 449 crore.

On July 2, the SEC also approved the increase in the volume of the company's pre-IPO to Tk 486.07 crore from Tk 420 crore with face value of each share priced at Tk 10, plus Tk 64 in premium.

In December last year, Grameenphone's Tk 420 crore pre-IPO was settled with a huge response on the local market.

Grameenphone will be the first telecom company to enjoy a corporate tax cut of 10 percentage points.

The government in the new budget announced that mobile phone operators might be given the chance to pay 35 percent corporate tax instead of the existing 45 percent if they get listed on the stock exchange.

But they must float 10 percent of the paid-up capital on the share market, of which pre-IPO cannot be more than half.

He said they would submit an assessment report on apparel industries to the ministry by next week.

"We are worried because the government has increased gas price from this month although the gas supplied is not enough to run an industry," Hoque said.

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Due to legal tangles, the implementation of Mohobra Water Supply Project of Tk 197.96 crore was delayed, he added.

The project got Ecenec approval in September 2003.

The cabinet purchase committee later rejected the work order due to irregularities in the tender process of the first lowest bidder.

It asked to go for bidding again, which prompted the second lowest bidder EPI-BFEW Consortium to file a case in this connection.

The High Court ordered awarding the contract to EPI-BFEW on February 28, 2008.

There being a huge gap between the first and second lowest quoted price, Wasa filed a writ petition.

Toxic liquor claims 3 lives

Three slum dwellers died and three others fell sick Wednesday and yesterday after taking poisonous alcohol at Zahuri Mahalla in the capital's Mohammadpur area.

The deceased were identified as Mohammad Hossain, 35, Abu Kalam, 45, and Palash Miah, 22, while Zakir Hossain Molla, 42, Jumman Hossain, 24, and Abul Hossain, 32 are sick.

On Wednesday, rickshaw-puller Palash died at his shanty and the shanty owner Mohammad Hossain died at a private hospital. Roadside fruit vendor Kalam suffered the same fate yesterday.

Among the sick, Zakir was admitted to Suhrawardi Hospital while two others at a local clinic.

Car driver Rabiul Islam, son-in-law of deceased Zakir Hossain, told The Daily Star, "Palash managed the alcohol from nearby Geneva Camp at Mohammadpur on Monday."

Mohammadpur police said none of them were admitted to any government hospital and all three deceased were buried without informing police in a bid to avoid further probe by the law enforcement authority.

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Management Committee

has already been trained and separate units have been opened in the medical college hospitals and district level hospitals. Besides, screening is going on at 16 entry points of the country.

"People should strictly maintain personal hygiene and inform health professionals if they suffer from any kind of flu," he added.

It is one of the three main forms of plague and its incubation period is one to seven days, he added.

Primary pneumonic plague results from inhalation of fine infective droplets and can be transmitted from human to human without involvement of fleas or animals. Untreated pneumonic plague has a very high fatality rate, the experts said.

Fewer officials and students turned up low while day labourers became the innocent victims of the blockade, locals said.

Abdullah Al Masud, PBCP president of Khagrachhari district unit told our correspondent that the blockade had turned into a strike as mass people supported us.

Additional Superintendent of Police Mohammad Amer Jafar said additional police were deployed no less than 50 points in the district.

Deputy Commissioner Mohammad Abdullah said no untoward incident was reported, as security forces were present at several places in the district.
