

Biman finally makes profit

Earns Tk 5.91cr

in 2007-08

Ending three years in a row in the reds and decades of mismanagement, Biman Bangladesh Airlines Ltd achieved a net profit of Tk 5.91 crore in the 2007-2008 fiscal year.

Biman insiders said this is something to cheer about in the problem-ridden national flag carrier especially when it is struggling to maintain flight schedules with its seven ageing aircraft.

Several Biman officials said Biman could have gained more profit had it two to three additional planes in its fleet.

"Biman needs some two or three more aircraft on emergency basis as the existing Biman fleet can hardly maintain flight schedules, giving opportunities to its competitors to capture its market share," said Abdul Mamud Khan, a Biman high official.

Biman made huge losses over the last few years due to

Sale of sugar through TCB from tomorrow

Max price Tk 42 a kg

Private sector refiners will distribute sugar in the capital through the Trading Corporation of Bangladesh (TCB) dealers from tomorrow in a bid to bring its price down, said the sugar refiners yesterday.

The decision was taken at a meeting between the refiners and Commerce Minister Faruk Khan at his secretariat office.

Recently, the price of sugar in the local market soared despite efforts from both

Reserve forests turn barren

Timber traders team up with forest officials to plunder Rangamati greens

SHANTIMOY CHAKMA, Rangamati

Illegal logging continues unabated in the reserve forests in Rangamati, contributing to deforestation and destruction of wildlife and depriving the government of huge revenue.

Almost all the reserve forests stretching over 6.85 lakh acres in four upazilas -- Longudu, Barkal, Bilaichhari and Kaptai -- in the district have assumed a barren look due to mindless logging and felling of trees.

Sources say dishonest timber merchants in connivance with a section of corrupt forest officials smuggle thousands of cubic feet precious teak every night.

There are four reserve forests in the district -- Riwinkhali Reserve Forest in Farua, Bilaichhari, Sitapahar Reserve Forest in Kaptai, Kachalong Reserve Forest in Longudu and Barkal Reserve Forest.

Lumberjacks have depleted two-thirds of these forests by unabatedly felling the valuable trees of teak, mehngani and gamar.

Locals allege every night at least 10 to 15 Chanderghari (an improvised motorised vehicle), trucks and boats laden with illegally logged timber pass through Kaptai to Balirhat in Bakalia, Chittagong.

They also allege the foresters under the CHT South Forest Division engage local poor people in the theft of wood. Sometimes the officials also hire outsiders as day labourers to cut down trees, they add.

The locals also blame a few influential timber traders from Rangamati and Chittagong for this daily plundering of the greens.

The menace of illegal logging has recently reached a new height, prompting two authorised timber merchant bodies -- Upajatiya Kathbabsayee O Jotemalik Kalyan Samity and Rangamati Kathbabsayee Samobay Samity Ltd -- to formally appeal to the state minister for forest for immediate intervention.

The timber merchants, who are in the trade for long and doing business with repute, allege

London wants Dhaka to rally for fair deal

UK ministers say voice of Bangladesh too important in UN climate summit

Britain expects Bangladesh to be vociferous at the upcoming UN climate change meet in Copenhagen, for reaching an ambitious, sustainable, and equitable deal.

Stating that developed countries have the major responsibility for carbon emission resulting in global warming, two UK ministers yesterday said developing countries therefore must act together as a region to claim additional resources.

British Minister for International Development Douglas Alexander, and Energy and Climate Change Minister Ed Miliband made the statements at a media briefing in Radisson Water Garden Hotel in the capital

before leaving Bangladesh following a two-day visit.

They met the prime minister and cabinet ministers, and exchanged views with climate change experts about the key ingredients of the desired fair deal to be achieved at Copenhagen, Denmark in December this year. The UK ministers also visited a sandbar island in Sirajganj.

"The voice of Bangladesh is extremely important in Copenhagen to get the best out of climate change negotiations," said Ed Miliband, adding that 45 million people in Bangladesh are vulnerable to flooding annually. Millions are also vulnerable to cyclones, he added.

"Given its vulnerability to climate change,

Climate conference calls for quick action

Terming the Hindu Kush-Himalayan region 'hotspot for climate change', the south Asian delegates at the conference in Kathmandu declared their visions saying immediate actions are required to protect the water sources that the climate change mostly affect.

Uday Raj Sharma, secretary of Nepal's ministry of Environment, read out the visions at the end of the two-day conference on 'Climate Change' focusing the Himalayas.

Though the government and non-government delegations discussed about the cooperation and setting common agenda for south Asia, the representatives could not come up with any official 'Kathmandu declaration' as Indian delegation left Nepal on Monday, the first day of the conference, and Bhutan did not join the conference.

"The Indian environment secretary Vijay Sharma left on the

Pak forces kill 35 in Khyber

41 bodies found in Swat

Government forces destroyed four militant bases and killed more than 35 insurgents yesterday in battles near Pakistan's fabled Khyber Pass, the main route for supplies to Nato troops in Afghanistan, the military said.

Elsewhere in the northwest, the army claimed that 105 Pakistani Taliban fighters had surrendered to the military in the Swat Valley, where a suicide bombing over the weekend prompted a security crackdown that has left scores of militants dead.

Eight of them are close aides to Swat Taliban chieftain Maulana Fazlullah, said Brig. Salman Akbar, the army commander of Kabal town in the valley.

Earlier at least 41 bodies, mostly of Taliban militants, have been found in Pakistan's Swat valley over the past 24 hours, officials said Tuesday, describing them as revenge killings by residents.
