

Jubo League men attack houses in Barguna

A group of Jubo League (JL) cadres, who were hired by a disputed land claimer, attacked and looted the house of his opponent yesterday.

The JL cadres also slaughtered a cow of the victims and arranged a feast at Ultakhalil village under Amtali upazila of Barguna district.

Mizanur Rahman, officer-in-charge (OC) of Amtali Police Station, told The Daily Star over phone that two men of Golam Mustafa Howladar and Salam

Zomaddar have been locked in a land dispute since long. Salam hired JL cadres by Moazzem Hossain, upazila JL president, to take control of the disputed land.

Accordingly a group of JL cadres riding on 15/20 motor-cycles attacked the house of Mustafa and took the possession of the disputed land.

But being failed to enter the brick-built house of Mustafa the cadres looted cash and other valuables including documents of properties from the house of Sona Mia Howladar, brother of Mustafa.

The attackers also slaughtered a cow of the victims and arranged a feast on the spot in open daylight.

The OC was also assaulted by the miscreants when he visited the place at about 3:30pm.

When contacted, upazila Awami League President G M Delab refused to make any comment on the atrocities of JL cadres and told this correspondent that he visited the spot with other party leaders to compromise the matter.

Acknowledging the facts, Barguna Police Super Sidiqul Rahman told The Daily Star that police brought the situation under control with the help of AL leaders and escorted the victims to police station.

Govt to buy 100 buses for BRTC

The government is set to buy 100 new buses for the Bangladesh Road Transport Corporation (BRTC).

Communications Minister Syed Abul Hossain yesterday approved the 'Notification of Tender Award' to the supplying organisations who would purchase the 52-seated 100 buses, which will ply the city roads, at the cost of Tk 33 crore, sources in the ministry said.

The buses would be handed over to the BRTC authorities within two or three months, they added.

MISAPPROPRIATION OF RICE UP chairman forced to buy rice for VGF cardholders

Mostafapur union parishad (UP) chairman in Madaripur was forced to distribute rice among 500 Vulnerable Group Feeding (VGF) cardholders on Thursday after they laid siege to the UP Bhaban on charges of selling a major portion of rice.

The VGF cardholders brought an allegation of mis-

appropriation against UP Chairman Kazi Abul Bashar.

The chairman, however, was compelled to buy rice from the marketplace under pressure and distributed them among the cardholders.

Sources said Bashar, who is a Rokan of Jamaat, drew 20 metric tones of rice for distribution among 2,000 VGF cardholders on Wednesday, but distributed the food grains to 1,200 people only.

The next day, the stock of rice ran out after distribution of the rice among only 300 people, which prompted the remaining 500 cardholders to stage an angry demonstration in the afternoon.

The agitating people then

laid siege to the UP Bhaban when the chairman was in the office. Police rushed to the spot and brought the situation under control.

The chairman finally purchased 17 sacks of rice from the marketplace and distributed the rice among the 500 cardholders.

The recipients alleged that from the beginning, they were given rice eight to nine kilograms, but under the social safety-net programme, each cardholder is supposed to get 10 kilograms of rice.

Upazila Nirbahi Officer Siddiqur Rahman said he has already issued a notice asking the UP chairman to show cause within seven days.

Muggers active around banks

Simultaneously they are trying to crack down on criminals at their village homes, he said.

The muggers who swoop on bank clients mostly hail from Comilla and Barisal districts and stay at residential hotels in the capital, he added.

They have already identified six such gangs, each having at least eight muggers on average.

DB sources, however, said law enforcers are yet to trace out the gangs of muggers involved in recent 10 incidents of mugging.

Nasir, the assistant commissioner, said earlier muggers used to rob people inside banks. They applied distraction technique; they just grabbed the money and ran away.

But in recent times muggers have used motorbikes and firearms while snatching and very often they succeed in

evading the law enforcers.

After a transaction of a large sum of money informers inside the bank inform the gang members waiting outside on motorbikes. As the client comes out they follow him and at a convenient place they snatch the money at gunpoint, he said.

The muggers generally do not commit the crime near the bank, as law enforcers in both uniform and plainclothes are deployed in and around the city banks. So the special team of DB set up their check posts at the strategic points in the capital, he said.

For instance, he described an incident of mugging when two muggers snatched Tk 6.32 lakh from employees of the Benevolent Textile Services in Ramma area on July 27.

During the incident the muggers on a motorbike followed the employees who

drew the money from the Motijheel branch of Standard Chartered Bank and were heading towards Moghbazar. The muggers stopped them in Ramma area and snatched the money at gunpoint.

Bank client sources said some criminals also deceive traders and businessmen through forging bank pay orders.

A gang cheated an engine oil company of around nine-lakh taka through a fake pay order on July 16 in Gulshan.

The business firm filed a case with the Gulshan Police Station in this connection.

According to the case statement a fraud received 30 drums of engine oil worth over Tk 8.73 lakh against a pay order of Sonali Bank but while the pay order was sent to Baridhara branch of Sonali Bank it said the pay order was fake.

"Greater clarity in communicating policy intentions to the public is also essential to shore up confidence," he said.

Strauss-Kahn was due to travel to London later Friday for a two-day meeting of finance chiefs from the Group of 20 developed and developing countries in advance of a September 24-25 summit in the northeastern US city of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

The global recovery, Strauss-Kahn said, would likely be "relatively sluggish," with unemployment continuing to rise through next year.

A jobless recovery remains a risk. Having so many people out of work has significant economic costs, ranging from lower private demand to a decline in potential growth if structural unemployment

rises," he said.

"The social consequences are potentially even more worrisome."

Regulatory reform momentum was lackluster, he noted, urging countries to avoid "complacency" as financial markets improve.

"The reform effort is not proceeding as quickly as is necessary to address the problems raised by the crisis," he said.
