"There is a question of morality. We think he has set a very bad example for our cricket. Anyway we have

already made up for his loss by confirming Imrul Kayes," he added.

Tamim however gave a different explanation regarding the controversy and said that the treatment he got from an Abahani

changed my mind only because of money," was the confirmation from the left-hander about joining the Motijheel outfit.

"I want to clarify my position regarding the issue. Yes, it's true that verbally I agreed with Abahani. And I was prepared to keep my commitment but during my visit to Malaysia, I got a phone call from a Mohammedan official who offered me one lakh taka more than the amount Abahani had offered.

Alvaro slates BFF

Abahani's Argentine trainer Diego Alvaro slammed the Bangladesh Football Federation (BFF) for delay in finalising the schedules of the season's curtain-raising tournament, the Federation Cup, as the Dhanmondi-based outfit began their second phase of training yesterday at the Dhaka University ground following a half-a-month conditioning camp at the Bangladesh Krira Shikha Protisthan.

"With less than one week to go before the start of the tournament, we still don't know who our opponents are and it is crazy. Football is not a game of only running behind the ball as it is a game of mind too and the players need to prepare themselves mentally according to their opponents," said Alvaro, who joined Abahani in the later part of July.

The BFF is scheduled to do the groupings today and the tournament will get underway on September 10 at two venues in the capital.

Two-time B. League champions Abahani are

the first side to appoint a foreign trainer and the 37-year-old trainer was pleased to have seen the facilities at the BKSP in Savar, but equally expressed his dissatisfaction over Abahani's Dhanmondi ground, which is still unprepared following the earth filling as well as the planting of new grass and it needs a couple of days more to be ready for training.

"I have just followed the training routines what your national team did and I am satisfied with the level of fitness the players gained during the short period of conditioning camp," said Alvaro, who was however not satisfied with the players' food habit.

The Argentine believes it is the responsibility of the players, who are professionals, and not me what to do to maintain their fitness level throughout the season.

Alvaro said that he would now be working on the match situations during the second phase of training.

Head coach Amolesh Sen also expressed his pleasure over Alvaro's input and said that he now could focus only on the game plan as the trainer was looking after the fitness level of the players.

Aus clinch a thriller

Australia captain Michael Clarke praised two of the newcomers to the tour of England as his side put their Ashes defeat behind them with a tense four-run win in the first one-day international.

Callum Ferguson won the man-of-the-match award for an unbeaten 71 at the Oval on Friday and Cameron White weighed in with 53 as Australia, returning to the scene of their 1973 fifth-Test Ashes losing defeat, went 1-0 up in this seven-match series.

Ferguson's innings was the centrepiece of Australia's 260 for five, a total that just proved too much for England to overhaul as they finished on 256 for eight.

The 24-year-old South Australian's score was his best in 15 matches at this level and took just 256 for eight.

"We've got a lot of new players in our squad that didn't take part in the Ashes," Clarke, deputising for the resting Ricky Ponting, told reporters.

"One-day cricket is a lot different to Test cricket, I'm taking a lot of positives out of

Debaraj Chatterjee earned 2 points, GM Reefat Bin Sattar and FM Abu Sufian Shakil secured 1.5 points each.

Korea outclass Socceroos

South Korea outclassed Australia 3-1 in a friendly on Saturday in what coach Huh Jung-Moo said was a useful work-out ahead of next year's World Cup.

The South Koreans, who in June won their seventh consecutive berth at the World Cup finals, quickly gained control against the Socceroos when Park Chu-Young scored after only four minutes.

The hosts doubled their advantage on 20 minutes when Lee Jang-Soo scored from close range.

Australia, who also qualified for South Africa next year, struck back in the 33rd minute when Patrick Kisnorbo headed home a free-kick.

But South Korea's Seol Ki-Hyeon headed in a cross from Manchester United star and national captain Park Ji-Sung in the 87th minute to make the game safe.

"Australia is a team that is on a level with European teams in terms of having a strong defence," coach Huh was quoted by Yonhap news agency as saying.

"The match gave us an opportunity to examine what we should do in facing teams of such level and what areas to supplement."

The South Koreans finished the World Cup Asian qualifying round on top, while North Korea and Japan also reached the finals.

Nadal, Murray move on

Six-time Grand Slam champion Rafael Nadal, trying to complete a career Slam, and British second seed Andy Murray withstood fightbacks to reach the third round on Friday at the US Open.

Spanish third seed Nadal weathered the storm to defeat Germany's Nicolas Kiefer 6-0, 3-6, 6-3, 6-4. The reigning Australian Open champion showed no sign of the knee trouble that kept him out two months and caused him to miss Wimbledon.

"I feel good," Nadal said. "I started playing well but I think he started low and later played better. It's difficult like that because you are not on rhythm. Nicolas is a very difficult player and

I'm very glad to beat him."

Murray, last year's US Open runner-up, answered a sluggish second set by winning seven games in a row and fired 15 aces in defeating Chile's Paul Capdeville 6-2, 3-6, 6-0, 6-2.

"I played three very good sets and one poor one," Murray said. "You're allowed to play a bad set sometimes but I came back well from it. I just felt a little lethargic, low in energy. I don't know why."

"But I managed to pick it up when I needed to."

The 22-year-old Scotsman, trying to become the first British man to win a Grand Slam title since Fred Perry in 1936, will play for a spot in the last 16 against 196th-ranked US wild card Taylor Dent.

All 16 top seeds advanced to the third round, the first time this has happened in any Grand

Kiwis sweep it clean

Daniel Vettori's New Zealand recorded their second

Twenty20 success over Sri Lanka in three days with a 22-run victory on Friday that helped them sweep the two-match series.

The Kiwis, who won the first match on Wednesday by three

runs, piled up 170-4 after winning the toss and then restricted the World Twenty20 finalists to 148-8 under lights at the Premadasa Stadium.

Fast bowler Shane Bond led the Black Caps charge with 3-14 in four overs, while seamer Kyle Mills and off-spinner Nathan McCullum claimed two wickets each.

The 2-0 win helped the Kiwis overcome the disappointment of losing both the preceding Test matches and boosted their confidence ahead of a tri-series, also featuring India, that opens on Tuesday.

New Zealand's innings revolved around an explosive opening stand of 84 in 10.2 overs by Brendon McCullum and Jesse Ryder after Vettori called correctly for the second ball in a row.

Martin Guptill and Jacob Oram further boosted the total with a 43-run stand for the fourth wicket in 27 balls, before Guptill was bowled by Lasith Malinga off the final ball of the innings.

Sri Lanka, chasing a target of almost nine runs an over, made a disastrous start when they were reduced to 2-2 off the first seven deliveries and slid to 11-3 soon after.
