

Extortion, mugging go unabated

Gangs, political elements active ahead of Eid

Petty crimes-extortion and mugging have increased at an alarming rate in the capital in recent times as criminal gangs and a section of ruling party men are desperate to make a quick buck ahead of the Eid-ul-Fitr.

Police have been deployed in at least 10 business establishments, including renowned furniture shop Hatil in Kafur area after criminals demanded extortions while a shop owner on Elephant Road has been asked by his fellow party men to pay Tk 20,000 extortions per month.

Thugs beat up an Iranian national Ashraf Aghazadeh alias Mina and

snatched her cash and gold ornaments on August 26 while she was travelling on a taxicab while another criminal identifying himself as top criminal Shahadat demanded money from a physician of Mirpur over cellphone recently.

Mina alleged that following the incident she met with a joint commissioner of Dhaka Metropolitan Police (DMP), who gave an assurance of arresting the criminals and asked her not to file a general inquiry instantly in this connection.

These are a few instances among a plethora of such criminal acts that force the city dwellers to live a wretched life.

At least six people were killed and over 20 others injured in over 15 incidents of

gun attack either by extortionists or muggers in the city in the last two months, according to newspaper reports.

A three-member police team equipped with firearms has been guarding the multi-storied furniture shop Hatil on Rokeya Sarani at Shewrapara after a top criminal demanded a hefty amount of extortions.

"We have deployed our forces in at least 10 business establishments and at a few under construction building sites in Kafur after the victims sought our help following demand of extortions money," said a top police official in Mirpur.

In another incident on August 25,



NYT reporter rescued

4 killed in the Afghan commando operation

British commandos freed a New York Times reporter early yesterday from Taliban captors who kidnapped him over the weekend in northern Afghanistan, but one of the commandos, a Times translator and two Afghan civilians were killed in the rescue, officials said.

Reporter Stephen Farrell was freed unhurt. But his Afghan colleague Sultan Munadi was killed along with a UK soldier and two Afghan civilians.

Farrell was taken hostage along with his translator in the northern province of Kunduz on Saturday. German commanders had ordered US jets to drop bombs on two hijacked fuel tankers, causing a number of civilian casualties, and reporters travelled to the area to cover the story.

One British service member died during the early morning raid, British Prime Minister Gordon Brown said, while the Times reported that Farrell's Afghan translator, Sultan Munadi, 34, also was killed. Brown said that "we send his family our condolences." Farrell was unhurt.

Gunfire rang out from multiple sides during the rescue, and a Taliban commander who was in the house was killed, along with the owner of the house and a woman, said Mohammad Sami Yawar, a spokesman for the Kunduz governor.

Munadi was killed in the midst of the firefight, he said.

US missile attack kills 10 Taliban militants

Pak troops kill 24 extremists

A US missile strike from a drone aircraft Tuesday killed at least 10 militants in a tribal area of Pakistan bordering Afghanistan while 24 other militants were killed in fighting in Khyber district, Pakistani officials said.

"The strike targeted a Taliban compound in Dargamandi village of North Waziristan, killing 10 militants," a senior security official told AFP.

Another official confirmed the casualties and said that a US drone fired two missiles to hit the compound, five kilometres (three miles) northwest of Miranshah, the main town of North Waziristan.

He said it was not immediately clear whether any "high-value" targets were present in

A few of his close associates in Malaysia said Khairuzzaman has applied for a home in Kuala Lumpur under the country's Malaysia My Second Home scheme, fulfilling all criteria to stay long time over there.

"He [Khairuzzaman] will not go back to Bangladesh at least during the tenure of the Awami League government," a

'Crossfire' goes on in Kushtia 17 deaths in 14 days

An outlawed party leader was killed in 'crossfire' in Mahadepur village under Mirpur upazila of Kushtia early yesterday raising the number of such deaths in the district to 17 in 14 days.

The deceased was identified as Anwar Hossain Kalu alias Kala Anu, 39, son of Amu Malitha of Gacheria at Daulatpur upazila in the district.

Anwar was a leader of Lal Pataka, a Purbo Banglar Communist Party (PBCP-ML) faction, and also a close associate of party's founder Ronny Biswas, who was killed in an 'encounter' last year, police said.
