#### Gay, Felix shine

American star sprinters Tyson Gay and Allyson Felix coasted to victory Wednesday in the men's and women's 100m races at the Kawasaki track and field meet. Gay comfortably won in

10.13sec despite his groin injury, for which he will have a surgery after the season finishes.

Japan's Naoki Tsukahara and Masashi Eriguchi, both of whom clocked 10.31sec.

Officials recorded a tailwind of 0.5 m/s but Gay, 27, said he felt a consistent headwind against his face through the race.

Looking back over a season nearing its finish, Gay said he was pleased with his performance, having clocked in 9.69sec Sunday at the Shanghai Golden Grand Prix -the joint second fastest time in history with Jamaican sensa-

tion Usain Bolt. Meanwhile, Felix came from behind to win the women's 100m sprint in 11.22sec, followed by Japan's Chisato Fukushima with 11.42sec and Mayumi Watanabe with 11.64sec.

Keeping in mind the 2011 World Cup, in which Bangladesh is a co-host, the present government had been searching for a suitable candidate for the sensitive post where Kamal, popularly known as Lotus Kamal, won the two-way battle against Gazi Golam Dastagir.

The 62-year-old Awami League lawmaker from Comilla will replace Lt Gen Sina Ibn Jamali, who has been running the show since July 29, 2007.

India's preparations for their first match of the Champions Trophy on Saturday suffered a setback when Yuvraj Singh injured a finger on his right hand during a fielding session at the University Ground in Johannesburg. The injury was serious enough for him to miss the batting and bowling sessions that were conducted later in the day.

Yuvraj was attended to by physio Nitin Patel before heading for a medical examination. India's team manager Anurag Thakur said a scan would help determine the extent of the injury. "The tests will show whether he has fractured his finger," he

India have been plagued with injuries going into the tournament. Virender Sehwag did not travel to South Africa due to a shoulder injury, while Gautam Gambhir, who did not feature in the team's only practice match against New Zealand, is nursing a groin strain.

India's tournament opener is against Pakistan on Saturday, while they will take on Australia and West Indies next week.

"I think that Justine's comeback is good news for women's tennis but even better news for Belgium in general," Clijsters said on her website.

"Justine worked really hard in the past to achieve great results that she recorded in her first career. For tennis it is brilliant that she's back."

Clijsters and Henin were my career. both ranked world number ones before they shocked the tennis world and Belgium when they quit the sport within a year of each other.

Henin, who announced her retirement 16 months ago, is expected to make her comeback at the start of the 2010 season in Australia.

The former world number one said she was full of admiration for Clijsters, who came out of a two-year break last month and won the US Open 10 days ago.

Henin added that completing her Grand Slam collection by winning an elusive Wimbledon title was one of the reasons behind her comeback.

"It [Wimbledon] is a dream of mine. I want to work to get it. I make it a priority," the seven-times Grand Slam champion said.

Dilshan finally departed off the first ball of the 29th over, caught at the boundary by Albie Morkel off the bowling of right-arm speedster winning the inaugural Champions Trophy 11 Dale Steyn before a near-capacity crowd.

The 27-year-old seventime Grand Slam winner broke the news on Belgian television and following compatriot Kim Clijsters, who capped her return with victory in the US Open this month.

"I was very impatient and I am really happy and deeply moved to be able to announce this evening that I will return to competition very quickly," she told RTL-TVI. "It is suprising because on

# ECB backs Test play-off

The England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB) insists that it supports the notion of a World Test Championship -- contrary to the impression given by Haroon Lorgat, the ICC chief executive, in an interview this week -- and even claims to have been approached to host the final.

Lorgat told The Guardian on Tuesday that India cricket is at the pinnacle of the world game." and England were the only two countries standing in the way of a World Test Championship, but David Collier, the ECB chief executive, said that his board were not opposed to the concept in itself, merely the format that was being proposed.

"I would like to convince people that the way to ensure Test cricket survives is through a championship model," said Lorgat. "The only two countries who do not see the argument are India and England, but debate is growing all the time."
