

Donors to help in PRSP plan

Ask for proper implementation

Donor countries gave assurance yesterday that they would help Bangladesh in implementing the revised Poverty Reduction Strategy Paper (PRSP) but they laid more emphasis on its proper implementation.

The assurance came after Finance Minister AMA Muhith and Planning Minister AK Khandker jointly placed the second PRSP to the Local Consultative Group (LCG), a forum of Bangladesh's development partners.

The PRSP was presented at a meeting with the LCG held at the auditorium of National Economic Council (NEC) in the planning commission.

The UK Department for International sources added. Development (DFID) Country Director in Bangladesh Chris Austin led the LCG. World Bank Acting Country Director Robert L Floyd

and other representatives were also present.

The government at the meeting presented an estimated total expenditure of Tk 3,750.86 billion for the revised PRSP for the fiscal year (FY) 2009-11.

Of the total expenditure, Tk 2,590.40 billion is estimated to be collected from internal resources with a deficit of Tk 1,160.46 billion.

Meeting sources said, the donors assured Bangladesh of the financial assistance but didn't say who would provide how much. It would be conveyed to Bangladesh at the next meeting of Bangladesh Development Forum (BDF) likely to be held early next year.

The donor countries emphasised the need for its implementation free from corruption,



Bangladesh has sought 5 billion US dollars from the developed countries in compensation The dead are Riya Akhter, as an affected country due to climate change caused by global warming.

An official announcement in Dhaka yesterday said, State Minister for Environment and Forest Hasan Mahmud placed the demand during a high-profile meeting of the United Nations on environment affairs.

The meeting was presided over by UN

Secretary-General Ban ki-Moon on Wednesday afternoon.

While presenting the country statement on behalf of Bangladesh, Hasan said, "Bangladesh is not responsible anyway for the worldwide environmental problems whereas it is in the most vulnerable position as a nation at risk."

To recoup the loss Bangladesh has incurred due to climate change, Dhaka sought \$ 500 million on an urgent basis as financial assistance from the UN and developed countries.

Large potholes make movement difficult

Shopkeeper Roni was returning to his shop a few days back by a rickshaw-van after buying three sacks of rice from Tongi. Suddenly the rice sacks fell into a ditch of muddy water as the rickshaw-van collapsed on a road under Sector-10 of Uttara Model Town.

"I have suffered a loss of Tk 10,000 as I could not recover the rice sacks from muddy water," said Roni as his face looked pale.

This is not a single story. Breakdowns of rickshaw, rickshaw-van and other vehicles are regular phenomena on the roads under sector-10 of the model town. Condition of the roads is so bad that vehicles have to bump all along.

Online Poll / New vaccine helps prevent HIV infection

For the first time, an experimental vaccine has prevented infection with the AIDS virus, a watershed event in the deadly epidemic and a surprising result.

Recent failures led many scientists to think such a vaccine might never be possible.

The vaccine cut the risk of becoming UNAIDS estimates. infected with HIV by more than 31 percent in the world's largest AIDS vaccine trial of more than 16,000 volunteers in Thailand, researchers announced Thursday in Bangkok.

Even though the benefit is modest, "it's the vaccine. first evidence that we could have a safe and effective preventive vaccine," Col. Jerome Kim said in a telephone interview. He helped lead the study for the US Army, which sponsored it with the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases.

The institute's director, Dr Anthony Fauci, warned that this is "not the end of the road," but said he was surprised and very pleased by

the outcome. "It gives me cautious optimism about the possibility of improving this result" and developing a more effective AIDS vaccine, Fauci said in a telephone interview. "This is something

that we can do." Even a marginally helpful vaccine could have a big impact. Every day, 7,500 people worldwide are newly infected with HIV; 2 million died of AIDS in 2007, the UN agency

"Today marks an historic milestone," said Mitchell Warren, executive director of the AIDS Vaccine Advocacy Coalition, an international group that has worked toward developing a

"It will take time and resources to fully analyse and understand the data, but there is little doubt that this finding will energise and redirect the AIDS vaccine field," he said in a statement.

The Thailand Ministry of Public Health conducted the study, which used strains of HIV common in Thailand. Whether such a vaccine would work against other strains in the US, Africa or elsewhere in the world is unknown, scientists stressed.
