One held with 350 Yaba tablets in Cox's Bazar

He urged them to follow the Shariah law and the country's rule of law accurately during discharging their professional duties and advised them to verify the birth registration certificate.

Referring to the multiple social and physical problems of child marriage including early pregnancy and other disorders relating to reproductive health, he said the marriage registrars could contribute to society in this regard.

"You should be above of all sorts of corruption and irregularities as most of you are the influential leaders of society," he added.

8 killed in road crashes

Eight people were killed and 20 others injured in separate road accidents across the country yesterday.

A correspondent in Comilla reports: Three people of a family were killed and two others injured in a road accident on Dhaka-Chittagong highway at Karankhal in Chittagong yesterday.

The dead were identified as Khorshed Alam, 32, his sister Shahanaz Begum, 40, and his son Mehedi Hasan, 9.

The accident occurred at about 7:00am when a microbus from Zia International Airport lost control and fell into a roadside ditch, leaving three people dead on the spot and microbus driver Abdul Hamid, 36, and helper Jewel, 20, critically injured.

The injured were rushed to Chandina Upazila Health Complex.

UNB adds: Two people, including a

minor girl, were killed and 13 others injured in a head-on collision between a bus and a microbus at Dhaleshwari First Bridge on Dhaka-Mawa highway in Keraniganj yesterday.

One of the dead was identified as Nafiza, 3, but the identity of the other could not be known immediately.

Police said the bus of DM Paribahan collided with the microbus at about 2:00pm, leaving 15 people injured.

Twelve of the injured were rushed to Dhaka Medical College Hospital where the two succumbed to their injuries.

Vehicular movement on the bridge was disrupted for about two hours following the accident.

Another UNB report from Bagerhat adds: A woman was crushed under the wheels of a bus on Dhaka-Mawa highway in Madrasa Ghatara area of Mollahajupazila yesterday.

The identity of the victim could not be known immediately.

Witnesses said the Dhaka-bound bus knocked her down while she was crossing the road, leaving her dead on the spot at about 10:00am.

Police seized the bus and arrested its driver Mofiz.

Our correspondent in Jhenidah adds: A man was killed in a road accident on Jhenidah-Magura highway yesterday.

The victim was identified as Shahjahan Ali, 45, a night guard of Maulanaband Secondary School.

The accident took place when a speeding truck knocked him down while he was crossing the road.

BSS adds: A student of Titumir College was killed and five others were injured in a road accident at Savar yesterday.

The accident occurred when a passenger bus and a private car collided near Amin Bazar Bridge.

The dead was identified as Mizan, son of Ranju Miah.

Jubo Dal leader held for snatching accused from police

Climate groups dismayed by G20's lack of interest

Climate change campaigners expressed dismay on Friday after the leaders of the world's most important economies failed to earmark funds to pay for a deal to cut carbon emissions.

States are due to hold a global summit -- billed as the last chance to halt global warming -- in Copenhagen in December in order to agree on ambitious new targets for cutting the production of greenhouse gases.

Emerging economies, led by a skeptical India, have insisted that they can not sign up to such a deal unless the rich-world nations whose industry caused the problem pay billions to finance their transfer to new clean technologies.

Campaigners had hoped that under the chairmanship of US President Barack Obama the Group of 20 summit might agree to set aside 150 billion dollars to pay for this work and

convince emerging economies to sign the deal.

The final summit statement agreed by the leaders, however, was fairly vague.

"We will spare no effort to reach an agreement in Copenhagen through the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change negotiations," it said, without going into specifics of how the funding gap might be met.

Hopes that the world's leading powers would get behind measures to help poorer countries fight climate change were raised in July in L'Aquila, Italy, when G8 leaders sent their finance ministers to seek sources of cash.

On Friday, however, the broader G20 group promised simply to "intensify our efforts" and sent the ministers back to do some more research.

"We welcome the work of the finance ministers and direct them to report back at their next meeting with a

range of possible options for climate change financing," the final statement said.
