

Even going at Centurion

Pakistan's batsmen came out looking for an early knockout; India's under-pressure pace bowlers took the blows, lost the first round, but came back to lead on points halfway through the innings as the former reached 108 for 3 in their Champions Trophy match here on Saturday.

Pakistan's middle-order, muddled in its thought process, undid an explosive and entertaining start wherein they fell from 51 for 1 in seven overs to 65 for 3 in 5.

This was the first time the two teams were playing each other in an international match in close to a year and a half, and both Kamran Akmal and Imran Nazir could hardly wait. The action was breathless in first seven overs as both launched into India's left-arm opening bowlers. A diving and exuberant Virat Kohli, playing Pakistan for the first time, saved boundaries in the first over, but RP Singh didn't enjoy the same luck as Ashish Nehra did.

In the next six overs, Nazir drove on the up, punched down the ground and through covers, and also cut in front of square to beat Kohli and Suresh Raina. Akmal drove on the up too, and pulled emphatically. Those six overs yielded nine boundaries, and one gift from an over-zealous Nazir who top-edged while pulling Nehra. Akmal counter-attacked pulling out the same shot twice, but when he was kept away from strike from a comparatively mellow Younis Khan, he too looked to manufacture a shot. Like Nazir, he mistook a ball for shorter than it was, and dragged Nehra onto the stumps.

Two wickets taken, and the momentum wrested, Dhoni looked to get in a few overs from his part-time bowlers, and delayed the introduction of his trump card, Harbhajan Singh. Mohammad Yousuf looked more fluent than Shoaib Malik, and looked to unsettle Kohli. Yusuf Pathan, though, extracted sharp turn from the pitch, and kept the batsmen quiet. At the halfway mark, Yousuf and Malik had added 43 runs for the fourth wicket in 10.2 overs.

Johnson lifts Aussies

Mitchell Johnson was unbeaten on 73 as a late run rush lifted Australia to 275-8 off 50 overs in a 2009 ICC Champions Trophy match against West Indies at the Wanderers on Saturday.

It was the highest ODI knock for a man better known

for his ability with the ball and virtually assured the defending champions of a winning start in Group A which includes India and Pakistan.

After some mid-innings wobbles saw Australia slump to 171-7, Johnson tormented the tiring West Indies attack and his 47-ball spell at the crease yielded eight fours and three sixes.

Australia lost Shane Watson

off the first ball of the match as Kemar Roach made an instant impact with a late swinging yorker on his return to the team in place of Tino Best.

Skipper Ricky Ponting steadied the innings with a 79-run stand that included nine fours and one six before being stumped by Chadwick Walton off the bowling of Nikita Miller.

West Indies, lacking their first-choice players because of a long-running contract dispute, need to score at a rate of 5.52 runs per over to win and cause the biggest upset of the 11-year tournament.

Sri Lanka and South Africa have one win apiece from two matches, while England have played only one game. New Zealand have lost their first match. The top two sides will make it to the semifinals.

Strauss said he was pleased with his team's all-round performance against Sri Lanka on a lively track.

England were indebted to pacemen James Anderson (3-20), Stuart Broad (3-49) and Graham Onions (2-58) for seizing the initiative as the trio played a big role in restricting Sri Lanka to a modest 212.

Eoin Morgan (62 not out), Paul Collingwood (46) and Owais Shah (44) then built on their bowlers' efforts to see their team home.

"It's very satisfying. It was a good toss to win, but I thought the way Jimmy Anderson bowled, particularly in the first 10 overs, really put Sri Lanka on the back foot," said Strauss.

"I was happy with the intent the batsmen showed. They did not let the spinners bowl at us. Collingwood and Shah played valuable

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BCB names U-16 squad

The Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) yesterday announced a 16-member squad for the upcoming home series against England Under-19 and Zimbabwe Under-19 in October and November as part of their preparation for the ICC Under-19 World Cup to be held in New Zealand in January next year.

All-rounder Mahmudul Hasan, who has the experience of playing the World Cup in Malaysia in 2008 and also leading the side in the one-day series win against England earlier this year, has been named captain while left-handed batsman Amit Majumder will be his deputy for the two series.

The England U-19s are scheduled to arrive in the capital on October 8. The series starts with a four-day over October 16-19 in Chittagong followed by seven 50-overs matches between October 23 and November 4 at Chittagong, Fatullah and Mirpur.

The Zimbabwe U-19s then come here to play five one-day matches between November 13 and November 21.

Kiwis' last chance

New Zealand enter the 2009 ICC Champions Trophy last-chance saloon today when they face unpredictable Sri Lanka at the Wanderers.

Nothing less than victory will keep the 'Black Caps' in the hunt to win the second most important one-day national team tournament after the World Cup and collect a record two-million-dollar first prize.

England, Sri Lanka and South Africa have two points each in Group B and New Zealand are pointless having been outplayed by South Africa as convincingly as the five-wicket margin suggests.

Winners of the second edition nine years ago in Kenya, New Zealand entered this tournament with a large question mark hanging over the ability of the batsmen to build match-winning partnerships.

And the worst fears of skipper Daniel Vettori were realised with only the fourth-wicket stand of Ross Taylor and South Africa-born Grant Elliott matching expectations.

The Kiwi batsmen never got to grips with the pace of Wayne Parnell and Dale Steyn, and the spin of Roelof van der Merwe also tied them in knots they could not untangle.

It is unlikely to get any easier against Sri Lanka, who lost by six wickets against England Friday after surprising South Africa by 55 runs in a rain-shortened tournament opener three days before.

"But I just felt, possibly having seen Colly castigated for doing it a couple of years ago, it probably wasn't the right thing to do," said Strauss.

Collingwood, named man of the match for his impressive 46 in his team's six-wicket win over Sri Lanka on Friday, said he was not involved in the decision.

"I tried to keep out of it," said Collingwood.

"I just left him to make his own decision. But he was straight in there, had a look at the replay and said 'We'll bring him back'."

Mathews, who was then on 51, failed to make the most of the opportunity as he added just one more run to his score before being caught behind off Luke Wright.
