# Steyn wants trophies

Dale Steyn insists CHAMPIONS South Africa will never truly consider themselves the world's pre-eminent team until they break their big-tournament jinx and claim an ICC Trophy. South Africa entered the Champions Trophy as the world's topranked team, only to crash out in the first

The South Africans have in the past dismissed suggestions of wilting under the spotlight, but Steyn believes the time has come for the team to conduct a thorough review of their approach to big tournaments. The world's top-ranked Test fast bowler admitted the lack of ICC trophies was gnawing at his teammates, and tainting their status as the best team in international cricket.
