AUG 21 ATTACK Pintu, Taher remanded again

BNP leader and former deputy minister Abdus Salam Pintu and Harkatul Jihad (Huji) member Maulana Abu Taher were placed on remand to identify collectors and suppliers of Arges grenades used in the August 21 carnage on Bangabandhu Avenue.

Metropolitan Magistrate Mohammad Shahadat Hossain placed Pintu and Taher on three-day remand each as Criminal Investigation Department (CID) yesterday produced them before his court with separate remand prayers.

The CID sought ten-day remand for Pintu and five-day

Legal battle mulled against takeover bid

Environmental activists are planning to go for legal actions against the reported move by a limited company to take over Dhanmondi public playground.

Members of Institute of Architects Bangladesh (IAB) discussed the matter at its meeting on September 30 following a Daily Star report, said IAB president Mubasshar Hussein.

Lt Sheikh Jamal Dhanmondi Club Limited, a limited company, is going to take over Dhanmondi playground, he said.

"We will soon take initiatives to hold a press conference along with Bangladesh Paribesh Andolon (Bapa) and others and resume the case pending with the HC in this regard," said Mubasshar.

New passport by April 2010 IS body sets MRP

Ending the uncertainty over issuance of machine-readable passport (MRP), the parliamentary standing committee on home ministry yesterday said the new type of passports would be issued within the interna-

tional deadline of April 2010. The parliamentary body also asked police personnel to work "spiritedly and seriously" to ease the nagging tailbacks in the capital.

"The process of issuing machine-readable passport is already well underway. A total of 23 international firms with experience of preparing passports in at least three countries have submitted tenders so far," Maj Gen (retd) MA Salam, chairman of the standing committee, told reporters SEE PAGE 15 COL 1

Huji first to use hills

Harkat-ul-Jihad al Islami (Huji) was the first militant group to use the remote hill areas in Chittagong for arms training.

It set up training camps in the hill tracts in the early 90s and packed up when the law enforcers began cracking down on the militants after the August 17 serial blasts in 2005.

Jama'atul Mujahideen Bangladesh, which used to have training facilities mainly in plains, however moved to hill

ment in the late 80s, it concentrated its activities at madrasas in Chittagong It began training the recruits how to

operate firearms and explosives in some makeshift camps in remote hill areas between 1989 and 1990.

Its job became easier after Rohingya killed. insurgents entered Bangladesh in 1991.

"At first, we had to use dummy firearms. But it all changed when Rohingya insurgents came in with sophisticated firearms," said a source who had training from the outfit.

When the Rohingyas took refuge in Bangladesh in 1991, insurgents slipped in hill forests the Huji had already been

Huji provided them with shelter, foods and manpower and in return got access to firearms and explosives.

As their relations grew stronger, many madrasa students involved in Huji went to Myanmar to fight for the Rohingya insurgents. Several of them were even

Foreign militant leaders and officials of Islamic NGOs who provided funds for militancy campaign to take root in Bangladesh visited the camps posing as Islamic scholars. They delivered motivational speeches on jihad.

Both Huji and the Rohingya militants used madrasas and mosques in Cox's with them and built training camps in the Bazar, Teknaf, Ukhia and other areas in SEE PAGE 15 COL 1



They possess higher degrees, beautiful houses and pieces of land. They have built fine houses over the years with every touch of love and affection. Ironically, they cannot live there anymore; they have rather become residents of Bangladesh Probin Hitoishi Sangha and Jora Bigyan Protishthan in Agargaon in the capital.

Sometimes, when there is no one to give company or even offer a cup of tea in the morning, even a fine beautiful house -whether it is in the over-populated city like Dhaka or elsewhere -- may be unusable, unworthy to live in.

"I could not live alone in a house. During the first days after I arrived here it felt bad. But now I have been used to it," says Mira Chowdhury, wife of former ILO director Joseph Chowdhury, who passed away seven years ago. "My son has asked me to live with him in the US. But I won't

go there. How will I live there, leaving my country," adds Mira Chowdhury, who owns a house on Dilu Road in Eskaton in the capital and is going to sell it.

She lives in around 7 feet by 15 feet place at the old home, which is probably her last house. The place is everything about her family and home where she nurtures orchids and likes to have flowers as gift.

It has been one and a half years since Mira came here. During this time her daughter visited her once and that time she was seriously ill.

PM returns Quake deaths pass 770

Indonesian rescuers claw thru' rubbles for survivors; second tremor causes panic

AFP, Padang

Indonesia said yesterday it feared thousands had died in a major earthquake as exhausted rescue workers clawed through mountains of rubble with their bare hands in a race to find survivors.

The first flights laden with food, medicine and body bags began arriving in the devastated region on Sumatra island as another powerful quake struck further south, causing more injuries and sparking panic.

Wednesday afternoon's 7.6magnitude quake toppled buildings and led to fires in Padang, home to nearly a

and saw the city largely without power

and communications. The official death toll hit at least 770 with 294 people seriously injured, but those numbers are expected to soar as the full scale of the tragedy unfolds. Many districts remain inaccessible to emergency services.

"Our prediction is that thousands have died," health ministry crisis centre head Rustam Pakaya said.

Rescue teams from the Indonesian army and health ministry descended on the city and surrounding towns to hunt for survivors in the twisted wreckage of collapsed buildings and homes, with million people on the coast of Sumatra, work expected to go on into the night.

In pouring rain that hampered rescue work early in the day, overwhelmed police and soldiers clawed through the tangled remains of schools, hotels and the city's main M. Djamil hospital.

Padang, which lies between the Indian Ocean and the Bukit Barisan mountains, was a chaotic scene of traffic jams and rubble set against the constant din of sirens as ambulances tried to negotiate the gridlock.

At the M. Djamil hospital, a constant stream of injured residents were dropped off at hastily erected tents where doctors worked frantically to treat victims.

Shoe thrown at IMF chief

A protester yesterday threw a shoe at IMF chief Dominique Strauss-Kahn as he delivered a speech to university students in Turkey's biggest city

Istanbul. The protester, believed to be a student, shouted "IMF, Get out of Turkey!" as he ran towards the stage and threw the white sports shoe which failed to hit the IMF chief, an AFP correspondent witnessed.

The shoe-throwing tactic was famously first used in Iraq last year against US President George W. Bush and there have been several copycat protests since.

The Turkish protester was immediately overpowered and escorted out by security guards.
