Campaign, tough law suggested

A housewife was allegedly beaten to death at an apartment of Eastern Housing in city's Pallabi area on Thursday night.

The victim was identified as Fatema Rahman, 55, wife of

Sheikh Fazlur Rahman. Officer-in-Charge (OC) of Pallabi Police Station Abdul Maleq said they arrested three members of the apartment owners' association of the housing yesterday in this connection.

The arrestees were identified as Ebadur Rahman, 40, Khurshid Alam, 46, and Ashraful Islam, who were placed on a one-day remand to unearth the mystery of the death.

Family members of Fatema alleged that the apartment owner entered the apartment along with members of the housing society and some hired goons at 9:00pm and asked them to vacate the flat immediately.

They alleged that both the sides were involved in an altercation as the tenant wanted more time to leave the apartment. At one stage, the association members beat up Fatema, her husband, two sons and a daughter.

The victim fell sick following the incident and was rushed to National Heart Foundation where she died.

On the other hand, housing society sources said Fatema died after she had suffered a cardiac arrest following the altercation.

They further said she did not pay the rent of the house for the last several months, adding that the apartment owner asked her family to leave the place but they did not pay any heed to their notice.

### Ctg medical student drowns

fourth year student of Chittagong Medical College CMC drowned in a pond in bordering Nila union of Teknaf upazilaThursdaynight.

The victim, Abhishekh Datta, 22, son of Ranjit Datta of Sukhchhari in Lohagara upazila of Chittagong, walked into the pond around 8:00pm and drowned while his friends were also taking bath there.

Sources said his friends searched the pond and recovered the body, as Abhishekh remained missing in their team after bath. Doctors present there declared him dead after examining the body.

Abhishekh, the elder son of his family, and 25 other CMC students went to Teknaf Thursday morning to participate in two days' residential field site training and stayed in a house in the locality.

His body was taken to Chittagong Medical College Hospital (CMCH) mortuary early yesterday for autopsy.

"After conducting a survey at a Rohingya refugee camp in the hot afternoon, we returned to the house in the evening. Ten students jumped into the pond beside the house finding its water cool and clear," said victim's friend Jahangir while talking to The Daily Star.

But Jahangir could not say exactly when Abhishekh walked into the pond. Abhishekh might have slipped into the deep water of the pond and drowned, as he did not know how to swim, he said.

"After bath, I found Abhishekh's clothes kept on the bank and started searching for him," said Jahangir in a choking voice.

A pall of gloom descended when his body was brought to their residence in the city's Bakalia area yesterday afternoon.

#### Prisoner dies at KMCH

An under-trial prisoner in a murder case died yesterday at Khulna Medical College Hospital (KMCH).

The deceased was identified as Huzur Ali, 50, son of Nazar Ali, hailing from Barobag village under Daulatpur upazila in Kushtia.

Khulna Jail Super Shah Alam Khan told BSS, Huzur Ali was shifted to Khulna district jail on September 27 while he fell sick causing bleeding from his nose.

He was admitted to KMCH prison cell on the same day in a critical condition where he died early yesterday.

The body was sent to his village home after autopsy.

An effective anti-littering campaign needs to be launched to address the growing littering problems in Dhaka, a mega city of 1.2 crore

"Littering is a big problem in many cities, but this is a bigger problem in this sprawling city," said Dr Abduz Zaher of Dhaka University.

Dr Zaher, also chairman of Communication and Media Research Initiative (Camri), a research organisation, said littering not only reduces the beauty of a city, but it also finds its way into rivers and creeks affecting the environment.

"Conventional wisdom says if everyone just picks up an x amount of litter a day, then it would all be gone before long. Yet for some reason this has never been tried," said barrister Ahsan Habib, a Bangladeshi-born

In the United Kingdom, he said, there is a maximum fine of £2,500 for persistent littering. Different local authorities also have the power to impose on the spot fines to those caught littering. These are generally under £100.

"Even anyone caught littering in Georgia can be ordered to pay a fine of up to \$1,000 or more for serious littering violations," said Habib, quoting one of his friends who visited Georgia, the USA.

Singapore is known as a "fine" city. To maintain the cleanliness, there are strict laws ing areas. against littering of any kind.

A former Dhaka City Corporation official, who wished not to be named, said motorists and pedestrians are responsible for creating between 30 and 55 percent of litter. The rest comes from household or commercial garbage, construction sites, loading and delivery areas and he said. uncovered trucks. Garbage, not properly disposed of, is

really difficult to educate people about," he mentioned. Citing findings of various research works, Habib said males aged between 16 and 30 do most of the littering along roadsides.

According to him, delivering anti-littering TV commercials, litter receptacles, laws prohibiting placement of garbage in these receptacles and specifying proper use of unregistered or derelict vehireceptacles, free distribution of litter bags, and regulations requiring load cover and spill sites and allowing litter to fall

prevention measures are all helpful ideas to reduce roadside littering.

The types of littering Dhaka and other cities face include dropping of paper, domestic refuse, vegetable matter, cigarette butts, garbage, clothes and hard waste, throwing litter from vehicles, leaving litter uncontained on private property, abandoning cles on roads or other public land, and littering on building

long-term answer. "We need to educate our schoolchildren that littering is a very bad practice and teach them the proper way to dispose of waste."
