

BANGABANDHU MURDER CASE

CJ to constitute bench for hearing today

Chief Justice MM Ruhul Amin is likely to constitute a bench of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court (SC) today for the hearing on the appeals in Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman murder case.

The hearing is scheduled to take place tomorrow.

Five convicts in this case -- dismissed army personnel Syed Farooq-ur-Rahman, Sultan Shahriar Rashid Khan, Mohiuddin Ahmed, AKM Mohiuddin Ahmed, and Bazlul Huda, who are now behind bars, -- filed the appeals with the SC in the last week of October 2007 against their death sentences pronounced by the HC.

Both the Appellate and High Court (HC) Divisions of the Supreme Court will also reopen today after a 38-day annual vacation.

The application has been submitted on behalf of condemned prisoner Syed Farooq-ur-Rahman.

Mahbubey Alam said there

£300m DFID support for poverty alleviation

Replies to a question Onoda, project director of SUNTEC, said "The cost of LED bulb is around 4000 yen which is equivalent to Tk 2800. But if it is produced in Bangladesh it would cost Tk 1000 only."

The conventional light bulbs may be cheap to buy but they use only 5 percent of electricity to generate light and waste the remaining 95 percent of electricity. They last up to 1000 hours, but LED bulbs can save 80 percent of electricity with a working life of 40000 hours.

of the existing natural resources.

In addition to meet the nutritional deficit especially meat and milk, the livestock rearing is very helpful for increasing soil nutrient, which is being declined gradually due to indiscriminate use of chemical fertilisers.

The unemployment problem in the rural areas could be reduced to a greater extent through making the dairy farming popular in the grass roots level.

Dr Jalal Uddin, an associate professor and chairman of Department of Animal Husbandry and Veterinary Science of Rajshahi University, told BSS that the northwestern region has an enormous prospect of expanding the livestock sector through best uses

raw materials like skin and manures, socio-economic security and income generation.

He, however, said most of the people suffer from malnutrition specially lacking animal protein like milk, meat and egg. In this context, he revealed that production of huge amount of meat through the indigenous beef-cattle improvement would supply low cost meat for people and it will ultimately recover them from malnutrition.

Production of good breed cattle from existing indigenous stock by applying artificial breeding technology particularly Shahiwal and local cattle cross breeding is very essential in this regard.

Two killed in road accidents

Two people were killed and 25 others were injured in separate road accidents in Savar and Khagrachhari yesterday.

BSS in Savar reports: Two people were killed in a road accident on Dhaka-Aricha highway at Hemayetur in Savar yesterday.

Sources said two motorcyclists skidded off the road when a passenger bus hit their motorcycle.

One motorcyclist died on the spot while the other succumbed to his injuries at a private clinic in Savar. The identities of the deceased could not be known.

UNB in Khagrachhari adds: Fourteen people were injured when a jeep turned turtle in Athal Pahar area of Dighinala in Khagrachhari yesterday.

Witnesses said the accident occurred when the driver of the passenger jeep lost control over steering and collided with a hill, leaving 14 passengers injured.

Local people rescued the injured and admitted them to a local hospital. Condition of three was stated to be critical, hospital sources said.
