

## Aus odds-on favourites Grand final against New Zealand today

New Zealand will adopt a familiar role of underdogs when they confront title-holders and hot favourites Australia today in the ICC Champions Trophy final.

Form and tradition are stacked against the 'Black Caps', but that will not concern skipper Daniel Vettori and his warriors ahead of the 50-over-a-side contest for a record two-million-dollar first prize in Centurion.

While New Zealand once again boxed well above their middleweight status to oust Pakistan by five wickets in the semi-finals, the match never scaled the heights of 24 hours earlier when Australia crushed England by nine wickets.

The 247-run Australian batting masterclass starring unbeaten Shane Watson and skipper Ricky Ponting surpassed the totals of Pakistan or New Zealand and sent a chilling message.

Australia have long been a Champions Trophy bogey team for their neighbours across the Tasman sea, winning the three previous meetings in the mini-World Cup with something to spare.

The victory margin was 164 runs seven years ago in Sri Lanka, seven wickets in

England in 2004 and 34 runs in India three years ago when the tournament was last staged.

Not that records will concern Ponting, who passed the 12,000 ODI run mark in the rout of England and lies third behind a cricketer he admires so much, Indian Sachin Tendulkar, and Sri Lankan Sanath Jayasuriya.

The 34-year-old Tasmanian is a team man first and last and says he will reflect on personal achievements in a game he has graced for a decade and a half only when father time decides the bat must give way to a rocking chair.

"Respect every ball," Ponting warned his teammates ahead of the England slaughter and it will be no different against New Zealand at SuperSport Park just off the Johannesburg-to-Pretoria highway.

While resurgent Watson beamed after his 136 runs against England, the facial reactions of Ponting did not portray a man who had struck 111 and featured in a record Australian one-day stand.

It was great torturing old enemy England, but the mission was incomplete. Winning finals is what counts in the hyper-combative world of Ricky Thomas Ponting and he has two World Cups and a Champions Trophy to boast of.

Vettori is a great captain, too, and after

a timid surrender to South Africa his team upset Sri Lanka by 38 runs, England by four wickets and Pakistan to reach their second final having beaten India in the 2000 Nairobi climax.

What the 'Black Caps' deliver is often far more than the sum of their parts and reached the final despite losing bowlers Daryl Tuffey and Jacob Oram and batsman Jesse Ryder to injury.

Australia had to reshuffle their pack as well after vice-captain Michael Clarke and star bowler Nathan Bracken caught the injury bug, but those left appear to have another all-round strength to celebrate tonight.

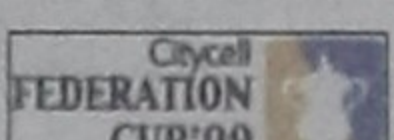

## Russel crush Farashganj Beanibazar win group

Newcomers Beanibazar SC and Sheikh Russel KC both moved into the quarterfinals of the Citycell Federation Cup after their respective Group C matches at Bangabandhu National Stadium yesterday.

Sheikh Russel handed an easy 3-0 defeat to 10-man Farashganj SC to finish behind Beanibazar SC, who played out a goalless draw against Bangladesh Army to emerge as group champions.

Mohammad Yousuf struck twice after Mobarraz Hossain opened the account for Sheikh Russel, who earlier beat Bangladesh Army by 8-1 goals.

Knowing well that Beanibazar would play the quarterfinals as the group champions, Sheikh Russel went into the game with a must-

win-situation as Bangladesh Army finished with four points from three outings.

The powerhouse didn't waste too much time to go ahead as winger Mobarraz drove past Farashganj goalkeeper Titumir Chowdhury in the 19th minute after his first attempt came off the post.

Then a header from Ripon unsettled the Farashganj backline and Mohammad Rony, who struck the tournament's first hat-trick against Army, got into a great position but failed to beat the goalkeeper at the half-hour mark.

Five minutes later Sheikh Russel doubled the lead when Yousuf headed a right-side Abdullah Parvez Chowdhury cross home to go into the breather with a comfortable 2-0 lead.

Farashganj had their first shot on the target five minutes into the second half when national midfielder Mezbabul Haq Manik forced goal

## Now officials go 'missing'

Three officials of the Bangladesh Boxing Federation were reported to have gone 'missing' in Italy as they yet to come back home, four days after their scheduled return home after joining a world boxing seminar in Milan.

Two of the missing are BBF executive committee members Syed Mohiuddin and Abdur Razzak and another is judge Awlad Hossain.

This is a unique incident in the country's sports as for the first time sports officials have reportedly gone missing on foreign soil while there had been countless incidents where players fled sports camps or villages while taking part in sports events.

BBF treasurer Jahir Chowdhury said that the federation would wait for another month for those three 'missing' officials to return as

## Collingwood in buttock niggle

Paul Collingwood could miss the Delhi Daredevils' campaign in the inaugural Champions League Twenty20 after the England batsman picked up a buttock injury during the semifinal defeat against Australia in the ICC Champions Trophy. He will undergo a medical check-up when he returns to England from South Africa.

"We have a contract with the IPL about making our players available, however Collingwood has picked up a

## Nathan played thru' pain

Nathan Bracken, the Australian medium-pacer, has said the knee injury that forced him to return home before the start of Australia's ICC Champions Trophy defence in South Africa had reached a stage where he 'couldn't go on any more'. He felt it had constrained his bowling and hoped that surgery would allow him to bowl more freely in the future.

"I've played in pain since January 2007," Bracken told the Sun-Herald. "From the first day I reported to Cricket Australia I had pain in my knee, I haven't played in a game without pain... it has reached the point where, physically, I can't go on any more. I couldn't guarantee my captain I could finish the series or even a game for that matter."

"It reached the point that when I went off the field during a drinks break I couldn't put weight on my legs to go up and down the stairs. Yet, I needed to bowl my three remaining overs. On that, the advice was for me to come home and get fixed."

Bracken said there were aspects of his bowling that were affected by the problem. "I lost a

bit of pace because I looked after my knee when I bowled and there were certain things as a bowler I couldn't do because it was uncomfortable," he said. "I know in England I couldn't charge in knowing I could fire in a yorker at 135 kilometres an hour; that was just not on."

Bracken is due to have arthroscopic surgery on his right knee and will also not be part of New South Wales' campaign in the Champions League Twenty20 and Australia's one-day series in India. His captain, Ricky Ponting, had expressed concern over the bowler's international future but Bracken did not share those doubts.

"None of the doctors I've seen have let those words pass their lips," Bracken said. "It's simply a matter of getting (the knee) right, getting it 100 per cent by December and then being back in time for the (international) one-day series in January. That's the plan."

"[As for four-day cricket] we'll wait for the operation and I'll listen to the advice. I'm dealing with [knee surgeon] Merv Cross. He's coming out with a few ideas; he wants me to start my rehabilitation, before I have the operation, to strengthen the area. He's confident I can walk out of the hospital after the operation and then begin the process of returning to cricket."

## Vettori hails good show

Daniel Vettori felt New Zealand's ability to execute their game plan was one of several key elements that contributed towards his side booking a place in the Champions Trophy final.

The Black Caps will meet Australia in the title decider after an unbeaten half-century from Grant Elliott helped them cruise to a five-wicket victory over Pakistan at the Wanderers. Captain Vettori led by example with a man-of-the-match performance, taking two wickets and making 41, part of a match-winning 104-run stand with Elliott, who finished unbeaten on 75, as New Zealand coasted past the 234-run target with 13 balls to spare.

"It's very satisfying," Vettori said. "I think particularly because we've lost some critical players."

He added: "I'm really proud of the team. We've won all different types of games and we've got one more to go on a

different wicket. Hopefully we've got one more left in us."

Elliott, who held the innings together with his 103-ball knock, was himself a major injury concern ahead of the final with a thumb injury and the skipper offered full praise for his star batsman.

He continued: "Grant Elliott was in doubt for the day but he managed to battle through with a broken thumb and played such an impressive innings."

"It was an innings of character. He had his thumb injected, he couldn't feel it and he just guts it out. It wasn't a very memorable 40 but it was an outstanding 75. I think he'll be very proud of it and I know the team is proud of him."

Elliott was not the only player who grabbed the plaudits, with Vettori also singing the praises of his bowlers, especially Ian Butler, who took a career-best four for 44, and Shane Bond.

He said: "Tactics are all well and good but it's about the people who implement them. I think, particularly early on, the way the guys bowled, Shane Bond and Ian Butler allowed us to get into the game and allowed us to put pressure on Pakistan the whole way through."

"The same with our batting, because we restricted them to 230, we were just allowed to cruise a little bit, but whenever we needed that little bit of impetus we got it from Ross Taylor and Grant Elliott."

## Ponting happy with form

Australia captain Ricky Ponting believes the Champions Trophy holders have peaked for the defence of their title on Monday.

Ponting's team continued their domination over England with a crushing nine-wicket victory in Friday's semifinal at Centurion. It was Australia's seventh win against England in eight attempts and means they head into the showpiece match in fine touch.

"At the start of the England series we were talking about being well prepared for the Champions Trophy and getting into a position where we could play our best cricket," said Ponting. "To have this group of relatively young guys make it through to a final is a great achievement in itself but we won't be happy until we peak on Monday. We will need to play our best game in a month in the final."

Ponting's 28th one-day hundred for his country in the match against England also saw him become the first Australian to 12,000 runs in this format.

Without vice-captain Michael Clarke, injured alongside fellow limited-overs regular Nathan Bracken, more onus has been on Ponting to guide his young team.

"I was particularly keen to get out there," added Ponting. "When the Australian team took the field, we had a different sort of energy about us than we have had for a while. That's a really good sign."
