

### GLOBAL HANDWASHING DAY OBSERVED Diarrhoea claims 50,800

# children under 5 a year

Says Unicef and WHO report

The Global Handwashing Day-2009 was observed across the country yesterday as elsewhere in the world with the slogan 'Clean hands, save lives'.

Over 50,000 schoolchildren across the country washed their hands with soaps at the same time to create awareness of proper handwashing before eating and after defecation.

According to a recent global report on diarrhoea released by Unicef and WHO, around 50,800 children under five die of diarrhoea every year in the country.

Some 20,000 students from different parts of the city thronged the Residential Model School campus in the city to take part in the handwashing campaign, ile around 30,000 students tooks partin another 50 different schools a can save hugelives. in other divisions.

The government and nongovernment organisations, including the Department of Public Health and Engineering CARE and NGO Forum, organised the campaign with a view to promoting handwashing pracdiseases, including diarrhoea

and respiratory infections. As over 3.5 million under five children die of diarrhoeal disease and acute respiratory infections across the globe each

over 40 percent of diarrhoeal disease, while 25 percent of respiratory infections.

Inaugurating the campaign, LGD Secretary Monzur Hossain said the government is committed to reducing child mortality rate by 2015, adding that such campaign would help the government fulfil its commitment.

"Proper handwashing can help reduce the child mortality rate as well as to increase life expectancy significantly," he said, calling on the guardians to encourage their children to adopt the practice properly. Dr Iyorlumun Uhaa, deputy
